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Principal's Message

I will begin this newsletter by reassuring you Mr Hambly is well and enjoying a very well deserved two weeks leave before the holidays. He has gone to warmer parts and is hopefully relaxing a little. I am lucky enough to only do his job every now and then and when I do I realise how lucky Warilla High is to have such a hard-working Principal.

The last newsletter I started the Deputies' item with a welcome to the cooler weather and all that this entails. I can change that to welcome to the cold weather!!! It is difficult to believe that we have some students still wearing short sleeves like it was summer, and then those that are wearing variations with hoodies underneath. From the school's point of view, it means lots of students coming to learn while being warm and cosy in the great school jumpers and jackets and a few that need our help and a reminder of what is acceptable at Warilla High School. The wearing of hoodies with long sleeves and then putting the school shirt over the top is not acceptable. Wearing lots of layers is a great way to stay rugged up, but things such as short sleeve T-shirts underneath and the school jacket on top are the acceptable option. Similarly, plain dark blue tracksuit pants are a great way to stay warm, but not if they have one leg emblazoned with a brand name on it. The aim of school uniform is to allow all students to feel equal no matter what their financial position. The brand names that some students seem so fond of are considerably more expensive to purchase than the school uniform. If you have difficulty in affording uniform please just ask the school for help, as it is done without any fuss.

Warilla High is highly invested in teaching our students the values of Excellence, Respect, Integrity and Compassion. Many of our students regularly display these values and they are a credit to the school and their families. So, it is really disappointing to hear that despite our efforts to make these values part of our everyday life that some students haven't taken this on board. Recently, we had students complaining of racist comments being made to them in the playground. Judging others based appearance such as skin colour or gender is illegal, and if you practice this outside of the school it is a fineable offence. Please help us reinforce that negative comments about people's race are not acceptable at any time.

As you may have seen on our Facebook page the bus companies have renamed their bus routes. Most of these are similar in number but have a capital "S" at the start. They have done this so that they have a similar system across the state. If your child catches a bus you might mention to them that the numbers are changing but the routes they travel will remain unchanged.

I was shocked the other day when I heard someone say it is six months until Christmas when we have only just seemed to have had one. So that means we are halfway through the school year. Teachers have been very busy writing reports and all Years will have had them issued before the end of the term. Please take time to read them and have a chat with your student about what they have done well and maybe places they might work a bit harder next term. The first day back next term is a School Development Day, with only staff attending, and students begin on Tuesday 24th July. Have a great holiday and I hope you manage to find a warm spot to enjoy this two weeks.

All parents are encouraged to take the opportunity to attend the parent-teacher information evenings and to book an appointment via the parent portal. This is a very good opportunity to personally meet your child's teachers in order to get an accurate appraisal of their progress - Yr.'s 10, 11 & 12 have already had their parent-teacher evening in the last fortnight, which proved to be very enjoyable & informative for all those attending, despite the very wet and cold weather.

The year 7 camp took place in the last fortnight with 170 students travelling to the North Narrabeen sport and recreation centre for three days of adventurous activities, such as rock climbing, abseiling, canoeing, archery, high ropes and zip lining, as well as trust and team building activities. All students and staff were worn out by the end of the camp, which also encouraged the students to look after each other by doing shared chores such as, helping to prepare and serve meals, cleaning up after the meals and keeping their shared dormitories in a clean and tidy state. A big thank you to all staff who helped to supervise and make this such an enjoyable time for everyone involved.

Last week saw the first of the bi-annual Gold Awards ceremony taking place, with awards recipients from Year 8 through to Year 12 receiving awards for outstanding behaviour and thus extolling the virtues of our student code of conduct (ERIC), which stands for:

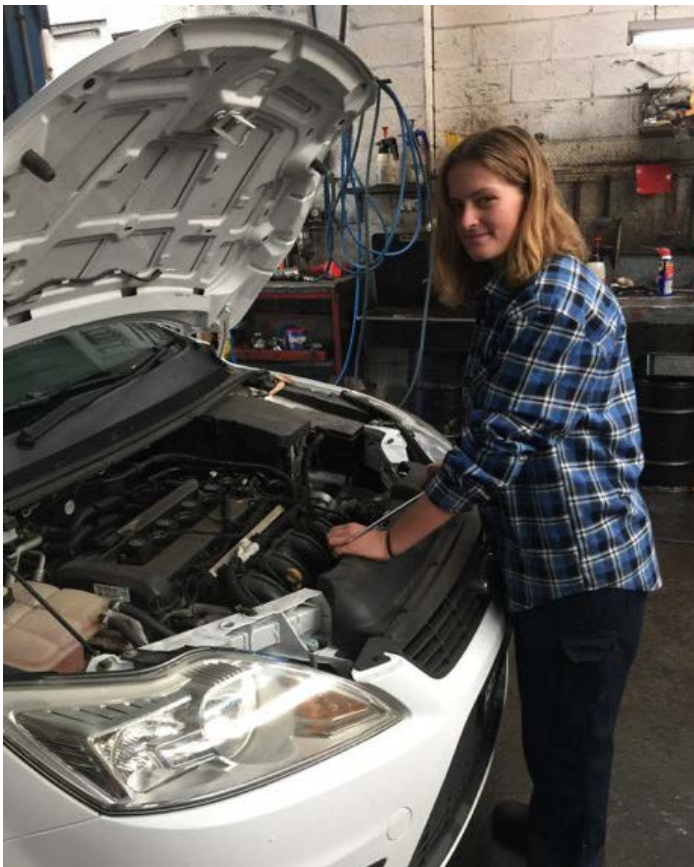
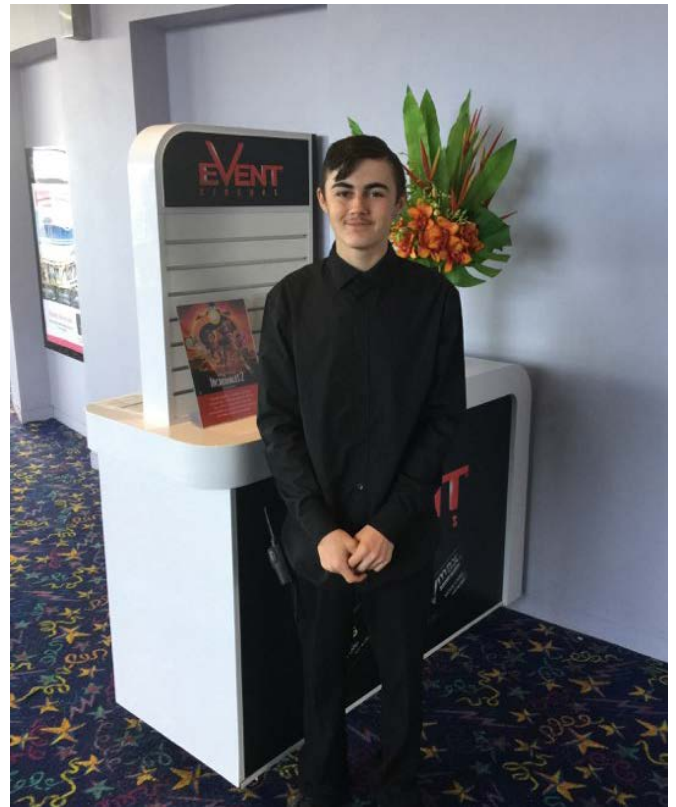


Work Experience

Remember to come prepared, having already looked up the syllabus and know what each subject involves.

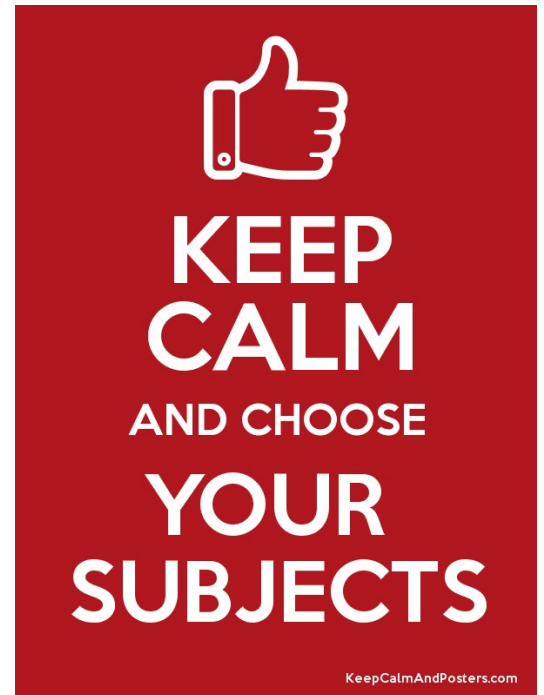

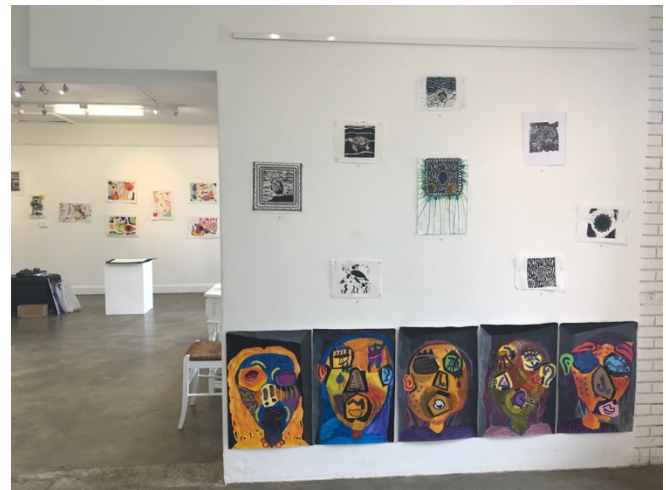

2018 has marked another successful year for the lawn bowlers of Warilla High School. This year's Triples Championship took place at Glenwood Bowling Club in the Blue Mountains over two days on Wednesday 13th and Thursday 14th June. The team changed with Toby Peters and Jayden Gebbie both unavailable we called upon Kade Lopez and Daniel Davies from year 8 to step into the team and Nathan Sopher from year 12 moved into the vital skipper role for the sectional play for the Wednesday's matches.

The first match was against Brisbane Waters Secondary College – Umina Campus with a 14-9 victory followed by a 9-7 victory against Camden High School. After lunch, we had a challenging match up against Hunter Sports High School, who was also undefeated. The boys established an early lead but in the later ends of the match, Hunter Sports mounted a thrilling comeback. What was to later become the shot of tournament Nathan Sopher who was 6 shots downplayed a stunning bowl to split the shot bowls and sit for a single shot. This helped the team qualify for the Finals day on Thursday.

Thursday welcomed back Toby Peters to the team as the skip with Nathan Sopher moving back into his role as Lead and Daniel Davies staying in his position as the second. The first match was against Kempsey High School saw some great shots played by both sides and this led to the scores level at the end of the play, leading to an extra end. We were fortunate enough to win setting up a final against Hunter River High School.

The final was a close match with the skip from the Hunter Riverside playing some excellent bowls to save shots, but Warilla High eventually pulled away creating a 3 shot lead into the last end and winning a fifth consecutive state title 9-7 in the final.

As the manager/coach of the side, I would like to thank Kade Lopez, Daniel Davies, Nathan Sopher and Toby Peters for the outstanding level of sportsmanship and etiquette they demonstrated against quality opponents. I would also like to thank all the parents especially Cheryl Sopher for her support over the two days.

Over the past five years, I have had a fantastic opportunity to manage and coach a great group of students. I also need to acknowledge the work done by Leif Selby the Junior Development coach at Warilla Bowling Club for his outstanding work in turning Warilla High School students into high calibre Lawn Bowlers. I would liken the setup with Warilla Bowling Club to having State of Origin Coach Brad Filter coaching the school Rugby League team.

Finally, I would like to conclude this report by quoting a post placed onto the CHS Lawn Bowls Facebook page by CHS Lawn Bowls convener Gavin Holburn, following our win this year. His words are a reflection of the tremendous achievement we have achieved over the past 5 years

“It is a very difficult task in world sport to back up a championship in consecutive years and I have always admired any side/player who can do it. Warilla High today won their 5th consecutive NSW CHS State Triples Championship in a row. An impressive feat for sure, but to have a different side every year in a 3-player event, to have (arguably) your best 2 players unavailable through sectional play and compete against the cream of NSW bowlers undefeated - an amazing long-term record that may well never be repeated. Warilla High deserve huge accolades for having such a high level and sustainable program in our sport, and obviously the benchmark that other schools can only strive to mirror.”

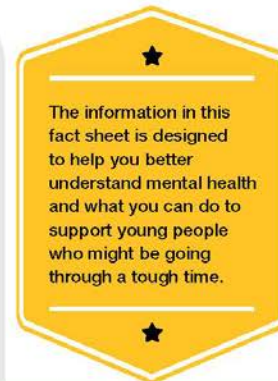
Changes in young people

Young people can go through many different changes as they grow up. Raising sensitive issues and resolving problems that arise along the way can be challenging for them.

It can often be hard as a parent to know the difference between normal behaviour, such as

occasional moodiness and irritability, and an emerging mental health problem.

If a young person develops a mental health problem it is important that they get support from both their family and friends and health professionals.



Mental health and mental health problems in young people

Good mental health is about being able to work and study to your full potential, cope with day-to-day life stresses, be involved in your community and live life in a free and satisfying way.

A young person who has good mental health has good emotional and social wellbeing and the capacity to cope with change and challenges.

Feeling down, tense, angry, anxious or moody are all normal emotions for young people, but when these feelings persist for long periods of time, or if they begin to interfere with their daily life, they may be part of a mental health problem. Mental health problems can also influence how young people think and their ability to function in their everyday activities, whether at school, at work or in relationships.

If you think you know a young person whose mental health is getting in the way of their daily life, it is important to let them know you are there to support them.



Warning signs

Most parents can tell when something is out of the ordinary, but there are also signs that suggest a young person might be experiencing a mental health problem. These are new, noticeable and persistent changes in the young person, lasting at least a few weeks, including:

Not enjoying, or not wanting to be involved in things that they would normally enjoy	Changes in appetite or sleeping patterns	Being easily irritated or angry for no reason	Their performance at school, TAFE, university or work is not as good as it should be or as it once was
Involving themselves in risky behaviour that they would usually avoid, like taking drugs or drinking too much alcohol	Experiencing difficulties with their concentration	Seeming unusually stressed, worried, down or crying for no reason	Expressing negative, distressing, bizarre or unusual thoughts

SCHOOL ENROLMENT POLICY

Warilla High School maintains an enrolment ceiling, based on available permanent accommodation and total numbers in each year group. Within the enrolment ceiling a buffer in each year group is maintained to accommodate local students arriving during the school year. Places in the buffer are not offered to non-local students. Feeder schools for Warilla High are Barrack Heights, Flinders, Shell Cove, Shellharbour and Warilla Public schools. Parents and carers are encouraged to contact the school to clarify the local zone for Warilla High School. It should be noted that non-local enrolments accepted by the primary school do not automatically guarantee an enrolment at Warilla High School. Such applications will be assessed as non-local applications.

Non-local application based on 'sibling rights' is not the sole determination in offering a position.

Placement Panel:

The placement panel will consider and make recommendations on all non-local enrolment applications.

- Year 6 into Year 7 enrolment applications: The Placement Panel consists of the Principal, the Deputy Principal with responsibility for that cohort the incoming year advisor and a SASS officer. The Principal is the chairperson and has the casting vote.
- Applications for enrolment into Years 8 -12, and Year 7 after the commencement of the school year: The panel consists of the Principal and the Deputy Principal responsible for the relevant year group. The panel is chaired by the Principal.
- This policy is endorsed by the Warilla High School P&C. All decisions are ratified by a representative of the P&C executive.

The decisions made by the placement panel are made within the context of the capacity of the school and the buffer retained for local students arriving later in the school year.

Criteria for Non-local Enrolment Applications:

- Demonstrated leadership and commitment to school and learning.
- Access learning, well-being and or extracurricular programs offered at Warilla High School
- Significant welfare issues.

Waiting Lists:

A waiting list will be established for non-local students seeking enrolment but unsuccessful in the first round of offers. The size of the list will reflect the realistic expectation that vacancies will become available.

Appeals:

If a parent/carers wishes to appeal a decision of the placement panel the appeal should be made to the Principal in writing. If an appeal cannot be resolved at the school level it will be referred to the School Education Director for the South Coast Group of Schools who will consider the appeal and make a determination.

What is a justified reason for being absent from school?

Justified reasons for absences may include if the student:

- has an unavoidable medical or dental appointment (preferably, these should be made after school or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious disease.

Absences for reasons such as some of the following may not be justified.

- Shopping
- Sleeping in
- Working around the house
- Minding younger siblings and other children
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Haircuts.

It is important to realise that parents (including carers) may be prosecuted if children have recurring unjustified absences from school.

Make Online Payments (POP)

It is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the [school's website](#) by selecting \$ Make a payment

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered under the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the \$ Make a payment you must enter:

- The student's name, and
- class and reference number OR
- The student's name, and
- Date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

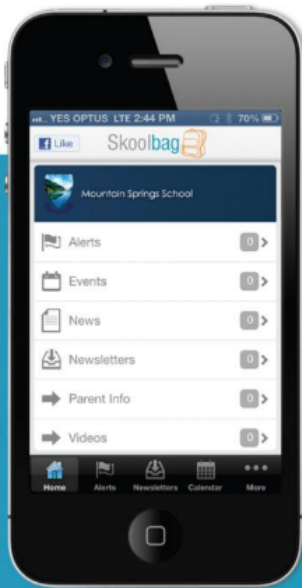

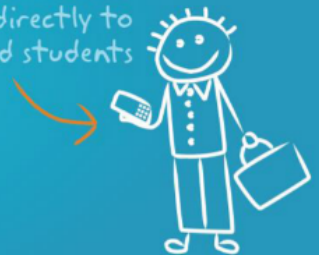

6. Click “Open” when installed.

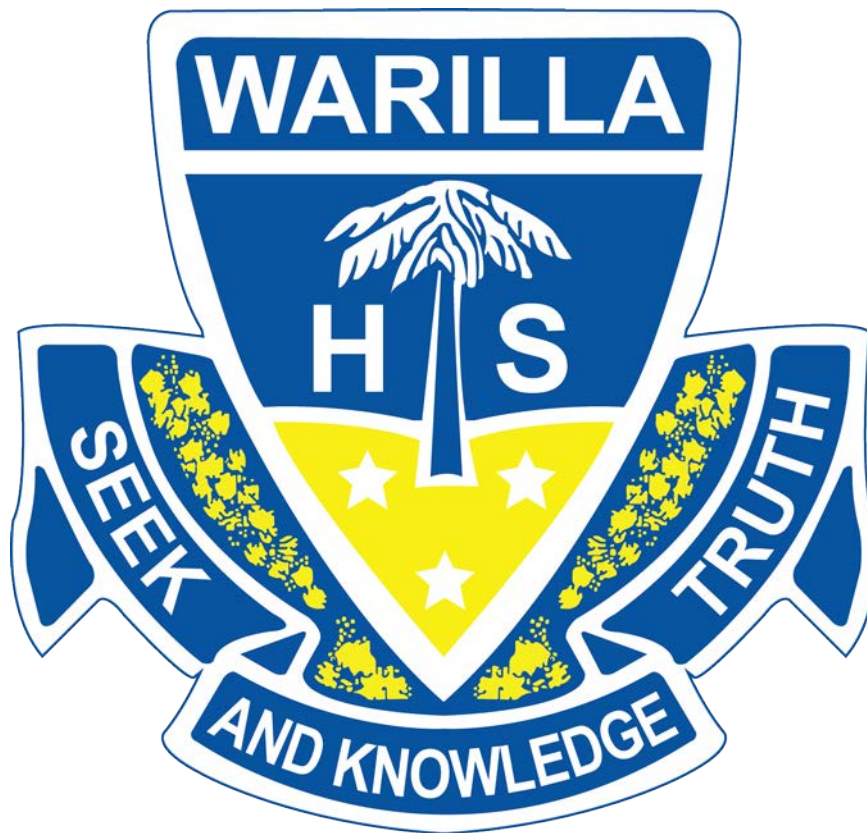
