Principal's Message

As you are aware, this year is the 50th anniversary of Warilla High School. To mark the occasion an Anniversary Dinner was held on 22 October at Warilla Bowls and Recreation Club. What a fabulous night! The inaugural school captain from 1965 addressed the gathering, along with staff from a good cross section of the 50 year history of the school. Several guests travelled from interstate, while one even made the special trip from Dubai for the occasion!

What struck me most about the night, and after listening to speeches and mingling with familiar- and not so familiar faces- is the fact the core element of this school is its genuine care for students and that over five decades, this has never wavered. 
"You played strong and done fine!"

Make Online Payments (POP)

Is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the <u>schools website</u> by selecting <u>\$ Make a payment</u>

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered in the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the \$ Make a payment you must enter:

- the students name, and
- class and reference number OR
- the students name, and
- date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

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You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

Warilla High School Attendance

During the last two terms, a growing number of students have been coming late to school, that is after the bell rings for the commencement of the school day, without a note from a parent or caregiver.

Warilla High School is required under the *Education Act 2009*, to record and report on all absences (whole day or partial day absences). This includes students who are "a few minutes late". Parents are responsible under the act to explain the absences of their children from school with either a note or a verbal notification in person or on the telephone.

Listed below is a table of justified and unjustified absences as determined by the NSW Department of Education.

Justified Reasons

- Doctor's/dentist appointment must provide evidence, such as a doctor's certificate or letter.
- Appointment with other health care professional or similar service must provide evidence, such as an appointment card or letter.
- Special family circumstances note/verbal explanation must be provided.
- Bus delayed school will check to verify.
- Interview with Principal, Deputy Principal, Counsellor or other school personnel – staff involved must inform the front office.

Unjustified Reasons

- Sleeping in / alarm not working
- Missed the bus
- Traffic / road works
- Walked to school
- Waiting for parent
- Minding sibling
- Shopping
- Other similar reasons

<u>Please Note:</u> A note from a parent or verbal explanation from parent who drops student at school for any reason listed above as "unjustified" **DOES NOT** make the reason "justified".

Any late arrivals to school without this notification will be recorded as a partial absence and **will be reported** as an 'Unexplained Partial Absence" on the student's report card and on the official record of student attendance. In addition any student who is late without a justified reason will be placed on detention by a member of the Senior Executive.

Late Arrival Change of Procedures – Students arriving late between 8:30 a.m. and 9:15 a.m. are to report to the side window of the library. Any late arrivals after 9:15 a.m. are to report to the front office. Students who are late should bring a note from a parent or caregiver.




Domayne Warrawong is holding a BYOD Expo on the weekend of the 28th and 29th of November.

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Dear Parents/Carers,

Throughout 2015 Warilla High School trialled the rollout of a BYOD program. This trial involved all teaching staff receiving extensive training in the use of a broad range of technological resources for use in the classroom. It also involved upgrades to the existing network and Wi-Fi systems used to support the use of technology throughout the school.

From the beginning of 2016 there is an expectation that all students will now bring a technology device to school everyday. We recognise that just like uniforms, supplies, and extracurricular activities, a technology device for student use represents a significant investment for families. In response to this we are offering a range of support options for those families who are unable to meet these expectations due to financial hardship. Please contact the school before the end of the 2015 school year to discuss these options if support is required. In order to enable future-focussed $21^{\rm st}$ century learning programs to continue to be implemented at Warilla High School it is very important that all students are ready to participate in this BYOD program from the beginning of 2016.

It is also important that laptops brought by students are suitable for use at school. Please be aware that some older laptops and Android devices will not work on the school's 5 GHz wireless network. Details of the minimum specifications and the types of devices suitable for use in the school environment are available on the following website;

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Dear Parent or Guardian and staff,

29/10/2015

A child from the Warilla High School has been diagnosed with pertussis (whooping cough). I am writing to provide advice and to ask that you watch out for the symptoms of pertussis in your child, especially over the next 3 weeks.

What is pertussis?

Pertussis is an infection of the respiratory tract that can cause bouts of coughing, sometimes breathing difficulties and vomiting. It can be a very serious infection in small children. The illness can last for many weeks. It usually starts with a snuffle or a cold.

What should people who are sick with pertussis do?

If your child or a family member develops symptoms, contact your family doctor as soon as possible and take this letter with you.

This is extremely important if there is a baby less than 12 months of age living in your household.

Your doctor can advise whether pertussis is likely and arrange for early treatment if needed. Treating people who have pertussis with antibiotics can stop the infection spreading, but is more effective if started early.

To help prevent this infection spreading, people who have been diagnosed with pertussis should not attend child care, school or work until they have completed the first 5 days of a course of the recommended antibiotics. If antibiotics cannot be taken, then they must stay away for 3 weeks after onset of the cough.

How is it prevented?

Vaccination is the most important way of reducing pertussis in our community. It is important to double check that your child is fully up to date with his or her immunisations against pertussis. If in doubt, please ask your doctor to check.

NSW Health adult booster vaccination for parents and staff who has not have theirs in the past 10 years.

Warilla High School has decided to select Google Chromebooks as our preferred BYOD device for use in the classroom.

What is a Chromebook?

Chromebooks are a new type of computer designed to help you get things done faster and easier in the 21st Century classrooms at Warilla High School. Chromebooks run Chrome OS, an operating system that has security, built-in cloud storage, and a range of Google products for education built-in.



Chromebook Features

A Chromebook has many features that fit well with education. These include

- Long lasting battery
- Fast loading and startup speeds
- Light weight design
- Full functioning screen and keyboard

Where can I buy a Chromebook?

Chromebooks can be purchased online or in store through JB Hi Fi https://www.dicksmith.com.au/chromebooks/ and Dick Smith Electronics http://www.dicksmith.com.au/chromebook.

How Much do they cost?

Chromebooks range from \$299 to \$368, which is a substantial investment but a much cheaper option than other laptop and even some tablet devices.

Students that already have devices are still able to bring their devices to school. The Chromebook device is the option for students that do not yet have a device for school.

Towards the end of this term there will be an information evening for parents to demonstrate the features of these devices and their use in a 21st Century learning environment.

To Parent/ Carers,

Over the last few months negotiations have taken place with many stakeholders within the Warilla High School community to discuss the possible influences of student devices for students at Warilla High School and the impact of students bringing their own devices to school.

It is the recommendation of Warilla High School that Google Chromebooks be the preferred device that students can use in the classroom. However, for those students that already have a device or wish to purchase a more expensive device you are welcome to do so.

To assist parents/ Carers with getting value for money when purchasing a Chromebook, we have called upon the assistance of JB Hifi to offer a range of devices at a reduced price.

JB Hifi offer 4 different Chromebook models starting at \$315 as well as a range of accessories, extended warranties and most importantly a range of payment options to suit family needs. Using the portal is straightforward and once the order is placed the laptop will be available for pick up at the Shellharbour JB Hi fi store.

Warilla High School offers this portal as an option only and we encourage families to shop around for the best deal, however, the prices and device selection available through the portal offer some devices not available to the public.

When prompted the school code for Warilla High School is - warhs2015

When visiting the site to compare devices you do not have to purchase on the first instance. Simply select the options you would like to purchase and get your total, then compare the price with other stores.

Also keep an eye out for specials on accessories like carry cases, usb drives and any accessories that may be on sale especially towards end of financial year sales.



Important information for 2015

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

At Warilla High School we expect the very best for, and from our students. We hope to see our students take opportunities, experience success and gain the most from their time at Warilla High School. The purpose of this letter is to outline important information for 2015 including the areas of School Uniform, Attendance (including a roll call trial) and the PBS program.

School Uniform 2015

There have been important changes taking place in terms of the enforced expectations for school uniform at Warilla High School that will be reinforced from day one of 2015. Our Year 7 group in 2015 will follow on from Year 7 2014 and wear our mandatory school shorts and skirts. These items were developed through a lengthy process involving students, parents and staff. Along with this:

- All students Year 7-12 will be expected to wear full, appropriate uniform each day. In particular
 the length of shorts and skirts must be appropriate (no more than 10cm above the knee) and
 tights are not acceptable.
- Students without correct uniform items (colour, type or length) will be provided with appropriate uniform items and will be expected to change into these for their day at school.
- Appropriate footwear, that meets WH&S guidelines, must also be worn each day. At Warilla High School student's shoes must be fully enclosed with a solid upper and predominantly black or white in colour.

Our school uniform, including the way it is worn by our students, is a very clear reflection of our school standards and expectations. We look forward to all students wearing correct school uniform with pride each day, displaying the high expectations we have for our students at Warilla High School. School uniform items can be purchased through the Daylight Uniform Shop situated in our front office. Please see the attached schedule of extended opening hours for the later part of January 2015.

The school is committed to ensuring all students can meet our school uniform expectation and be clearly recognised as a proud member of our school community. Parents/caregivers who require assistance to provide uniform for their students are asked to contact the school. 
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
