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Principal's Message

There have been so many positive experiences during the past 11 weeks, and the school feels very settled and the students happy. In the past two weeks, all students on Gold, Silver or Bronze have received ice cream by way of letting them know they are doing a great job. It was lovely to hear them say thank you and be acknowledged for doing the right thing. Many of the same students went to the Easter Show, another opportunity offered to our "good" and regularly attending students.

More evidence of our wonderful community-minded students was there actions around The World's Greatest Shave. Accolades like this are so good, as it reinforces that the efforts of both the teachers and the students are working!!! I also acknowledge the work of you, the families, for playing your part in this effort. We all want the best for every student at Warilla High.

We also had a lovely visit from Stephen Jones MP last week. He was so impressed by the school and the students that he had a lengthy conversation with. He asked them what they liked about school and they spoke of a variety of things with enthusiasm and genuinely "sold" the school to him as an outstanding place, which it is!!!

The SRC Induction was the highlight of this week, and 43 outstanding young people became the Student Representative Council for 2024. While this may seem like a very large group, it reflected the many students who wanted to be involved and serve their school. Thank you to the families who came to watch the event, as it made this occasion so special. Year 7 was the audience for the induction, and their behaviour was excellent!!!

Finally, today was the Cross Country. Thank you to the students who ran and to the staff for marshalling. Everyone seemed relaxed and enjoying each other's company and the good weather. Thanks also to the Foreshore Centre for cooking the BBQ and Julee Sandiland, who brought Ollie, the therapy dog, and her two sisters to enjoy the Day as well.

Deputies' Report

From the school's perspective, 2024 is a year that appears to be moving at a rapid pace. In reviewing Term 1, to say that the first 11 weeks of the school year have been action-packed is not an understatement.

It is student learning that is the key driver of any school, and Warilla High School always works to maintain an environment where academic success is valued and attainable for all. In Term 1, our students, Years 7 and 9, were involved in NAPLAN testing. Testing is a long three-week process for the school and students involved, but one that is important. The tests provide the school with data to assist individual students with their learning but also helps to identify areas for improvement across whole cohorts. Strategic planning can, therefore, occur, and programs can be implemented to build on student strengths and rectify deficiencies.

The whole school vocabulary program and Year 8 enrichment classes are examples of the school responding to student needs based on data collected over several years. The growth in our student's literacy and numeracy skills demonstrated by our 2023 Year 7 to 9 NAPLAN and confirmed by Term 4 2023 Check-In testing is proof that our focus to improve these foundation skills is working.

Our Year 7 and 9 students will be asked to sit for Check-In testing during Term 3 of this year. This will allow the school to review the progress of our students in a timely manner and evaluate the ongoing effectiveness of programs and strategies. In the end, we all want to see 'our kids' improve and be successful.

We have also been looking to support our Year 11 students who have made the transition to HSC study. Students and their parents were invited to an evening launch of our Year 11 -Start Strong initiative. This introduced the support available for our students to help them navigate the two years of HSC study. One of these supports is the Thrive Mentor program, where Year 11 students choose a staff mentor to assist and guide them through what is a hectic but rewarding period of their schooling.

During Term 3, students from all year groups will have the opportunity to be involved in study skills sessions provided by Elevate Education. These include but are not exclusive to Junior Time management for Years 7 to 9 and Ace your Exams for Year 11. If you or your child is interested in finding out more about these sessions, please feel free to contact Mr Harry, who has organised this partnership and ensured that there is a session that caters to all year groups.

It would be remiss not to give a special mention to our Year 7 students and families. Congratulations on an incredibly settled and productive transition to secondary school. Starting Year 7 is a huge change from what students are used to in a primary setting, but Year 7 2024 have proven themselves to be resilient and motivated to make their high school experience positive. Well done!

It would also be remiss not to wish our Year 7 Year Adviser, Mr Dean, all the best as he takes a few weeks leave in Term 2 and embarks on the journey of fatherhood for the first time.

Finally, a quick reminder. With the onset of the cooler weather, can we also remind families that our uniform shop has a range of school jacket options, including soft to-the-touch and very warm Sloppy-Joe jumpers. If a family chooses not to purchase from our uniform shop, only plain navy blue tops and bottoms are acceptable to be worn at school. We especially ask that students don't wear grey or black track pants or anything emblazoned with a large logo. Parents are reminded that assistance is available when required in cases of financial hardship to help in getting students into an approved school uniform item.

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IMPORTANT MESSAGES

LATE ARRIVAL - CHANGE OF PROCEDURES

Up until 9.30am go to the side window of the Library between 'A' block and the Library block. One of the Office Staff will record your information and give you a late slip to get into class. After 9.30am report to the front office. Arriving late 3 times without a note from parent/guardian will result in parents being contacted by the school and consequences will apply.

UPDATING STUDENT DETAILS

If you change your address, phone number, including mobile number, or other contact details could you please let the school know as soon as possible?

PRIVATE PERSONAL PROPERTY

Personal property which is brought to school is the sole responsibility of the individual. The school is not insured to cover loss or damage.

PARKING IN SCHOOL ZONES

Heavy fines are imposed for illegal dropping off or picking up students in school zone hours.

The school car park is for staff parking only and is not to be used for dropping off or picking up students.

RIDING A BIKE TO SCHOOL

Students who ride a bike to school are required by law to wear a helmet.

STUDENT ABSENCES

Students must bring a note to explain their absences. A green 'Absence Book' is available from the front office. Unexplained absences will appear on the student's report.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Parents experiencing financial difficulties can apply for support through the Student Assistance Scheme. Funds are available to help with subject fees, school uniform and books. All enquiries through the front office.

2024 HSC Disability Support Provisions

Disability Support Provisions are adjustments approved by NESA to be used by students when sitting the HSC. The HSC support provisions are implemented for those students with disability who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt at the HSC exams. Support provisions are practical interventions that allow students to access the exams on the same basis as students without disability.

Adjustments permitted by NESA are determined by the functional impact the student's disability has on their ability to access and attempt HSC exams.

Disability covered by these provisions includes, but not limited to Autism, reading, writing and numeracy difficulties, very poor handwriting, excessive pain caused by writing, mental health conditions, anxiety, depression, ADHD, colour blindness, vision and hearing difficulties, medical conditions e.g. diabetes, epilepsy, chronic back pain, physical injury. Provisions may include but are not limited to braille papers, large-print papers, use of a reader and/or writer, extra time, or rest breaks, small group supervision, stand and stretch, diabetic provisions.

Applications for students are lodged online by the Warilla HS. Each student's application is discussed with the student and parents or carers. The provisions sought are dependent on the support needs of the student.

Applications for support provisions generally close on the last Day of term 1, 2024. Late applications can be lodged and are generally considered.




The Foreshore Centre looks forward to hosting more events that celebrate the achievements of its students and deepen connections within the school community.



We have been learning about:







ILLEGAL PARKING PUTS CHILDREN'S LIVES AT RISK

Children are small, harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremely vulnerable.

They need YOU to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.

NO PARKING

No waiting. You have 2 minutes to drop-off or pick up. You must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.



Penalty from \$191 + 2 Demerit Points

NO STOPPING

You must not stop on a length of road with a No Stopping sign. The first 10m from an intersection is a No Stopping zone. Yellow kerb lines are also No Stopping zones.



Penalty from \$344 + 2 Demerit Points

BUS ZONE

Only a public bus can stop in a bus zone.



Penalty from \$344 + 2 Demerit Points

MOBILE PHONES

Extra fines apply for using mobile phones in a school zone, May be subject to Double Demerits,



Penalty from \$457 + 5 Demerit Points

SPEEDING OFFENCES

40km/h is the speed limit. Children are vulnerable so slow down in school zones. May be subject to Double Dements.



Penalty from \$200 + 2 Demerit Points

DRIVEWAYS & FOOTPATHS

Do not park on or across a driveway or footpath.

Penalty from \$344 + 2 Demerit Points

PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS

 In a queue of traffic, no part of your vehicle can stop on a pedestrian crossing.

 Do not let your child in or out of a vehicle at a pedestrian crossing as this is a No Stopping zone.



Penalty from \$457 +2 Demerit Points

U TURN

Illegal on or near a pedestrian crossing and across double white lines.

Penalty from \$344 2 Demerit Points

DOUBLE

Double parking is illegal and is very dangerous in a school zone.

Penalty from \$344 2 Demerit Points
