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Principal's Message

Last term saw our Year 12 Graduation which marked a milestone for many families. This term saw the HSC commence as the last task left for this engaging group of students. I compliment both students and staff who have so readily given of their time over the holiday break to support study groups preparing for these much-hyped examinations. Indeed, I think there wasn't a day during "stuvac" where students and staff weren't on site and fully immersed in revision activities. I have no doubt the fruit of their labour will be seen in some quality results.

Year 11 have now commenced their HSC studies and I hope the assistance they are currently getting via a school developed *HSC Success Strategy* will stand them in good stead. This program is specifically designed to ensure study time is focused and that students utilise a range of strategies to ensure learning time is maximised. The study skills-set they develop will be adaptable beyond the school and I hope our kids embrace the opportunity with gusto!

Our preparation for the 2019 school year continues at pace as we host our incoming Year 7 as part of our 6-7 transition process. On the staffing scene, we are in the process of appointing an additional Head Teacher Welfare while impending retirements may also see additional teaching staff required. I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Mrs Sharon Seeney to our team. Sharon is a substantive SAM who has agreed to join us until the end of 2019 to work as part of the Senior Financial Management Team of the school. She will join Mrs Souter and myself to ensure the equitable distribution of RAM funding in line with the endorsed school plan priorities. Sharon brings significant experience to the role and I look forward to her insights and financial acumen.

On a less savoury note, there have been a number of students who have been pushing the boundaries of our expectations for behaviour across the school. I again reiterate that the school will not tolerate anti-social behaviour of any kind. The use of violence is reprehensible and has no place in our school. Students who engage in such gratuitous actions will have their placement at this school reviewed. Likewise, those who want to taunt others, bully and harass- or have others do their bidding- is anathema to the values of excellence, respect, integrity and compassion that form the cornerstone of our work.

We will not be successful in ensuring our kids have an unequivocal understanding of their obligations in this area without the support of parents and carers. A consistent message from home and at school will go a long way to guaranteeing a daytime environment at school that is tolerant, respectful and inclusive.

As always, your cooperation is very much appreciated as we strive for exactly the same outcome- happy, contented and successful children!

Deputies Report

The year is flying by and our Year 12 students have just finished their final HSC exams. Talking to students as they have been leaving the exams they have been generally quite happy but we will not know the results until the end of the school year. It is an exciting stage of their lives as they are offered employment or various courses. We will keep you posted as to how they go.

Warilla High School has a mobile phone policy and the students have been reminded of it at Year assemblies. The school's stance is that during school hours student phones are "Off and Away". If a parent/carer needs to get in contact with their child they are requested to do so through the school number and a message will be sent to them immediately. Please do not ring them during class time, as they will have their phone taken off them and it will not be returned until the end of the day. Obviously, if a teacher wants students to use the internet for a class activity then, of course, it is OK if they use their phone, or a tablet, to complete the task, and on its completion, it is to be switched off and returned to their bag. With our phone policy, we are teaching our students skills for life. Recently, a visitor to the school and an employer, said they are so against the use of phones during work time in the building industry that after one warning employees can be sacked for violating this code. He even gave an example of a death at a building site because the person wasn't paying attention while using their phone. We ask parents and carers to support us by backing us up and communicating with their child through the office during school hours. We would also add to help our students mature and work on their independence it is good to encourage students to socialise with their friends rather than being on the phone to home during break time.

Recently a letter was sent home to some parents of Year 10 students. These were students who had received a Letter about N Award warnings. The reason we send letters of this type is to keep you informed as to what is happening and our expectations at school. If a student doesn't hand in assessment tasks we give them another chance to clear the matter, but for zero marks. If students have failed to do that we have sent you a letter. We want to work as a team with parents and the student and get these outstanding N warnings cleared, so as to not put their Record of School Achievement (ROSA) in jeopardy. Thank you to the many parents who have called recently about these letters and it is great to see we are clearing these issues. We want all of our students to do their personal best in their ROSA and we appreciate parental support for us to achieve this.

It is a busy place at Warilla High and we have been a little busier recently with orientation days from students who will be enrolling as Year 7 in 2019. The Year 6 students have reported to have had wonderful experiences trying our various subjects and specialist areas they don't get a chance to use in primary school. A huge thank you to the Warilla teachers who taught these exciting lessons, to Ms Napier, who will be their Year Advisor next year and all of the accompanying teachers who also got to see high school for a day. We look forward to seeing Year 6 next year as part of our student body.

As we move closer to the end of the year it is also important to make sure that your student does not have "unexplained" absences on their report. All parents have the ability to access the portal and see what absences their student has and which ones still need explaining. People forget that when students apply for jobs, even just part-time work, employers look at attendance as a really important indicator as to what type of worker they might be, so get please get these absences explained.

Finally, you may not have seen recently in the Illawarra Mercury, the article on Mr Hambly and Mrs Pettit receiving awards for their excellence in Education.

The article begins with "John Hambly may be old school in the way he treats his students like they are his own children, but the Warilla High School principal was also recently recognised by the NSW Department of Education for embracing and encouraging cutting-edge technology.

LATE ARRIVAL – CHANGE OF PROCEDURES

PARKING IN SCHOOL ZONES

Heavy fines are imposed for illegal dropping off or picking up students in school zone hours.

The school car park is for staff parking only and is not to be used for dropping off or picking up students.

RIDING A BIKE TO SCHOOL

Students who ride a bike to school are required by law to wear a helmet.

Update for Vaccinations

Any Year 7 student who returned their purple vaccination consent form but was away on the day to receive their Human Papillomavirus vaccine (HPV) which requires two doses will have the opportunity to catch up at school on 13th February 2019. No further documentation needs to be returned to the school as the nurses have all the information on file.

Any Year 10 or 11 students who was absent on the day for their Meningococcal vaccine will NOT have an opportunity to catch up at school. A nurse from Public Health will be in contact with you around November to inform you that it will only be free from your local GP for the remainder of this year. You will need to make an appointment with your local GP to get this done.

HSC Disability Support Provisions (special provisions) 2019 Applications

NESA offers practical support to students with a disability sitting the HSC. Approval to use disability support for the HSC exams must be granted by NESA.

Disability can include medical conditions such as diabetes, chronic pain, poor fine motor skills (very poor writing), and mental health issues including anxiety or depression. Disability can also cover learning difficulties including associated with reading and or writing.

NESA requires supporting evidence to be submitted with each application. Often this evidence is in the form of current diagnosis from medical providers including doctors, specialist doctors, as well as allied health professionals such as physiotherapists, psychologists, occupational therapists, behavioural optometrists.

Support offered is practical in nature and depends upon the disability, but can include separate small group supervision, reader, writer, extra time, stand & stretch, rest breaks, diabetic provisions.

It is possible for NESA to permit non-standard support.

Applications are lodged with NESA electronically, by Warilla High School, on behalf of each student, with attached supporting documentation.

Submission of applications to access disability support provisions will generally close at the end of term 1, 2019. NESA will consider late applications.

RBA Education Ambassadors visit Warilla High.

Warilla High Students first to see the new \$50 note.

A group of interested students attended a guest presentation from two Education Ambassadors of the Reserve Bank of Australia earlier this semester. Students in Years 8, 9, 10 and 11 were among the group of about fifty people along with Miss Ryan and Miss Lever and other interested teachers who gathered in the hall after a formal assembly. Economists Tim Atkin and Tanya Livermore explained some fundamental concepts around economics.

The Reserve Bank is independent of government and explains their role on their website (<u>https://www.rba.gov.au/qa/</u>) as follows:

"The Bank conducts the nation's monetary policy and issues its currency. It seeks to foster <u>financial system stability</u> and promotes the safety and efficiency of the <u>payments system</u>. It also offers banking services to government"

To explain some introductory ideas Tim and Tanya explained the idea of 'Opportunity Cost'. Here's a scenario: you are invited to three parties. You'd like to go to all three but you can only go to one. Which do you choose? Whichever party you decide to spend your time at, comes at the cost of missing the other two parties. By choosing your 'favourite' you have decided attending this party is worth the cost of missing the opportunity of going to either of the others

People in all walks of life make decisions and choices from a range of options available to them every day. By going with their most preferred option, they are letting go of the alternatives (these alternatives are the missed opportunity, the cost, of the decision). Economics looks at how people and their societies make decisions around the expenditure of resources like time, money, water or any number of resources.

During the presentation, students watched a short video from on the bank's website

(<u>https://www.rba.gov.au/education/resources/economics/</u>) to answer the question "What is Economics". Briefly, the bank answers the question with: :

"Economics is commonly described as the study of how societies allocate limited resources to meet their needs and wants. It is about people making choices under conditions of scarcity and uncertainty. It is present in much of what we hear about and do in our daily lives"

Tim showed the students the new \$50 note weeks before it was released to the public. He shone a UV light onto the note to show off its security features. Some students in the group were so impressed they asked to take photos of the new currency.



The Reserve Bank has invested in developing a well resourced Education unit in order to increase the number of people studying economics in Australia. Warilla High will run a Commerce Elective 100 hour unit for Year 10 in 2019. The HSIE faculty are keen to see Economics offered on a senior subject line in 2020.

Assistant Governor Guy Dupelle explained to Miss Ryan last year that people do not have to be elite students to do Economics. In the past, there was a perception that you needed to go to an "Ivy League" privileged private school to gain access to the social networks that can bring success. This is no longer the case. The ambassadors who visited Warilla High were both educated at public high schools. Tanya is from the Illawarra and Tim is from The Shire.

Students keen to pursue the study of Economics or Commerce can begin today. People can begin to learn about economic issues just by taking an interest in the public affairs of their community and the wider world around them. They also need to be willing to read, listen and try to connect the dots around how decisions are made about who gets what in a world of limited resources.

Providing Warilla High School students with the opportunity to have these concepts explained to them might foster some inspiration to study Economics in the future, starting today.

Payments are made in January and July.

KINDY TO YEAR 10 students receive \$420 a year.

Year 11 and 12 students receive \$679 a year.



SCHOOL ENROLMENT POLICY

Warilla High School maintains an enrolment ceiling, based on available permanent accommodation and total numbers in each year group. Within the enrolment ceiling a buffer in each year group is maintained to accommodate local students arriving during the school year. Places in the buffer are not offered to non-local students. Feeder schools for Warilla High are Barrack Heights, Flinders, Shell Cove, Shellharbour and Warilla Public schools. Parents and carers are encouraged to contact the school to clarify the local zone for Warilla High School. It should be noted that non-local enrolments accepted by the primary school do not automatically guarantee an enrolment at Warilla High School. Such applications will be assessed as non-local applications.

Non-local application based on 'sibling rights' is not the sole determination in offering a position.

Placement Panel:

The placement panel will consider and make recommendations on all non-local enrolment applications.

- Year 6 into Year 7 enrolment applications: The Placement Panel consists of the Principal, the Deputy Principal with responsibility for that cohort the incoming year advisor and a SASS officer. The Principal is the chairperson and has the casting vote.
- Applications for enrolment into Years 8 -12, and Year 7 after the commencement of the school year: The panel consists of the Principal and the Deputy Principal responsible for the relevant year group. The panel is chaired by the Principal.
- This policy is endorsed by the Warilla High School P&C. All decisions are ratified by a representative
 of the P&C executive.

The decisions made by the placement panel are made within the context of the capacity of the school and the buffer retained for local students arriving later in the school year.

Criteria for Non-local Enrolment Applications:

- · Demonstrated leadership and commitment to school and learning.
- · Access learning, well-being and or extracurricular programs offered at Warilla High School
- Significant welfare issues.

Waiting Lists:

A waiting list will be established for non-local students seeking enrolment but unsuccessful in the first round of offers. The size of the list will reflect the realistic expectation that vacancies will become available.

Appeals:

If a parent/carer wishes to appeal a decision of the placement panel the appeal should be made to the Principal in writing. If an appeal cannot be resolved at the school level it will be referred to the School Education Director for the South Coast Group of Schools who will consider the appeal and make a determination.

High Attendance Equals High Achievement

What is a justified reason for being absent from school?

Justified reasons for absences may include if the student:

- has an <u>unavoidable</u> medical or dental appointment (preferably, these should be made after school
- or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious disease.

Absences for reasons such as some of the following may not be justified.

- Shopping
- Sleeping in
- Working around the house
- Minding younger siblings and other children
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Haircuts.

It is important to realise that parents (including carers) may be prosecuted if children have recurring unjustified absences from school.

Make Online Payments (POP)

Is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting <u>\$ Make a payment</u>

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered under the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the <u>\$ Make a payment</u> you must enter:

- The student's name, and
- class and reference number OR
- The student's name, and
- Date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

Warilla High School Bike Helmet Safety Policy

While riding a bicycle it is required by law to wear an (Australian Standard Approved) helmet securely fitted and fastened to your head.

Warilla High School has an obligation to enforce this law for the safety of their students when riding a bicycle to or from school.

Governed by Work Health & Safety, Duty of Care and NSW Law, Warilla High School cannot allow a student to ride a bicycle to or from the school premises without a helmet.
