Principal's Message

I imagine by now that you have had the opportunity to view the upgrades to the front of the school to support our approach to improved road safety, and of ensuring a safe arrival and departure for everyone. As previously indicated, the upgrades have included widening the concrete section of the footpath to accommodate both pedestrians and cyclists; fencing to prevent students spilling onto the roadway and directing them onto the buses, new parking restrictions and a drop off zone. I have attached comprehensive information about these changes to this newsletter as well as providing a hard copy to every student, placed it on our Facebook Page and Website, and reinforced the message at both whole school and year group assemblies. I am sure that the changes will have the desired, positive impact we seek.

Year 12 have commenced their Trial HSC examinations. We have attempted to replicate the HSC proper by engaging the Presiding Officer and examination supervisors who will work with our students in October to develop a familiarity with the expectations and protocols that will be employed. I am anticipating some outstanding results from a cohort who have distinguished themselves to this point and should be in a position to perform strongly. The post-HSC Trial period will also be an opportunity to take stock of any areas that require attention and further refinement.

I would like to again reiterate our policy with regard to mobile phones. **Mobile phones are turned off and out of sight during lessons unless the teacher has specifically requested otherwise**. The latter would only be the case if the devices were to be used for a specific learning activity related to the curriculum. Unfortunately, too many students are "wedded to their phones" and off task in class trying to keep up with social media commentary. I am sure your support for this policy will see a reduction in the number of students who wish to argue with staff about this directive.

I had the absolute pleasure of travelling to Cootamundra to support our U/15 Rugby League side play in the NSW Country Championship semi-final some weeks ago. The boys were successful and progressed to the NSW final, which was played in Dubbo on 9 August. It was wonderful to see parents make the trek in support of the team who played with passion, resilience and a steely resolve to take out the NSW Country Championship, 30-6. It was also something of a trip down memory-lane for me, as 45 years ago I represented this school in 2 state finals and still harbour strong memories of the games and the team-mates who I shared so much success with. The boys should be very proud of what they have achieved and I congratulate them on all they have done. Please see Head Coach Ben (The Raider) Roskell's full report in this edition of our newsletter.

Finally, I would like to let you know that the school has decided to call for tenders for the operation of the school canteen. We believe that this option would improve the operation of what is already a fantastic facility, much the same as the tender for the sale of our uniforms has done. Information related to the tender process will be released shortly and I look forward to working with our committee to award the tender to a solid bid.

As always, I look forward to seeing you all at our P&C meetings on the second Tuesday of each month commencing at 6 pm in the Library.

Under 15's Country Cup Rugby League

The Warilla HS under 15's Rugby League team has achieved something extra special in 2017. Having entered a group of very talented group of footballers into the prestigious Country Cup, we were confident in our ability to get some wins on the board. This competition determines the best country rugby league school in the state. What eventuated was something not even we had dreamed of.

Country Cup - Southern Illawarra Croome Road - 8th May 2017

As Mr Roskell was on paternity leave, Mr Delaney took our boys over to Croome Road for the first round of qualifiers. We played four games against local high schools and we were victorious in all. A beautiful day awaited us in perfect conditions. But we got off to the worst possible start. Down 6-0 after two minutes. Would our run stop here?...... Of course not. The boys were unstoppable in the middle of the park. Barnstorming our way through their tough defence. Warilla HS went on to score 6 unanswered tries to romp home. We had claimed the NSW title 30 points to 6! Jordan Morn was named Man of the Match and Cooper Askew was presented the trophy by none other than the Bobcat - Andrew Ryan (Mr Hambly was quick to whisk the trophy into his car). It was a wonderful performance from our boys and an amazing achievement we will all remember for years to come.

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Thanks must go to Mr Delaney, Mr Kershaw and Mr Hambly. And special mention to all of the family and friends who made their way to Cootamundra and Dubbo. We couldn't have done it without you!!!

Late Arrival to School

During the last two terms, a growing number of students have been coming late to school, that is after the bell rings for the end of roll call, without a note from a parent of caregiver.

Warilla High School is required under the *Education Act 2009*, to record and report on all absences, be they whole day, or partial day absences. This includes students that are only five (5) minutes late to school. <u>Parents are responsible</u> under the act to explain the absences of their children from school with either a note or a verbal notification in person or on the telephone.

Any late arrivals to school without this notification will be recorded as a partial absence and **will be reported** as an **'Unexplained Partial Absence'** on the students report card and on the official record of student attendance.

Please discuss this matter with your child, and reinforce the need to have a good record of attendance on their reports, for when they want to move into the part time or permanent workforce.

The following chart highlights the impact of non-attendance over time. Viewed in this context, the implications of regular absenteeism are startling. The chart shows the cumulative effect of persistent non-attendance over the period of schooling from **Kindergarten to the end of Year 10**.

NAPLAN Online

NAPLAN is moving online. This means moving NAPLAN from the current paper-based tests to computer-based assessments. The transition to NAPLAN online will commence from 2018, by 2019, it is anticipated that NAPLAN will be entirely online.

The benefits of online assessments

Some of the main benefits of students taking part in NAPLAN Online include:

 Better assessment – and more precise results. NAPLAN Online uses a tailored test or adaptive design, where the test automatically adapts to a student's performance and asks questions that match the student achievement level, allowing the student to demonstrate their knowledge. This provides teachers and schools with more targeted and detailed information on students' performance on the tests. Tailored testing also provides an opportunity to broaden the scope of the assessments.



- **Faster turnaround of results.** Delivery of assessments online significantly reduces the time it takes to provide feedback to schools, students and parents, so teachers can respond more quickly to learning needs.
- More engaging. ACARA research into online assessment has shown that students have engaged well with electronic tests.

Warilla High School will be participating in state wide readiness testing during week six of this term, 21.8.17. - 25.8.17 inclusive. The students of Years 7 and Year 9 will be involved. Students in each group will sit two online NAPLAN tests during the assessment week.

Fact sheet for parents and carers

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Planning has begun to move NAPLAN from a pen and paper assessment to an online assessment.

What are the benefits of NAPLAN Online?

Results will be faster and more precise

- Your child's individual results will be returned to you within just a few weeks of the NAPLAN testing.
- Online assessment will reduce the time it takes to mark and provide feedback to schools, teachers and parents.
- Improved precision and timing of results will help teachers to tailor their teaching more specifically to address students' learning needs.

Tailored tests will provide better assessment

- The online format allows for 'tailored testing', where the test adapts to a student's performance and asks questions that match their achievement level.
- Students in each year level start with the same set of questions which can then branch into a different set of questions based on their responses to the first set of questions.
- This means that students will be directed to questions that may be easier or more challenging depending on their responses.
- This test design will allow students to better demonstrate their literacy and numeracy skills.
- Students find online assessment is more engaging*, which means they are encouraged to persist longer and try harder.

* Research by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) into online assessment has shown that students have engaged well with electronic tests.

NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test

NSW schools will participate in a school readiness test between 14 August and 22 September 2017.

The school readiness test is a 'practice run' for schools to assess their technology ahead of NAPLAN Online. The readiness test is not an assessment of student ability. The readiness test allows schools to:

- become familiar with the NAPLAN Online test format and processes
- check whether they have the technical capacity, rooms and devices to administer NAPLAN Online
- provide students in NAPLAN years 3, 5, 7 and 9 with the opportunity to experience the online test question types and format by completing a practice NAPLAN online test.

Frequently asked questions

Which students will participate in the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test?

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 will participate.

How should I prepare my child for the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test?

Your child will not need any academic preparation for the school readiness test. This is not a test of their literacy and numeracy skills, but an opportunity for them to experience the online test format and for their school to assess its online testing capability.

How long is the school readiness test?

The school readiness test is expected to include two assessments: a writing assessment* and a combined numeracy/literacy assessment. The duration of each assessment will be approximately 40 minutes.

* Year 3 students will only be expected to complete the combined numeracy/literacy assessment.

When will my school participate in the readiness test?

One week within the test period in August and September will be identified for each school to conduct readiness testing.

How will students be prevented from using the internet or spellcheckers when completing the test?

The NAPLAN Online assessment platform will have state-ofthe-art security protections. The assessment is delivered inside a locked-down browser. This ensures students cannot access the internet or spellcheckers while completing the test.

Will schools and parents be provided with information on the results of the readiness test?

There will be feedback to schools about the technical information gained from the readiness testing. There will be no reporting of student test results from the readiness test.

Year 9 NAPLAN results and the HSC minimum standard Message from NESA

HSC minimum standard required to receive the HSC from 2020

Literacy and numeracy skills are the foundation for success in life after school. This is why eligibility for the HSC is changing. From 2020, students will need to show they have the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to complete everyday tasks.

Your child will have a number of opportunities from Year 9 to Year 12, and even after the HSC to show they meet the HSC minimum standard

Some students will meet the requirement early through their Year 9 NAPLAN results in reading, writing and numeracy. However, most students will show they meet the standard by passing short, online reading, writing and numeracy tests in Years 10, 11 or 12.

Year 9 NAPLAN reports available in mid-August

Your child's Year 9 NAPLAN report will indicate which online HSC minimum standard test/s (if any) they will need to pass to be eligible for the HSC certificate. Remember your child has three more years of learning before the HSC and can take the HSC minimum standard online tests in Years 10, 11 or 12. Year 9 NAPLAN is a good chance to check they are on track or get support to meet the minimum standard by Year 12.

If your child has achieved a Band 8 or above in reading, writing or numeracy, the NAPLAN report will indicate that they have "Met the HSC minimum standard early" in the respective area/s.

Your child can sit the online HSC minimum standard tests when they are ready

There are three separate 45 minute online tests: reading, writing and numeracy. Students don't have to pass all three tests at once and can attempt each test up to twice a year.

The reading and numeracy tests each contain a maximum of 45 multiple choice questions.

The writing test will require students to respond to a question about a prompt or stimulus.

Flu Season





Future Based Inquiry

Year 7 Cap classes A and B participated in a 3-day Project Based Learning pilot program Future Based Inquiry (FBI) that incorporated HSIE, English and Visual Arts curriculum areas. Students worked in small groups in the hall which were arranged into 'pods' to address the driving question 'How can we, as Year 7 students, advise incoming/transition Year 6 students so they can thrive when moving to Warilla High School from their Primary School, through a short film?'.

Day one focused on developing 21st Century learning skills of communication, collaboration, problem-solving and critical thinking. 




The In2Uni Program engages with individuals in targeted schools and communities to build their awareness and aspirations toward higher education and to provide them with the knowledge and skills to get there.

Tell Them From Me parent survey Frequently Asked Questions (parents and carers)

Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation

1. What is the Partners in Learning parent survey?

The Partners in Learning parent survey is part of the *Tell Them From Me* suite of surveys on student engagement. The parent survey helps to clarify and strengthen the important relationship between parent and school.

The survey is designed to measure, assess and report insights from the parent point of view at the school and system levels. The focus of this NSW survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

2. What kind of questions will the survey ask?

The survey questions aim at understanding parents' perspectives on their child's experience at school, including teaching, communication and the school's support of learning and behaviour. The survey also aims to understand parents' perspectives on activities and practices at home related to their child's learning.

The survey will ask parents questions about:

Parents feel welcome	Parents are informed	Parents support learning at home	Parents participation at school
School supports positive behaviour	Safety	Inclusion	School supports learning

3. How have schools been selected to take part?

The survey is open to all NSW government schools at no cost to them. Your school has decided to participate.

4. How will taking part in this survey benefit my child's school?

The parent survey provides school principals and school leaders with parents' perspectives on their school as well as learning at home. Communication between parents and staff, activities and practices at home, and parent views on the school's support of learning and behaviour help build an accurate and timely picture that schools can use for practical improvements.

Data collected from the survey responses are quickly compiled into reports for school leaders. Principals can then use this information to help them identify emerging issues and plan for school improvement.

5. How does the parent survey relate to the student survey?

The parent survey is complementary to the *Tell Them From Me* student survey that your child may have been asked to complete. These surveys are offered (along with a teacher survey) to ensure schools can capture the views of students, teachers and parents.

6. What do I need to do to participate in the survey?

The survey typically takes 15 minutes and is conducted entirely online through a secure website operated by the survey developers, *The Learning Bar.* You will be provided with a link to complete the survey at home or your school may make computers available so that you can complete the survey during school hours.

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7. Do I need to participate?

No, participation in the survey is optional. Whilst your responses are very much appreciated, if during the survey, you feel uncomfortable, you can stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped.

8. Will the school be able to identify me or my child from my responses?

Staff in schools will not be able to identify individual parents or students from parent responses. To protect parent anonymity, schools will be provided with a single username and password for the school prior to the start of the survey period. This username and password will then be distributed to parents. Data supression rules are applied to the school reporting tools where there are fewer than five responses.

9. What sort of analysis will be done of the survey data?

Once the surveys are completed, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days. School leaders can use the data to better understand the experiences and views of parents at their school. CESE will undertake state-wide analysis of the survey data in conjunction with existing student data held by the department, including performance data. The results will help all schools better understand the relationship between parents and students' engagement, students' wellbeing, effective teaching and student learning. Results from CESE's analysis of this data will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes. This supports the department's continuing focus on quality teaching and leadership. The data will be retained for future analysis to help us better understand the nature of student engagement and wellbeing over time.

10. When will the Partners in Learning survey happen?

The surveys will be conducted in all participating schools between Monday 21st August (Week 6, Term 3) and Friday 13th October 2017 (Week 1, Term 4).

What is CESE?

The Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) is part of the Department of Education.

CESE has been established to improve the effectiveness, efficiency and accountability of education in New South Wales.

CESE will identify and share what works, creating new opportunities to improve teaching and learning across all of education.

Warilla School Road Safety and Traffic Management



Shellharbour City Council in conjunction with Warilla High School, Department of Education and the New South Wales Police Service have been working hard to improve road safety and traffic management within the 40km School Zone at your school.

An education campaign will begin on **Monday**, **14** August **2017** and conclude on **Friday**, **1** September **2017**. The aim of the campaign is to educate parents & friends, students, staff and the general public about the changes to the traffic environment, the related road rules, offences and the possible consequences for non-adherence. Council Rangers and Police will be targeting this area to ensure compliance with road rules and the signage.

Changes to Keross Avenue include:


- 1. Installation of a Shared Use Path extending from the entrance of the school to Sammit Avenue.
- 2. Pedestrian barrier fence, separating pedestrians and vehicular traffic.
- 3. The breaks in the fence are designed to channel students to board buses in an orderly fashion.
- 4. Students heading south should cross at the pedestrian refuge adjacent to the front entrance of the school.
- 5. Students heading north or east should remain on the Shared use Path and cross at Sammit Avenue to access traffic lights on Shellharbour Road.
- 6. Students heading west should use traffic and pedestrian facilities to ensure a safe journey home.
- An existing no parking (kiss and drop) zone between 8.00am 9.30am & 2.30pm 4.00pm. School Days ONLY. Unrestricted parking is permitted outside these times. This is located west of the school entrance.
- 8. No parking means you can stop for no more than 2minutes and move no further than 3metres away from your vehicle. This will allow you to get out of the kerb side door and enter the school gate safely no further than 3metres away from your vehicle. This will allow you to help your child to get out of the 'Safety (Rear kerb side) Door' and watch them enter the school gate safely. This is not the area to park if you need to attend to business in the school office. You will need to park in an unrestricted parking area.
- 9. There are heavy fines and demerit points for stopping in a no parking zone. For more information please see below.
- 10. All motorists are encouraged to move forward in the no parking zone. If there is no spaces available in the no parking zone 'Do a Loop via Keross Avenue, Abelia Street and Cassia Street and Daphne Street to join the queue on Keross Avenue.



High Attendance Equals High Achievement

What is a justified reason for being absent from school?

Justified reasons for absences may include if the student:

- has an <u>unavoidable</u> medical or dental appointment (preferably, these should be made after school
- or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious disease.

Absences for reasons such as some of the following may not be justified.

- Shopping
- Sleeping in
- Working around the house
- Minding younger siblings and other children
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Haircuts.

It is important to realise that parents (including carers) may be prosecuted if children have recurring unjustified absences from school.



Make Online Payments (POP)

Is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting <u>\$ Make a payment</u>

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered under the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the <u>\$ Make a payment</u> you must enter:

- the student's name, and
- class and reference number OR
- the student's name, and
- Date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why. Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

 Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

Application to the Children's Court

 Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department

may apply to the Children's Court for a *Compulsory Schooling Order*. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education and Communities recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities. If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.




