Many of my 'baby-boomer' colleagues have celebrated their 50th birthday's this year some are even a fraction older. While reflecting on this venerable milestone, many lamented the negative impact of some technologies. This brought to mind the following story that I thought I might share with you:

The Stranger

A few years after I was born, my Dad met a stranger who was new to our small town. From the beginning, Dad was fascinated with this enchanting newcomer and soon invited him to live with our family. The stranger was quickly accepted and was around from then on.

As I grew up, I never questioned his place in my family. In my young mind, he had a special niche. My parents were complementary instructors: Mom taught me good from evil, and Dad taught me to obey. But the stranger..... he was our storyteller. He would keep us spellbound for hours on end with adventures, mysteries and comedies.

If I wanted to know anything about politics, history or science, he always knew the answers about the past, understood the present and even seemed able to predict the future! He took my family to the first major league ball game. He made me laugh, and he made me cry. The stranger never stopped talking, but dad didn't seem to mind.

Sometimes, Mom would get up quietly while the rest of us were shushing each other to listen to what he had to say, and she would go the kitchen for peace and quiet. (I wonder now if she ever prayed for the stranger to leave.)

Dad ruled our household with certain moral convictions, but the stranger never felt obligated to honour them. Profanity, for example, was not allowed in our home..... Not from us, our friends or any visitors. Our longtime visitor, however, got away with four-letter words that burned my ears and made my dad squirm and made my mother blush.

My dad didn't permit the liberal use of alcohol. But the stranger encouraged us to try it on a regular basis. He made cigarettes look cool, cigars manly and pipes distinguished. He talked freely (much too freely!) about sex. His comments were sometimes blatant, sometimes suggestive, and generally embarrassing.

I now know that my early concepts about relationships were influenced strongly by the stranger. Time after time, he opposed the values of my parents, yet he was seldom rebuked..... And NEVER asked to leave.

Food for thought

□ As you would be aware, Year 12 have recently completed their Trial HSC examinations. The post-trial period is crucial to improved performance. Students should be assessing teacher feedback and making the relevant changes to technique and understanding that will lead to improved outcomes. The HSC begins on October 18th so this 'window of opportunity' should be maximised.

□ Year 11 curriculum lines for 2008 have been developed and derived from student choices made earlier this term. The lines are nicely balanced and include UAI; Non-UAI and VET courses, allowing students to determine a suitable pathway and pattern of subjects to suit their particular needs and career objectives. As always, it is impossible to cater for every possible combination of subjects but I am very satisfied that Mr Ashby and his team have developed a suitable response that caters for student demand.

□ Likewise, Year 9 elective choices have taken place and I am hopeful that all stu-

dents will have their preferred subjects available with the parameters set by both the Department of Education and Training and Board of Studies.

□ On a rather sour note, the school was the victim of a graffiti attack in mid-August. These cowards, under the cloak of darkness, sprayed offensive commentaries on walls and engaged in the senseless defacing of other areas. The School Security Unit and Police have several positive 'leads' and they anticipate charges will be laid, soon.

□ Warilla High School's pre-eminence on the sporting field continues. The Girls Open Rugby campaign continues to gather momentum as the girls defeated Matraville Sports High school to progess to the semifinal stage of this state competition. Likewise, our girls touch team made the final 10 of the State while our Rugby League sides brought much credit to themselves in their respective competitions. When you add the outstanding winning streak of the Open Boys' Soccer side, the future of sport at Warilla High School seems assured!

What is PBIS?

Mid June a team of 6 staff members attended a 2-day training seminar to learn about a new initiative called Positive Behaviour Interventions and Support, which has been working very effectively in the Western Sydney Region.

This program acknowledges the systems already operating in schools that work successfully to create a functional, positive school community where there is respect for each other and a focus on learning, but also appreciates that all systems need an overhaul and finetuning from time to time. It is not intended to be a quick fix and it is expected that the process will evolve over a 3-5 year period.

Initially the focus is on school-wide systems that govern behaviours around playgrounds, the canteen, bus travel and everywhere that the whole student body interacts. We were reminded that we often assume that everyone understands the rules that have been put in place in the same way, but this may not be the case. PBIS encourages specific teaching of skills so that everyone has a consistent approach to what is expected.

The first step in implementing this program has been to survey everyone on staff to discover what they think is working well or poorly and just what issues need to be addressed in priority order. Not surprisingly, the staff team at Warilla High overwhelmingly agree that many of our systems are fair and effective already, but there is still room for improvement and some behaviours that need attention. We are at the stage of gathering data on specific areas identified by staff and will then devise strategies to address the issues.

This is an exciting process that allows us to celebrate the success we have achieved while keeping in mind that all systems need regular evaluation to maintain their relevance and effectiveness.

Y-Curate

The Year 11 Visual Arts class has been involved this year in an innovative program offered by the Wollongong City Art Gallery. (WCG) Part of the senior curriculum requires the students to examine the role of the curator in creating exhibitions of artworks in a gallery setting. WCG took a very practical approach, inviting students from 4 local high schools to build an exhibition around a selected artwork and giving them access to the entire collection to mount it.

Our students were assigned 'Lambing' by Rosalie Gascoigne, an unusual work constructed from recycled materials such as torn lino and sheets of plywood. Taking a focus on interpretations of the Australian landscape, they selected a wide range of different works from a black and white photo by Max Dupain through paintings by well-known artists such as Sidney Nolan, to the large sculpture by Jeff Thompson made from reassembled oil drums shown in the accompanying photo.



The students had the rare experience of going into the gallery to hang the works on the wall, actually fetching them from the storerooms and organising their placement, a very "hands-on" opportunity which allowed them full ownership of the whole exhibition. It has made the role of the art gallery in bringing art into the community real for them and given them a direct experience of art they will never forget.

The exhibition opened on 10th August alongside the selection from Smith's Hill High School and closes on 23rd September when Edmund Rice and St Mary's High Schools will take over with their exhibitions.

The students are proud of their achievement and invite everyone to visit our Wollongong City Gallery and enjoy these works from the collection, as they have.

'ANOTHER FIRST FOR WARILLA HIGH'

On Tuesday evening, 28th August, Warilla High School was asked to present to the Wests Illawarra Club Board its CDSE Category 1 proposal for an extension of the schools Values Education Program focusing on Community Service and Student Volunteering. This was some 'history in the making' as no previous application had ever been personally made to the Board. In a unique and innovative approach Warilla High School was seeking \$25000 to enable up to 50 Year 10 and Year 11 students the opportunity to undertake a 40 week training program with various local community based associations such as Surf Clubs, State Emergency Services, Rural Bush Fire Brigade, Wires, Meals on Wheels, RSL Funds being sought would pay for students to be formally trained and kitted out in the uniform and equipment required.



The presentation team consisted of Year 11 students Krystle Marsh and Matthew Robson who worked hard to produce an outstanding power point presentation of what was happening in the school at present in the area of Community Service and Student Volunteering through the eyes of student volunteers, staff, parents and local dignataries including Senator



Ferravanti-Wells, Pat O'Shae - Illawarra Red Cross Co-ordinator and Tony Villa from the St Vincent de Paul Society. Other members of the Presentation Team included our Principal, Mr John Hambly and Student Services Head, Teacher Bob Pastor.

It gives me great pleasure to announce that the school has been successful in its application and Wests Illawarra Club will commit \$25000 to run a pilot program which we hope will become a pilot model for other schools to follow. At the same time I would like to congratulate Ms Kellie Marsh on her appointment as the Coordinator of this new cutting edge direction in Values Education.

ERREA Cup Open Boys Soccer Team A Soccer Odyssey

This year the Warilla High Open Boys Soccer Team has distinguished themselves in what has become a standout year of sporting successes and achievements at Warilla High School. This team is the first soccer team to have made the final 8 in NSW, from a total of 360 entries state-wide. I have written a game by game summary, outlining this team's Soccer Odyssey:-

Game 1: (Preliminary Round) – Warilla High 2 def Oak Flats 1 (Home – Barrack Oval).

This was a hard fought match, as both teams found their way in the first game of the competition. The shackles were broken late in the first half as midfielder, Goran Nikolovski, went one on one with the keeper and score.
