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Principal's Message

Like me, I am sure you were bitterly disappointed with recent social media commentary which leapt into the local and national news, associating the school with a student survey that was linked to a year 10 event that is not under the control or auspices of the school. The authors of the survey made no prior comment to the school about its suitability, worth or intent. Anyone who has dealt with this fine school knows we value sensitivity, compassion and respect in all that we do, and that this is the bedrock upon which our values education agenda rests. I saw nothing in this survey that reflected our values and again I reject anything that will cause needless embarrassment and/or ridicule. I have written to our broader community in response to this incident, a copy of which is attached to this newsletter. The school has responded on a number of fronts, including a refinement of our *Mobile Phone and Social Media Policy*, and a review of our Anti-Bullying program. Our P&C have endorsed this position and I look forward to updating them on our progress in this area.

Despite this issue taking some of the gloss off our recent achievements, it is with a great deal of pride that I attended the 2018 Minsters and Secretary's Awards for Excellence recently. This was a blue-ribbon event held at the Sydney Town Hall which saw the best of the best from across NSW honoured for their commitment, dedication and professionalism. Our own Renee Pettit received a Minister's Award for Excellence in Teaching, which recognised teachers who deliver the highest quality education to their students and contribute to their professional communities. We are certainly lucky to have Renee on the team!

Likewise, two of our staff-Cass Napier and Mel Lever- undertook external observations by representatives from the *NSW Education Standards Authority* (NESA) as part of the *Highly Accomplished* accreditation they seek. Both teachers were impeccable, with the NESA Rep's anecdotal commentary describing both teachers as amongst the best they had seen. Professor John Hattie's research is often cited by educationalists, and used as the justification for expenditure and professional development priorities. His research verified the long held belief that, "...excellent teaching is the single most powerful influence on student achievement." Again, we are extremely lucky to have teachers such as Mel and Cass who are operating as role models and providing demonstrable scaffolding for colleagues to view what pedagogy at the highest level of the National Teaching Standards looks like. Well done!

Our Year 12 cohort have reviewed their Trial HSC results and are now gearing up for the final test- the HSC proper. It is imperative that students use this final window of opportunity to refine their understandings of the various concepts and competencies demanded of their different courses and patterns of study with a view to finalising a study routine that will get them to where they need to be. Hopefully, distractions such as the Year 12 Farwell will be consigned to the background as study, study and more study consume the final weeks leading into their Exams. I have every confidence that well prepared students will give a very good account of themselves.

Our 2018 NAPLAN results have only just hit the school and I look forward to providing a detailed commentary on these results in the next newsletter.

I was absolutely delighted to see the success of our *Tournament of the Minds* Teams with the STEM Team taking outright honours on the

day by successfully negotiating a range of problems developed by the organisers. Such tournaments support the development of problem solving skills, collaboration, creativity and the utilisation of technology- exactly what our 21st century learning skills priorities demand.

On the staffing scene, there has been some movement, with Mrs Glasgow our Acting HT Teaching and Learning moving back to her substantive position at Figtree HS from the beginning of 2019. Her Acting position here will be



taken up by Ms Lever. Mr Quach of the Maths Department has accepted a service transfer, as has Ms Haselton, one of our School Counsellors. I anticipate more staffing news as we begin to finalise our timetable and organisation, ready for 2019.

Deputies Report

This year is speeding by and we are now at the three quarter mark.

With so much time having gone by we are also at that point where we are getting results back, and I would like to talk to you about NAPLAN. I don't intend on saying anything political, but rather personal. As Deputies we get to see that there are some wonderful students who despite their very best efforts sometimes struggle with examinations. Sometimes the very strict conditions or the formality of examinations brings out anxiety, which we do our best to counter by having small groups and counselling the students. However, some students still find exams difficult, and often because of their anxiety find it hard to concentrate and give their best to the exam. The same or similar tasks they can perform in a classroom without the pressure of it being an "important exam". The Department of Education also agrees that NAPLAN testing reveals a student's ability at one point in time and that it is a "snap shot" of the Yr 7 and Yr 9 students. The real purpose of NAPLAN testing is to give the teachers a measure as to how a student is progressing, so that they can change their teaching to suit the students' needs. Bearing all of this in mind, if your student has done well in their NAPLAN testing, congratulations and well done!!! However, if you are disappointed in their results bear in mind that is not a total assessment, but one day at one time. It does not measure their honesty, their reliability or their character, it is not a range of skills and how much they have improved, but rather a narrow set of skills at one point in time. So enjoy the results for your student if they are good and be very proud of their efforts, but remember there are many ways to be smart.

Enjoy the break, we will all meet back here day next term, as there is no School Development day we all come back on the Monday 15th October.

NAPLAN RESULTS

Year 7 and Year 9 NAPLAN parent reports were issued to students on Monday 17 September. If your child was absent from school this day, they can be collected from Mrs Glasgow in B3.

Please remember that NAPLAN results are a snapshot of a student's performance on one test type on one day. These results are important to our school as they guide the planning and direction of literacy and numeracy teaching and learning strategies across the school. These results certainly provide a guide to your child's progress and achievement but the school report which accesses a number of assessment strategies over a significant period of time provides a more accurate picture.

With the current national situation in terms of test delivery with some school participating on-line tests and others with the paper tests, schools are yet to receive any data in terms of student performance. Once this data is received the school will continue its commitment to analysis results to best support all student performance both individually and as a cohort.

Sun Smart – Personal Protection



It's that time again! Hot, sunny weather and Sun Smart – Personal Protection

As we head into the beautiful hot weather and outdoor sports and activities it's time to think about being *Sun Smart* – Julia Herman RN, School Nurse, Warilla HS – Monday, Wednesday & Thursday.

Personal Protection for you and your family includes –

- minimising time in the sun between 10am and 3pm
- Slip on clothing dark, close weave, with a collar will help block out UVR. For swimming Lycra products with a Sun Smart design are effective. Look for UPF (ultraviolet protection factor)
- Slop on sunscreen SPF 30+, broad-spectrum, water-resistant, check use by date.
- Slap on a hat close weave with a brim
- Seek shade can reduce up to 75% of your UVR exposure
- Slide on sunglasses eye protection important to reduce risk of skin cancer on eyelids and development of degenerative changes on the eye surface
- Using the SunSmart UV Alert issued through BOM (Bureau of Meteorology) on their website or in daily newspapers it is based on the Global Solar UV index. UV radiation can cause damage to your skin and eyes which may lead to skin cancer. When UV Alert times apply, you need to use sun protection. UV Index =Moderate 3-5, High 6-7, Very High 8-10 and Extreme 11+.

Sun Fitness for Kids and Teens

You want your children to have an active and healthy lifestyle, with plenty of outdoor exercise. But what about the risk of skin damage? Don't live your life inside — you and your family can be fit *and* sun-safe.



Every day, parents are bombarded with conflicting advice on what is best for their children. Children aren't exercising enough — get them outside! Children are at risk for skin cancer — get them inside! It can be confusing. But the truth is, your family members can enjoy a healthy, physically fit lifestyle without endangering their skin — if you all practice good sun protection habits.

Teens

Teens are under enormous pressure to dress, talk, and look a certain way. Sometimes, no matter how much they know about the dangers of tanning, they'll still seek a tan in order to conform.

If your teen must be tan, teach him or her about self-tanners. New self-tanning lotions and creams can duplicate a natural glow without exposing you to harmful UV rays. They've improved immensely over the past few years and won't turn you orange anymore. But remember, a self-tanner must always be used along with a sunscreen.

Your teen should know that being tan does not mean being healthy. **Make sunscreen application part of his or her daily routine.** Keep the sunscreen out in the open in the bathroom, next to the toothpaste, as a physical reminder. If your kid is involved in after-school sports, make sure a bottle of sunscreen is always in his/her equipment bag. Most physical education classes in school take place outside when the weather permits, as does recess, so make sure your kid keeps a bottle of sunscreen in her regular locker or gym locker.

Sun safety doesn't condemn you to life indoors. **If you love the beach, go early or late in the day, when the sun's rays are less intense**. Take a supply of sunscreen that has an **SPF of 30** or greater. Wear attractive sun-protective clothing and a wide-brimmed hat, and carry a beach umbrella. And don't forget sunglasses to protect your eyes.

The most important thing to remember when thinking about sun protection is this: **you are your children's role model**. Be sure to let them see you protecting yourself from the sun. If you have great skin, so will they.

Not only is it for their benefit with courses, information, teacher specific information, but it is a life skill for students entering the workforce.

EVENT 2019

Studying with externally delivered vocational providers for students in Year 11 and 12 in 2019.

Tracy has emailed ALL current students in Year 10 and Year 11 who may be interested in studying an EVET course as part of your HSC pattern in 2019.

They have been emailed a summary of courses on offer, provider and location details.

The student then has to come and have a one on one interview with the Careers Team to submit the Expression of Interest form.

While the student fills in this forms, this EOI doesn't guarantee them a position in the course. They find out in November if they have been successful in gaining a position. We have no control over what courses are run, as this is done by an external body who allocate funds to courses for all students across the region.

In order to do an EVET course in 2019 you:

- Must be able to get yourself to and from the venue
- Agree to commit and complete the course
- Attend the work placements set for your course (if it applies.)
- Understand you may miss part or a whole day of school and it is YOUR responsibility to catch up on work missed at school.

Don't stress!! If you're not able to get there or feel you're not ready, there is an option for you to pick up a course in Year 12.

SCHOOL ENROLMENT POLICY

Warilla High School maintains an enrolment ceiling, based on available permanent accommodation and total numbers in each year group. Within the enrolment ceiling a buffer in each year group is maintained to accommodate local students arriving during the school year. Places in the buffer are not offered to non-local students. Feeder schools for Warilla High are Barrack Heights, Flinders, Shell Cove, Shellharbour and Warilla Public schools. Parents and carers are encouraged to contact the school to clarify the local zone for Warilla High School. It should be noted that non-local enrolments accepted by the primary school do not automatically guarantee an enrolment at Warilla High School. Such applications will be assessed as non-local applications.

Non-local application based on 'sibling rights' is not the sole determination in offering a position.

Placement Panel:

The placement panel will consider and make recommendations on all non-local enrolment applications.

- Year 6 into Year 7 enrolment applications: The Placement Panel consists of the Principal, the Deputy Principal with responsibility for that cohort the incoming year advisor and a SASS officer. The Principal is the chairperson and has the casting vote.
- <u>Applications for enrolment into Years 8 -12, and Year 7 after the commencement of the school year:</u> The panel consists of the Principal and the Deputy Principal responsible for the relevant year group. The panel is chaired by the Principal.
- This policy is endorsed by the Warilla High School P&C. All decisions are ratified by a representative
 of the P&C executive.

The decisions made by the placement panel are made within the context of the capacity of the school and the buffer retained for local students arriving later in the school year.

Criteria for Non-local Enrolment Applications:

- · Demonstrated leadership and commitment to school and learning.
- · Access learning, well-being and or extracurricular programs offered at Warilla High School
- Significant welfare issues.

Waiting Lists:

A waiting list will be established for non-local students seeking enrolment but unsuccessful in the first round of offers. The size of the list will reflect the realistic expectation that vacancies will become available.

Appeals:

If a parent/carer wishes to appeal a decision of the placement panel the appeal should be made to the Principal in writing. If an appeal cannot be resolved at the school level it will be referred to the School Education Director for the South Coast Group of Schools who will consider the appeal and make a determination.

High Attendance Equals High Achievement

What is a justified reason for being absent from school?

Justified reasons for absences may include if the student:

- has an <u>unavoidable</u> medical or dental appointment (preferably, these should be made after school
- or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious disease.

Absences for reasons such as some of the following may not be justified.

- Shopping
- Sleeping in
- Working around the house
- Minding younger siblings and other children
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Haircuts.

It is important to realise that parents (including carers) may be prosecuted if children have recurring unjustified absences from school.

Make Online Payments (POP)

Is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting <u>\$ Make a payment</u>

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered under the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the <u>\$ Make a payment</u> you must enter:

- The student's name, and
- class and reference number OR
- The student's name, and
- Date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

Warilla High School Bike Helmet Safety Policy

While riding a bicycle it is required by law to wear an (Australian Standard Approved) helmet securely fitted and fastened to your head.

Warilla High School has an obligation to enforce this law for the safety of their students when riding a bicycle to or from school.

Governed by Work Health & Safety, Duty of Care and NSW Law, Warilla High School cannot allow a student to ride a bicycle to or from the school premises without a helmet.

Therefore, if a student arrives at school without wearing a helmet then the school will be required to secure that bicycle until that student presents themselves with an approved safety helmet or the student's parents come and retrieve the bike.
