Principal's Message

Hopefully, parents and care-providers took the opportunity to meet with teachers at the recent Parent-Teacher evenings. These meetings afforded the opportunity to discuss student learning, areas of concern and some pragmatic ways of improving student performance. It was also an opportunity to dissect aspects of the semester 1 reports and to gain clarification of areas that may not have been clear. Although we have designated times for formal meetings of this type, I would urge you to contact the school at any time to arrange to meet with particular staff should there be a need to do so. At the end of the day, we are all here to help our children succeed, with no partnership more important than that between home and the school!

Students in Year 10 are currently engaged in a process to inform the decisions they will make around courses on offer in Year 11, 2019. This process has included individualised meetings with our Careers Advisory team and the opportunity to take "senior" classes in an alternate timetable developed for that purpose. Given this has been complemented by information sessions about courses by subject based HT's and staff, I am sure the decisions about patterns of study will reflect attitude, aptitude, capacity and career trajectory. This process will be replicated- on a smaller scale- in the Year 8 elective processes as well.

The courses that will be undertaken in 2019 will be anchored in a 21st-century context and see our students challenged to apply their skills, competencies and knowledge to real life situations and problems. I am genuinely excited about the prospect of trailing virtual reality technology and how this will affect student learning. Likewise, our foray into Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) continues to grow in momentum. Teachers will maintain the professional understandings of these and other subject areas through a coordinated approach to professional learning, including working with academic partners from the University of Wollongong and the University of Sydney and the UTS.

The DOE Centre for Leadership has recently conducted a Case Study of our *Professional Learning Communities*, and how this has influenced the growth of students and staff. I would like to acknowledge the tireless efforts of Ms Pettit who has led our foray into this aspect of our operation.

In something of a coup, we have been able to engage Mr James Nottingham, a noted educator from the UK who currently works with over 350 schools across Scandinavia to explore learning theory and how current innovative best practice across the world can be accessed by our staff.

Our Year 12 students are currently undertaking Trail HSC examinations. In an attempt to replicate the real thing, we have employed the HSC Presiding Officer and his team of HSC supervisors to ensure student familiarity with the expectations, rules and protocols of the HSC proper. Early indications show this to have been very beneficial. I am hopeful that the *HSC Success Strategy* that has been deployed by the school will show evidence of impact when results are harvested over the next few weeks.

Finally, towards the end of the last term of Well-Being team conducted an off-site Summit, which has resulted in a raft of refinements to

existing practice and role descriptions. This team is vitally important in supporting students and providing the stability

The Trial exams are a practice and the feedback that teachers give their students is meant to help them see where they could improve. If your student is unsure, now is the time for them to ask their teachers for suggestions about ways they could improve their response. Practice essays or work examples are one way to improve. The school also provides tutoring and this is available for free after school, so this is another way to proactively work on improvement. Another important thing to remember is that while the exams are important, so too is a balance. There is life after the HSC so having a balanced approach helps create the right mindset. Support from home during this stressful year is such a valuable thing to offer your student. Help them keep good habits such as eating, sleeping, exercising and maintaining a balanced outlook are all vital to make this year so much easier. Sometimes Year 12 students find it difficult to get back into the study after their exams, please help them get back into the routine of school, homework and then study. Some students who do really well in the HSC are not "geniuses" but rather hard workers who consistently keep working.

Many of our Year 11 students are out on work placement with their VET subjects. It is wonderful when we have employers offering our students part-time work as a result of this experience. Last week we had an employer contact the school to tell us of the amazing work their work placement student was producing and mature behaviour they were demonstrating. I think both parents and teachers alike are so very proud when other people can confirm what outstanding students we have at Warilla High School.

Year 10 are also busy at the moment, as they get ready for the next year and the senior school. Last week we changed the Year 10 timetable to give them the opportunity to have a bit of a "taster" of the subjects they are hoping to select for 2019. Thanks to Mrs Hicks, Mrs Dawson and Mr Reid for their hard work around this exercise. All of Year 10 took part, even those who are hoping to secure employment at the end of the year. Now the students can more accurately work out if they liked the subjects they were considering – as research shows us that students perform far better in subjects that they like.

It doesn't seem to matter where you look great things are happening at Warilla, and we certainly are "Student-Centered – Outcomes Driven".

Dragons Defence Day



Senior School Experience

Mr Reid and staff put a lot of work into a three day taster session for Week 3 for the Year 10 students. They had an insight into the senior subjects they have chosen over three days. This gave the students an idea of what to expect during the course for the following two years. It was well received, and a lot of students appreciated the chance to sit in these subjects over the three days. - Can NOT attend the work experience if they have outstanding N warnings or work owing
- Can NOT attend work experience if they have an assessment task or assignment due
- WILL NOT be covered for insurance without the appropriate paperwork and without following DEC procedures.
- WILL NOT be allowed to complete work experience if they are misbehaving at school and on levels or monitoring cards.

Why is having a growth mindset important?


Research has shown that children who have a fixed mindset are more likely to:



HSC MINIMUM STANDARD TESTS

WHAT IS THE HSC MINIMUM STANDARD TESTS AND DO THEY APPLY TO MY CHILD?

Currently, a number of Year 10 students are sitting the HSC Minimum Standards Tests and there seems to be some confusion about who they apply to, why and are they compulsory?

A minimum standard of literacy and numeracy is required to receive the HSC from 2020 to reflect the importance of literacy and numeracy for success in daily life. HSC students will need to meet the HSC minimum standard in three areas – reading, writing and numeracy. The standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF), which means students will have the basic reading, writing and math skills needed for everyday tasks and future learning after school. It includes skills for tasks such as:

- following safety instructions in equipment manuals
- understanding a mobile phone plan
- writing a job application
- creating a personal weekly budget.

Literacy and numeracy skills are essential for success in learning and life after school. Together with the NSW Literacy and Numeracy Strategy, the HSC minimum standard is part of an effort to extend the literacy and numeracy focus up into secondary school.

Who needs to meet the HSC minimum standard?

If you are sitting the HSC in 2018 or 2019 you do not need to meet the HSC minimum standard. Any student in Year 10 2018 and below are required to sit these tests to receive their HSC certificate. Explicitly for:

Year 10 students

If you are in Year 10 this year (2018) and did not receive a Band 8 or above in the 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN tests you will need to take the minimum standard online tests between now and Year 12 to receive your HSC in 2020. If you achieved a Band 8 or above in one or more of the 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN tests you are recognised as having met the HSC minimum standard in that area/s and will not need to sit the corresponding online test/s.

Warilla High School has already participated in two sessions of HSC Minimum Standards test with great success in students meeting the minimum standard of Level 3 in these tests. Students who did not achieve a Level 3 have a report, which identifies the skills needed to meet this standard. The school will now work with these students to build their skills and knowledge before they re-attempt the examinations.

NESA opens the window for testing each term and so there will be continued opportunities for students to sit the tests over the year and into Year 11 and Year 12.

Year 9 students

From this year, Year 9 NAPLAN tests will no longer be available as an early way for students to demonstrate the standard. This change has been made to ensure NAPLAN remains focussed on its diagnostic purpose and to reduce unnecessary stress on young people. This means that Year 9 students will complete NAPLAN in 2018 and then when in Year 10 2019, will sit the HSC Minimum Standards Tests in all areas of reading, writing and numeracy to provide evidence of skills that demonstrate the minimal standard.

Exempt students

Where possible, all students in NSW should be supported to develop core literacy and numeracy skills required for success in life after school. Some students sitting the tests will be eligible for disability provisions or be exempt from meeting the HSC minimum standard in order to receive their HSC.

YEAR 7 AND 9 NAPLAN READINESS TESTS

Monday 6 August 2018

Parent/Carers

The National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is moving from a pen and paper assessment to an online assessment. To best prepare and plan for this assessment in 2019, schools across the State are participating in a NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test. The readiness test is a 'practice run' for schools to assess the technology ahead of the 2018 NAPLAN Online.

Warilla High School will be participating in this readiness test program in Week 6 this term and students from Years 7 and 9 will be sitting a 40minute online test. Year 7 will sit the Writing Test and Year 9 the Omnibus Test (which consists of language conventions, reading and numeracy). Students will sit these tests in class time with the assistance of a teacher and the school NAPLAN Coordinators – Mrs Glasgow and Ms Gaynor.

The benefit of these tests for students is that it will allow students to become familiar with the online test format and processes. Students will not need any academic preparation for the readiness test and the test does not contribute to or affect student 2018 NAPLAN results.

The online tests will be completed on the school computers and not individual student devices. This is because the assessment is delivered inside a locked-down browser, which will be installed on all computers. This ensures students cannot access the internet or spellcheckers while completing the test. Students will be well informed before the tests of the procedures and support will be provided for students were deemed necessary. An advantage of the online tests is that many of possible adjustments and accommodations used by students are built into the test program.

The benefit for the school of participating in the readiness tests is to ensure the technical capacity, rooms and devices will successfully administer NAPLAN Online in preparation for 2019.

What do the nurses do?

The nurses are there to help advise young people, allowing them to make educated, healthy choices.

A nurse has protected time on two afternoons a week to be available for drop-in consults with teenagers.

The nurse triages the teenagers, provides initial screening and/or health education and acts as a facilitator to General Practitioners and other providers as needed.

Teen Clinic nurses are required to attend essential training on a range of topics such as sexual health, mental health, suicide prevention, LGBTQI and community education.

Can adults come to Teen Clinic?

Teenagers can present to *Teen Clinic* on their own or with someone else.

Some teenagers come along with a friend and others come with a parent or a guardian.

It is up to the individual if they want someone to accompany them to *Teen Clinic*.

All *Teen Clinic* patients are encouraged to follow up with their usual GP to ensure that there is continuity of care.

The SRC, Koori students, sports coaching students and Mr Delaney ran NAIDOC Week celebration activities for Year 7, on Friday 27th July.



SCHOOL ENROLMENT POLICY

Warilla High School maintains an enrolment ceiling, based on available permanent accommodation and total numbers in each year group. Within the enrolment ceiling a buffer in each year group is maintained to accommodate local students arriving during the school year. Places in the buffer are not offered to non-local students. Feeder schools for Warilla High are Barrack Heights, Flinders, Shell Cove, Shellharbour and Warilla Public schools. Parents and carers are encouraged to contact the school to clarify the local zone for Warilla High School. It should be noted that non-local enrolments accepted by the primary school do not automatically guarantee an enrolment at Warilla High School. Such applications will be assessed as non-local applications.

Non-local application based on 'sibling rights' is not the sole determination in offering a position.

Placement Panel:

The placement panel will consider and make recommendations on all non-local enrolment applications.

- Year 6 into Year 7 enrolment applications: The Placement Panel consists of the Principal, the
 Deputy Principal with responsibility for that cohort the incoming year advisor and a SASS officer.
 The Principal is the chairperson and has the casting vote.
- Applications for enrolment into Years 8 -12, and Year 7 after the commencement of the school
 year: The panel consists of the Principal and the Deputy Principal responsible for the relevant year
 group. The panel is chaired by the Principal.
- This policy is endorsed by the Warilla High School P&C. All decisions are ratified by a representative
 of the P&C executive.

The decisions made by the placement panel are made within the context of the capacity of the school and the buffer retained for local students arriving later in the school year.

Criteria for Non-local Enrolment Applications:

- · Demonstrated leadership and commitment to school and learning.
- Access learning, well-being and or extracurricular programs offered at Warilla High School
- · Significant welfare issues.

Waiting Lists:

A waiting list will be established for non-local students seeking enrolment but unsuccessful in the first round of offers. The size of the list will reflect the realistic expectation that vacancies will become available.

Appeals:

If a parent/carer wishes to appeal a decision of the placement panel the appeal should be made to the Principal in writing. If an appeal cannot be resolved at the school level it will be referred to the School Education Director for the South Coast Group of Schools who will consider the appeal and make a determination.

High Attendance Equals High Achievement

What is a justified reason for being absent from school?

Justified reasons for absences may include if the student:

- has an <u>unavoidable</u> medical or dental appointment (preferably, these should be made after school
- or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious disease.

Absences for reasons such as some of the following may not be justified.

- Shopping
- Sleeping in
- Working around the house
- Minding younger siblings and other children
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Haircuts.

It is important to realise that parents (including carers) may be prosecuted if children have recurring unjustified absences from school.

Make Online Payments (POP)

Is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting \$ Make a payment

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered under the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the \$ Make a payment you must enter:

- The student's name, and
- class and reference number OR
- The student's name, and
- Date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

Warilla High School Bike Helmet Safety Policy


