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### **Principal's Message**

With the best part of half a term under our belt, most students –especially Year 7- have settled into their new routines well and are developing the relationships with their teachers that will allow them to thrive and succeed. This is crucial to our Stage 6 students in particular who are preparing for Preliminary and HSC accreditation.

I have addressed both Year 11 and 12 to stress the point that consistent and regular home study is the key to a successful HSC. We do a lot of work with kids in teaching effective study habits, but this will be for naught unless they develop a study routine that is set in stone. I would also encourage your attendance at our advertised Parent Information workshops on Study Skills. Mr Smart is our coordinator, and he can field any inquiries you may have.

Our teaching and learning target and primary focus is of ensuring high expectations are in place; that explicit teaching is the norm, and that effective feedback is provided for all students. The recent research around student success indicates these three elements are the most vital ingredients for sustained and ongoing student growth.

Our work in this domain will be enhanced as we have secured the services of James Nottingham- an internationally recognised learning theorist who will be working with our staff at a twilight session to be held on 30 April in the school hall between 3:15 pm and 7 pm. I am hopeful that this work will result in a range of key strategies teachers can deploy in their classrooms to unlock learning outcomes for our kids.

There has been some degree of speculation in our community with regard to the growth of the Shell Cove precinct and the DOE's plans to cater for future enrolment demand. The P&C has been proactive in this area and have invited the Director of Schools to address them on this subject. The Director will be attending the P&C meeting on 14 May to take up this issue...it may be a date you want to circle in your calendar!

As you would be aware, the absolute bedrock of our operation is a zero tolerance policy with regard to violence. Unfortunately, we have had some students who wanted to test my resolve around this belief. They have been suspended with one student's position the subject of consideration of expulsion. Again, I would be very appreciative if you could reinforce with your child their obligations in this area to ensure we have the harmonious relationships between students that have been a hallmark of our school for many years.

Finally, I look forward to seeing you all at our P&C meetings on the second Tuesday of each month commencing at 6 pm in the Library.

This was a great day, with a great variety of traditional events, coupled with some novelty and fun activities to complete the day. Congratulations to all of the students who attended, your behaviour and enthusiasm are exactly what was expected from Warilla High School students. A massive thank you to the coordinators of the carnival this year, Mr Cairncross and Mr Harrison, as well as all of the staff who supported the event. A final congratulations to PARKES who managed to take out the first of the carnival wins for 2019.

We have already seen the Student Representative Council induction for 2019, where students elected to these positions were presented with their badges, in preparation for a busy year. The SRC are a very proactive organisation within the student body, and I am sure with the support of the SRC coordinator, Ms Gehrels, 2019 will be no different. Well done to all of the new SRC representatives.

As you know, NAPLAN will be conducted online during Term 2 this year. Students in Year 7 and Year 9 will be participating.


Under certain circumstances, students with a disability are eligible to have adjustments to support their participation in NAPLAN assessments.





Year 10 will be shortly starting their introduction careers lessons, and get their information about the Illawarra School Careers Expo. ### WORK EXPERIENCE

Each term, students from Year 9 and 10 have access to work experience on either one of two weeks available at the end of term 2 and 4. Once they have completed a Ready2work work experience workshop with Tracy and Sharna, they then understand the legal requirements and protocols they must follow to complete work experience. They are taught how to source work experience, assistance with how to speak to an employer, sorting out insurance papers, etc. As long as the student does not have any clashing assignments, assessment tasks, and follows the code of good behaviour here at WHS, they are more than welcome to explore the world of work for a week. *Put your name down in the Careers Room if you need to complete the workshop first*. Work experience dates for Year 9-10 in Term 2 are Week 7 and 9.

Students in Year 11 and 12 can negotiate work experience with the careers team. Work experience is a great way to check out a career pathway or get your foot in the door for a casual job.

### What is Reconnect?

Reconnect is for a Year 10, 11 or 12 student who feels they want to explore the option of full-time study or employment in preference to staying at school. The students are withdrawn from two lessons per week into small groups to explore options that are suited to their pathway. Topics covered in the ten-week program include: Occupation testing, Illawarra industry snapshot, study options, wages and the cost of living, where the jobs are, budgeting, what employers are after, group interview techniques, access to white card courses, tax file numbers, guest speakers, work experience, resume and cover letter development, etc. If you feel your child would benefit from this and is in Year 10 or Year 11 or 12, please contact Sharna to be put into the Term 2 group.





### First Aid / Sick Bay - School Nurse at Warilla High School.

First Aid / Sick Bay Registered Nurse's Clinic Hours:

Monday - 9am – 2pm

Tuesday – students attend Front Office for sickbay

Wednesday – 9 am – 2 pm

Thursday – 9 am – 2 pm

Friday – students attend Front Office for sickbay

(Students are requested to attend the Front office outside of these hours if they require sick bay assistance and/or first aid.)



The First Aid / Sickbay clinic in E block operates as a 'Triage' for unwell and injured students with assessment, treatment and referral as required.

- In providing First Aid and initial injury and illness management for students, a number of options are used. This can be hot/cold packs, asthma support, eye wash, cleaning and dressing of wounds and bandaging.
- Parents are notified by telephone of students who attend First Aid/sickbay and can be requested to take the student home or for further medical treatments.
- OPT OUT option for parents

If you would prefer your student(s) **not** to have any of the treatments offered by the R.N. could you please let the Principal or Front Office staff know by telephone or written request.

Treatments that can be offered to students include:-

- Eyewash for first aid removal of a foreign body in the eye.
- Eye Lubricant for sore eyes
- Fisiocrem with Arnica, Hypericum and Calendula for temporary relief of muscular aches and pains
- Stingose calms and soothes pain, itching and swelling from insect bites
- Calamine lotion soothes and protects skin from itching caused by insect bites.
- Tea Tree oil diluted for wound care.

Please feel free to contact me if you wish to discuss the care of your student(s) when at school and in the care of First Aid / Sickbay.



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### SCHOOL ENROLMENT POLICY

Warilla High School maintains an enrolment ceiling, based on available permanent accommodation and total numbers in each year group. Within the enrolment ceiling a buffer in each year group is maintained to accommodate local students arriving during the school year. Places in the buffer are not offered to non-local students. Feeder schools for Warilla High are Barrack Heights, Flinders, Shell Cove, Shellharbour and Warilla Public schools. Parents and carers are encouraged to contact the school to clarify the local zone for Warilla High School. It should be noted that non-local enrolments accepted by the primary school do not automatically guarantee an enrolment at Warilla High School. Such applications will be assessed as non-local applications.

Non-local application based on 'sibling rights' is not the sole determination in offering a position.

### **Placement Panel:**

The placement panel will consider and make recommendations on all non-local enrolment applications.

- Year 6 into Year 7 enrolment applications: The Placement Panel consists of the Principal, the Deputy Principal with responsibility for that cohort the incoming year advisor and a SASS officer. The Principal is the chairperson and has the casting vote.
- Applications for enrolment into Years 8 -12, and Year 7 after the commencement of the school year: The panel consists of the Principal and the Deputy Principal responsible for the relevant year group. The panel is chaired by the Principal.
- This policy is endorsed by the Warilla High School P&C. All decisions are ratified by a representative
  of the P&C executive.

The decisions made by the placement panel are made within the context of the capacity of the school and the buffer retained for local students arriving later in the school year.

### **Criteria for Non-local Enrolment Applications:**

- · Demonstrated leadership and commitment to school and learning.
- Access learning, well-being and or extracurricular programs offered at Warilla High School
- Significant welfare issues.

### Waiting Lists:

A waiting list will be established for non-local students seeking enrolment but unsuccessful in the first round of offers. The size of the list will reflect the realistic expectation that vacancies will become available.

### Appeals:

If a parent/carer wishes to appeal a decision of the placement panel the appeal should be made to the Principal in writing. If an appeal cannot be resolved at the school level it will be referred to the School Education Director for the South Coast Group of Schools who will consider the appeal and make a determination.

### **High Attendance Equals High Achievement**

### What is a justified reason for being absent from school?

Justified reasons for absences may include if the student:

- has an <u>unavoidable</u> medical or dental appointment (preferably, these should be made after school
- or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious disease.

Absences for reasons such as some of the following may not be justified.

- Shopping
- Sleeping in
- Working around the house
- Minding younger siblings and other children
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Haircuts.

It is important to realise that parents (including carers) may be prosecuted if children have recurring unjustified absences from school.

### Make Online Payments (POP)

Is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit/debit card. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting <u>\$ Make a payment</u>

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called "other", this would cover items not covered under the previous heading. 'Other' can be used to make complete payment of a school invoice.

When you access the <u>\$ Make a payment</u> you must enter:

- The student's name, and
- class and reference number OR
- The student's name, and
- Date of birth.

These details are entered each time you make a payment, as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner and these details are not passed back to the school.

You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school.

### Warilla High School Bike Helmet Safety Policy

While riding a bicycle it is required by law to wear an (Australian Standard Approved) helmet securely fitted and fastened to your head.

Warilla High School has an obligation to enforce this law for the safety of their students when riding a bicycle to or from school.




