Principal's Message

Welcome back to Term 4! Our HSC students are currently being tested by the BOSTES and I have no doubt they will acquit themselves in fine style. Many of them were in the school during the holiday break working with staff to ensure they were around the nuances of the examination papers for each of their individual subjects. It is indeed gratifying to view the close relationship that exists between staff and their students, and I have no doubt these will be lifelong friendships that will provide both teacher and student with fond memories of a very important time for both.

For those of you who were part of our Year 12 Graduation audience last term, you would understand the palpable nature of the bond that exists between the school and its students. It is indeed gratifying when external evaluations of the school's operation also highlight this aspect of our work and the individual manner in which each of our kids is treated. This will continue to be the case as we creatively and innovatively work to meet the challenges of a new educational paradigm in NSW. Our work has also come under the scrutiny of the DET's *Learning, High Performance and Accountability Directorate*, who featured us in the September edition of their newsletter as a state-wide example of best practice under the increased autonomy arrangements as described in the *Local Schools Local Decisions* policy directive.

This notwithstanding, schools can be predictable at times, and like the seasons of the year, so too each term has its own unique qualities and requirements. Term 4 is always busy and asks schools to:

- Assess 2016 enrolment applications
- Develop a whole school timetable for 2016
- Arrange elective classes and subject lines, including TVET courses
- Ensure appropriate staffing is in place to support a wide and varied curriculum
- Deploy appropriate infrastructure support to deliver on key subject competencies and skills
- Evaluate student and school progress against benchmark data and report to the wider community
- Deliver on the stated school plan priorities

Warilla High is well positioned to take up these challenges with a range of highly skilled and competent staff taking over key responsibilities around each of these requirements. Anticipated enrolments for next year are close to 1150; our timetable operation is well on track and applications for TVET placements have been completed. We are moving to a new and innovative 3 elective structure for Stage 5 while our curriculum offerings are among the broadest of any school in the area. Our state- of- the-art Trade Skills Centre is due to be handed over on 28 November while our new Administration Centre has been completed and our proposed BOSTES Hub is currently being set in place. Every member of staff has a designated role to play in the delivery of our school plan priorities and external evaluations by a consultancy team indicate we are on track to deliver!

We are in solid shape!

Special Provisions for the HSC 2015

The Board of Studies will allow students who have a "disability" to use special provisions for the HSC. They are practical arrangements designed to help students who can't otherwise make a fair attempt at the HSC exams. The provisions are determined based on the way in which the student's performance is disadvantaged during exams.

The definition of the term "disability" is very broad. Examples of disability include learning disability, literacy difficulty, and fine motor skill issues, medical problems such as diabetes, severe asthma, chronic back problems, physical disfigurement, and mental health such as anxiety, depression, bi-polar, neurological and sensory such as scotopic sensitivity or hearing loss.

Special Provisions available can include readers, writers, extra time, rest breaks and separate small group supervision.

Applications are lodged electronically by Warilla High School staff. Documentary evidence is required as supporting evidence and must be submitted to the school for inclusion with the application.

The application process is lengthy. It is advisable to begin the application process as quickly as possible to avoid delays. Applications generally close at the end of Term 1, 2015. Applications may be lodged later in the year, even during the HSC exam period.

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Make Online Payments (POP)

Is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the schools website by selecting \$ Make a payment

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered in the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the \$ Make a payment you must enter:

- the students name, and
- class and reference number OR
- the students name, and
- date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

Warilla High School Attendance

During the last two terms, a growing number of students have been coming late to school, that is after the bell rings for the commencement of the school day, without a note from a parent or caregiver.

Warilla High School is required under the *Education Act 2009*, to record and report on all absences (whole day or partial day absences). This includes students who are "a few minutes late". Parents are responsible under the act to explain the absences of their children from school with either a note or a verbal notification in person or on the telephone.

Listed below is a table of justified and unjustified absences as determined by the NSW Department of Education.

Justified Reasons

- Doctor's/dentist appointment must provide evidence, such as a doctor's certificate or letter.
- Appointment with other health care professional or similar service must provide evidence, such as an appointment card or letter.
- Special family circumstances note/verbal explanation must be provided.
- Bus delayed school will check to verify.
- Interview with Principal, Deputy Principal, Counsellor or other school personnel staff involved must inform the front office.

Unjustified Reasons

- Sleeping in / alarm not working
- Missed the bus
- Traffic / road works
- Walked to school
- Waiting for parent
- Minding sibling
- Shopping
- Other similar reasons

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<u>Please Note:</u> A note from a parent or verbal explanation from parent who drops student at school for any reason listed above as "unjustified" **DOES NOT** make the reason "justified".

Any late arrivals to school without this notification will be recorded as a partial absence and **will be reported** as an 'Unexplained Partial Absence" on the student's report card and on the official record of student attendance. In addition any student who is late without a justified reason will be placed on detention by a member of the Senior Executive.

Late Arrival Change of Procedures – Students arriving late between 8:30 a.m. and 9:15 a.m. are to report to the side window of the library. Any late arrivals after 9:15 a.m. are to report to the front office. Students who are late should bring a note from a parent or caregiver.

PARTNERS IN PARENTING

There is a FREE online parenting program for parents of 12 to 15 year olds, being offered by Monash University and the University of Melbourne. The researchers have developed a new online parenting program designed to empower parents to make sense of adolescence. The program offers practical strategies that parents can use to support their teenager's mental health.

As you know, parents play an important role in protecting their teenagers from mental health problems.

However, it can be difficult to know whether a change in a teenager's behaviour is due to depression or anxiety, or is part of normal adolescent development.

If you are a parent or guardian of a child aged 12 to 15, you may be eligible to participate in a free trial of the program. Participation will take a few hours of yours and your child's time, over 3 to 12 months. Both you and your child will be reimbursed for your time.

Please note, as the program is designed to prevent depression and anxiety problems, researchers are looking for parents of teenagers who do not have any current mental health difficulties.

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Raising Resilient Teenagers



FREE online program empowering parents to make sense of adolescence and parent their teenager more confidently.

We are seeking parents and their teenagers to take part in a trial of a new online parenting program designed to provide parents with strategies to deal with adolescence, and protect their teenagers' mental health.

Who can take part?

Parents or guardians of at least one child aged 12 to 15 who live in Australia, are fluent in English, and have internet access.

As our program is designed to **prevent** depression and anxiety disorders in teenagers, it is not suited for parents who think their teenager may be in need of professional treatment for mental health concerns.

If your teenager is currently having difficulties with depression or anxiety, we recommend that you see a trained mental health professional rather than participating in this research.

What's involved?

- As a parent, you will receive a brief, individually tailored parenting program that will give you feedback about your current parenting and strategies to reduce the risk of depression and anxiety in your teenager.
- You will be allocated to one of two groups, either receiving the program straight away, or in 3 months' time.
- We will ask both you and your teenager (if they agree to take part) to complete some online surveys, at the beginning, and after 3 months. We may also ask you to complete similar surveys after 6 and 12 months.

In total over 12 months, your participation will take a few hours of yours and your child's time. To say thank you, both you and your child will be reimbursed with e-gift vouchers.

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Dear Parent or Guardian and staff,

09/10/2015

A person from the Warilla High School has been diagnosed with pertussis (whooping cough). I am writing to provide advice and to ask that you watch out for the symptoms of pertussis in your child, especially over the next 3 weeks.

What is pertussis?

Pertussis is an infection of the respiratory tract that can cause bouts of coughing, sometimes breathing difficulties and vomiting. It can be a very serious infection in small children. The illness can last for many weeks. It usually starts with a snuffle or a cold.

What should people who are sick with pertussis do?

If your child or a family member develops symptoms, contact your family doctor as soon as possible and take this letter with you.

This is extremely important if there is a baby less than 12 months of age living in your household.

Your doctor can advise whether pertussis is likely and arrange for early treatment if needed. Treating people who have pertussis with antibiotics can stop the infection spreading, but is more effective if started early.

To help prevent this infection spreading, people who have been diagnosed with pertussis should not attend child care, school or work until they have completed the first 5 days of a course of the recommended antibiotics. If antibiotics cannot be taken, then they must stay away for 3 weeks after onset of the cough.

How is it prevented?

Vaccination is the most important way of reducing pertussis in our community. It is important to double check that your child is fully up to date with his or her immunisations against pertussis. If in doubt, please ask your doctor to check.

NSW Health recommends adult booster vaccine every 10 years to protect from Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough.

What is a Chromebook?

Chromebooks are a new type of computer designed to help you get things done faster and easier in the 21st Century classrooms at Warilla High School. Chromebooks run Chrome OS, an operating system that has security, built-in cloud storage, and a range of Google products for education built-in.

Where can I buy a Chromebook?

How Much do they cost?

Chromebooks range from \$299 to \$368, which is a substantial investment but a much cheaper option than other laptop and even some tablet devices.



Important information for 2015

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

At Warilla High School we expect the very best for, and from our students. We hope to see our students take opportunities, experience success and gain the most from their time at Warilla High School. The purpose of this letter is to outline important information for 2015 including the areas of School Uniform, Attendance (including a roll call trial) and the PBS program.

School Uniform 2015

There have been important changes taking place in terms of the enforced expectations for school uniform at Warilla High School that will be reinforced from day one of 2015. Our Year 7 group in 2015 will follow on from Year 7 2014 and wear our mandatory school shorts and skirts. These items were developed through a lengthy process involving students, parents and staff. Along with this:

- All students Year 7-12 will be expected to wear full, appropriate uniform each day. In particular
 the length of shorts and skirts must be appropriate (no more than 10cm above the knee) and
 tights are not acceptable.
- Students without correct uniform items (colour, type or length) will be provided with appropriate uniform items and will be expected to change into these for their day at school.
- Appropriate footwear, that meets WH&S guidelines, must also be worn each day. At Warilla High School student's shoes must be fully enclosed with a solid upper and predominantly black or white in colour.

Our school uniform, including the way it is worn by our students, is a very clear reflection of our school standards and expectations. We look forward to all students wearing correct school uniform with pride each day, displaying the high expectations we have for our students at Warilla High School. School uniform items can be purchased through the Daylight Uniform Shop situated in our front office. Please see the attached schedule of extended opening hours for the later part of January 2015.

The school is committed to ensuring all students can meet our school uniform expectation and be clearly recognised as a proud member of our school community. Parents/caregivers who require assistance to provide uniform for their students are asked to contact the school. 
