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Principal's Message

So here we are, the last newsletter of the year, and while in some ways it seems to have taken an eternity, in other ways it has rushed by. Another milestone is that while I have been leading the school for the past 18 months, it is also officially one year since I have been substantively in the Principal's role, and what a year. I am proud to say that despite the many COVID issues, I have not missed a day being at work and ready to serve the students and Staff of Warilla High School.

Looking at the last 12 months, it is hard to believe we have done so many upgrades and refurbishments to the school. The absence of students and Staff (during the lockdown) has given me the chance to really get stuck in to updating so many different areas. At the moment we are about 2/3 of the way through renewing many of our roof surfaces. E Block (which houses English, PE and the Foreshore Centre) and D Block (which is home to many Science labs and Maths rooms) now own new shiny and waterproof roofing. This week we are starting on a substantial change to the Library Block, and during the holidays we will finish off this program by doing some pretty amazing things to the Hall, which includes re-engineering the gutters and overflow water.

During this year we have been pretty systematic working our way through the various classroom Blocks fixing things such as renewing blinds, replacing carpet and fixing holes in walls so that each and every classroom is a fit place for our students to focus on their learning and be proud of their environment. Further to this, we have now completed my plan to have "hydration stations" in every Block. Again, my plan is to make the school as comfortable as possible for our students so that their focus is on learning, so if having chilled and filtered water free to students in every Block that must be a good thing.

Moving from the buildings, there have been many other things happening that we should celebrate. Friday Week 8 saw the Aboriginal Education Awards event. With over 100 Aboriginal students in the school, it was great to share with them an event which celebrated their outstanding academic achievement, attendance rates of 85 to 100%, and other events such as their work on NAIDOC week this year. Here is where I would add that Thomas Nicholls, one of our Year 12 2020 students received a Statewide award, called a Nanga Mai Award, for his academic excellence. Even though we had to follow COVID restrictions and no family were allowed to attend, it was a great event. The students were the MCs, they Acknowledged Country and congratulated each other for their outstanding achievement. I thank Ms Neden, Ms Jennifer Maher and Ms Simons for supporting the students, but also for letting the students host and drive the event.

Last week also saw our second "Christmas Stalls" organised by the SRC, Ms Campbell and Ms Crnogorcevic. It was a wonderful day when students and the Foreshore Centre, who were stallholders, sold their various produce to the rest of the school and some outside vendors came, in COVID safe conditions, outstanding quality of our students, and I join them in this endorsement and support of our students. At the end of the day, every vendor commented on the good manners and kind behaviour of the students of Warilla High School. This is a wonderful endorsement of our students, and I look forward to next year when I am sure the SRC will again excel in this area.

It seems like ages ago, but only two weeks ago our Year 12 finished the final HSC exams. I want to congratulate all our Year 12 students and their families for their incredible fortitude in what has been a challenging year for us all. We know our students have worked hard for the HSC and it is important that our exams proceed as planned. They finished with the same excellent attitude they showed all year. At their formal farewell, the careers and security staff



commented on what amazing young people they are. On the evening they presented beautifully, and their families would have been proud of their behaviour at the event. We are hoping for good results from this great group of students, many of whom have already been accepted into university because of their exceptional results during the year.

End of year reports will become available on Friday of Week 9. Following on from our half-year reports we are offering to publish our students' reports electronically, and parents and carers can access these on the Sentral portal. We have also sent home an "opt in" alternative for those families who would like a "hard copy" to be printed for their collection. We are pleased to be joining the community in being "greener" and saving paper with this option.

With various changes around COVID rules continuing, we are following the current guidelines and unfortunately our Prize Giving Ceremony next week will not be open to the general public. We will still be celebrating the achievements of our Year 7 – 11 students and awarding many students with certificates and gift certificates to mark their excellent achievements during 2020. I am sure you will join us in celebrating the hard work of our students during this very challenging year. Year 10 and Staff will be the audience for this event.

Finally, with the school days of 2020 coming to an end, can I thank you for your support of the school during this very difficult year. We have gone to some amazing measures and cost to ensure the safety of your students, but this has been money well spent. Mind you I do get frustrated sometimes, as I have just had the fourth soap dispenser ripped off the wall in the Junior Boys toilets in a matter of weeks. Hopefully early next year, there will be good news around possible vaccination and greater certainty around the well-being of our students and the wider community. School finishes for students, with the last day of term being Wednesday 16th December, and Staff have two days of professional learning after that. Very soon we will all be enjoying a well-deserved break.

With the end of the year, there will be a few changes in Staff ready for next year. I would like to thank Ms Luckman and Ms Masters who have been relieving Deputy Principals for the year, working alongside the highly valuable Mr Hales. Ms Luckman and Ms Masters have been a vital part of the senior executive team, and their hard work is very much appreciated. 2020 has been an immensely difficult year with lockdowns and so many restrictions with what schools have been allowed to do, and they have helped to make this the best possible version of 2020 at Warilla High. I have benefitted from working with them and appreciate their compassion and genuine connection to the students.

In the meantime, I wish you all a very merry Christmas and a happy and safe celebration of the New Year. Our teachers are returning to work on Wednesday and Thursday 27th and 28th January next year. This is slightly different from previous years as Staff will have two days of professional development before Year 7, 11 and 12 will be coming for their first day on Friday 29th January 2021. Finally, Years 8,9 and 10 will join us on Monday 1st February 2021. Keep safe and well until we see you again..

Deputies' Report

The final weeks of school for 2020 have now arrived, and it is important to focus on the positives from the past twelve months and look forward to a bigger and brighter 2021.

A positive for 2020 was that we found the majority of our students were resilient in the face of change. They readily adapted to online learning platforms during the period of school lockdown and demonstrated care and consideration when the health restrictions associated with COVID-19 were at their height. They navigated a school year where they were essentially deprived of those extra-curricula activities that make the school one of the most memorable periods in a person's life. They may not have been able to participate in sporting competitions, school excursions or had the opportunity to share their successes with family members and loved ones, yet they have walked out of our school gates at the end of each day with a smile on their faces. Overall it is gratifying to know that our future is in such good hands.

As a response to the disruptions caused to student learning by COVID-19, the state government has invested extra funding into schools for the 2021 school year. This funding will be available for the first 20 weeks of next year with the guidelines that it be used to improve or remediate student literacy and numeracy. As part of the process, a student's performance will need to be measured at the commencement of an initiative to provide baseline data and then again measured at the end of the time period to ascertain growth. The

school already has a number of data sources available from 2020 including Best Start and Snap testing which has allowed us to commence the planning around the best way to deliver a program that will see sustained student growth in these two fundamental areas. We will be able to supply more information on how this funding is to be used early in 2021.

In preparation for 2021, we believe it is important that all in the school community appreciate that a school needs to present a positive image to the wider community. Great things may be occurring behind the school gates, but it is important it is for these triumphs not to be overshadowed by negative and unfounded community perceptions. A simple example can be found in the wearing of school uniform. A uniform provides a sense of belonging, and this feeling is amplified when it is worn with pride and the knowledge that the wearer will be viewed by all in a positive light. This year the high standard of uniform compliance did slip. This is understandable as shortages, again due to COVID, made the purchasing of some uniform items difficult. The good news is that these shortages are no longer an issue.

Our uniform shop is stocked and our supplier, Daylight, cannot see future supply difficulties. New items of uniform will become available in 2021 including elastic waisted school shorts, a winter jumper and a thick winter jacket. These winter items are expected in-store around March or April before the cold weather does really set in. We do request that if you are considering buying winter clothing before these items are available, you stick with a plain navy blue pullover or jacket. Multi-colours and hoodies do not reflect a positive image of the school and jumpers worn under school shorts have presented both safety and hygiene issues in the past. (Yes, believe it or not, we have had students suffer heat exhaustion when, for the sake of fashion, they have felt that they have been unable to take off a jumper worn under a shirt. Also, some of our male students, on days warmer than expected, have failed to recognise the impact that body odour may have on those around them. They have therefore continued to wear a jacket under their shirt. This has led to some awkward and embarrassing moments and conversations.)

In 2021 the school will be welcoming back Mr Ind and Mr Kershaw to the Deputy Principal positions at our school. Both have been working in roles outside of our school, and the new skills and the experiences that they have gained will be integral in driving our school's new Strategic Improvement Plan. Our three Deputy Principals will therefore be Mr Hales (Years 7 & 11), Mr Kershaw (Years 8 & 12 and Mr Ind (Years 9 & 10).

Ms Luckman, our 2020 Deputy for Year 7 and 11, has been successful in gaining a newly formed position, Teaching Quality Advisor – Learning Ecosystems. This position will see Ms Luckman working both within our school and at a regional level to develop greater community consultation and input to benefit the learning of students. This is a real coup for both Ms Luckman and the school, and we congratulate her on this appointment.

It would be remiss at this point not to acknowledge and thank Ms Master who in 2020 filled the role of Deputy Principal responsible for Years 8 and 12 and leading our Excellence for All portfolio. Your passion for education and the care shown for those students in your year groups has been on show for all to see.

Finally, we would like to wish all of our students and their families a happy and safe Christmas and New Year period..

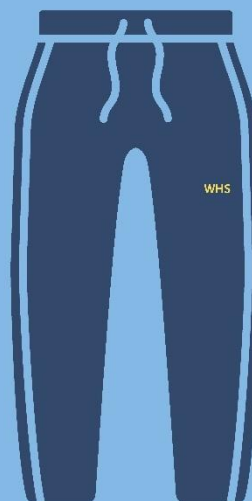

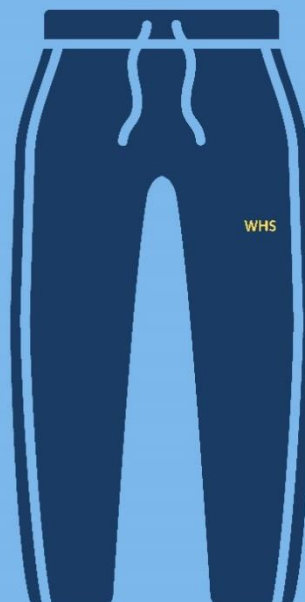

- Skirts and shorts must be of **appropriate length ie: mid-thigh**.
- Skirts, shorts or pants must also be worn at a socially acceptable height at all times so that there is no gap between the shirt and skirt.
- Jewellery is to be kept to a minimum and be unobtrusive, including studded body piercing.
- School representative sport jumpers are only to be worn on sports day ie Thursday.

Physical Education and Sport Uniforms

If a student is unable to wear school uniform they:

- have a note from the Parent/Caregiver explaining the reason
- Roll Call teacher will record on Sentral ('Toggle uniform') and refer to Head Teacher for a Uniform Slip
- produce uniform slip on request from teachers throughout the day
- be aware that if the correct shoes are not worn students will be unable to participate in some practical activities (see below)

When a student has a note from home, Head Teacher:

- collects student note, issues Uniform Slip and records incident on HT Uniform Tracking Sheet

When a student has no note, Head Teacher:

- issues Uniform Slip and records incident on HT Uniform Tracking Sheet
- counsels student regarding uniform
- contacts parents on the 2nd incident in a term
- issues a HT lunch detention
- exclusion from school activities for 3 or more incidents in a term

When a student is out of school uniform with no Uniform Slip:

- the teacher will request student removes item of clothing immediately, if appropriate
- if a student refuses to follow instructions seek support of HT or send student with a note and a responsible student to the Faculty HT
- the Teacher/HT to record incident and follow up on Sentral

Long term non-compliance will result in non-participation in extra-curricular and whole school activities including but not limited to: Incursions, Year Excursions, Camps, Formals, Ski Trip, Other non-curriculum based activities eg. Sporting teams

If student is **not in the correct footwear** they will be unable to participate in activities in the following areas: Science Laboratories, Industrial Arts, Food Technology and Textiles, Visual Arts

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IMPORTANT MESSAGES

LATE ARRIVAL – CHANGE OF PROCEDURES

Up until 9.30am go to the side window of the Library between 'A' block and the Library block. One of the Office Staff will record your information and give you a late slip to get into class. STUDENT ABSENCES

Students must bring a note to explain their absences. A green 'Absence Book' is available from the front office. Unexplained absences will appear on the student's report.

OPAL CARDS

Dear Parents,

Representatives from 'Premier Illawarra' have asked us to inform the school community that they will be active as of Monday the 02/11/2020 enforcing the need for students to have and use their OPAL cards on the school buses.

When a student taps both on and off a school bus, the data is recorded, and this information has two purposes. The first is to help track a student's movements if a safety issue arises. The second is headcount to determine whether a bus route is still required or whether additional buses need to be added to a particular route. Unless an accurate headcount is maintained, there is no guarantee that these services will be able to be maintained into the future.

Premier has informed the school that on Wednesday 04/11/2020 they will not be transporting any student without a card or proof that a new card has been requested. Parents will therefore need to arrange alternative transport arrangements for these students.

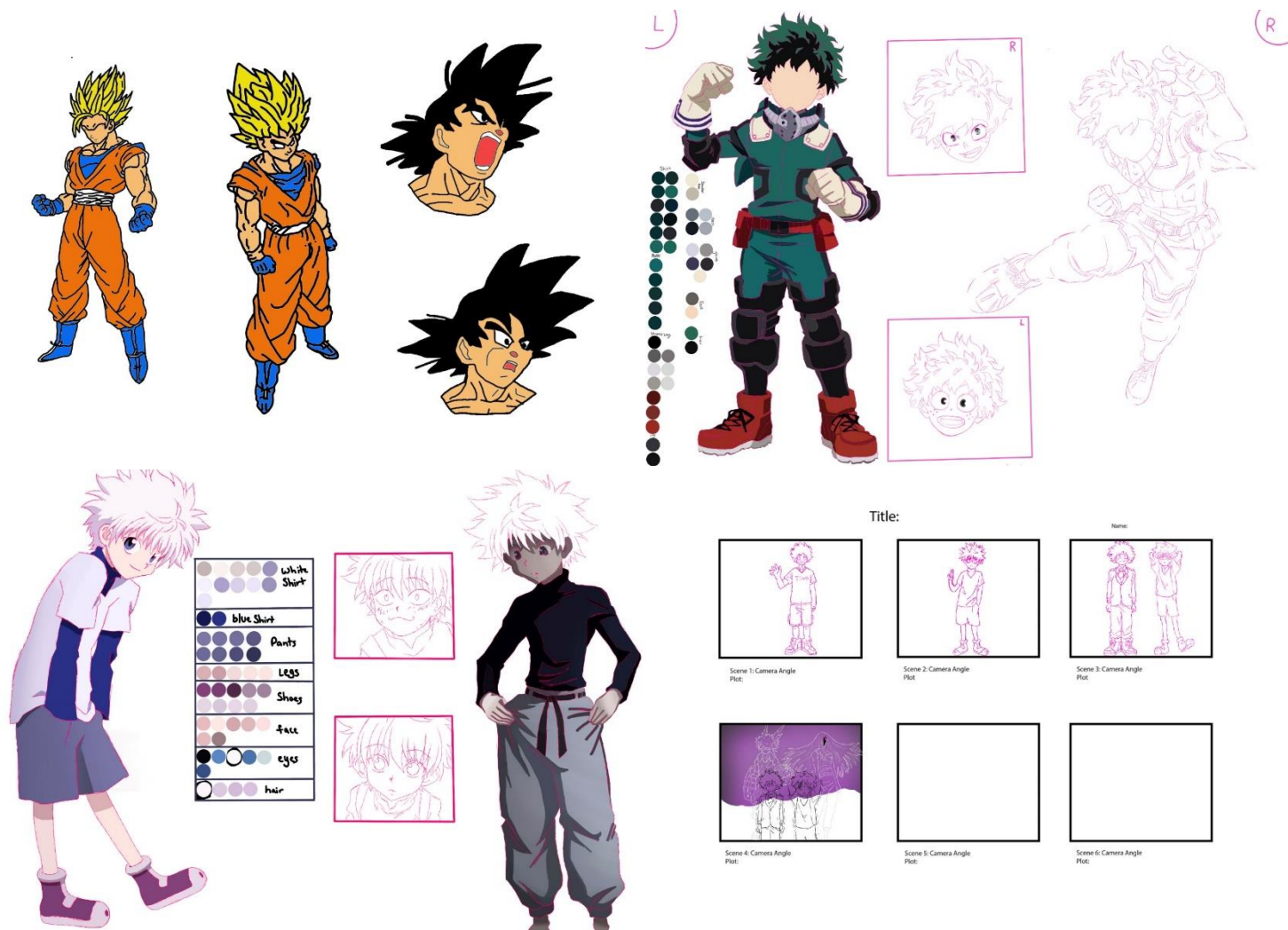


Year 8 Digital Art

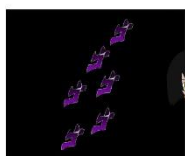

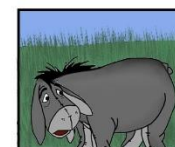

STEM

The brand new custom-designed STEM room has already been put to good use, with our students in the STEM electives working on a range of project-based learning programs under the guidance of Mr Koglin and Mr Berry. With programs ranging from designing and building models of green sustainable housing, to building and wiring Lego 'Battle Bots' for their ultimate showdown (including a student-produced 'short-film' to accompany it), to teleconferencing with real-life engineers to receive feedback on their projects, to designing and constructing cardboard gumball dispensers as part of the student-directed STEM program; our students in the STEM electives are enthusiastically utilising their opportunities to develop their 21st Century learning skills!

2021 is also shaping up to be a promising year, with Mr Koglin developing plans for a 'STEM Club', which will allow students the opportunity to utilise the STEM room and develop their skills working on self-directed project-based activities such as coding, soldering, electronics and other related STEM projects.



Careers

Education Support Traineeships

Congratulations to Ebony Best (Yr 10) & Jade Cattell (Yr 9) who were successful in gaining a traineeship in Education Support. Both girls will be completing their traineeships at Warilla High school assisting our SLSO's, whilst completing the qualification at TAFE NSW.



UOW Summer Master Class

Congratulations to the 23 Year 12 students who were successful in applying for the UOW Summer Master Class for 2021. Students who successfully pass their Summer Master Class subject will at minimum be guaranteed an Early Admission Interview to the university degrees that align with the Summer Master Class subject. They may also receive credit towards a UOW degree and may be eligible to skip a whole subject when they study at UOW.

Work Experience

During a year of workplace disruption due to covid, it was great to see Warilla High had over 50 students who recognised the value of engaging in a work-experience placement with an employer.

All students developed key employability skills, with many also converting the experience into an apprenticeship or traineeship.

Community Garden

Mr Cairncross and Mr Gosharevski have been champions of the community garden. They often take students out to develop employability skills such as teamwork, enterprise & initiative, teamwork & leadership.

This is a project that is gradually evolving work in progress and will serve to become a great facility for external classes to create, learn, relax & enjoy.

Much of the produce is used by teachers and students to consume and propagate more plants.







Geography

In 2020 the pandemic has impacted all our students in various ways, not least, our Stage 6 Geography students who saw the cancellation of excursions and subsequently, fieldwork. Whilst we adapted and completed some online virtual field trips, nothing beats getting out into the environment and having a hands-on look at the environments being studied in the classroom.

In Term 4, we have seen a relaxing on these restrictions leading to a busy couple of weeks for the Stage 6 Geography class who have managed to complete fieldwork in two different locations in two weeks.

Firstly, we travelled to Towra Point Nature Reserve to look at Intertidal Wetlands as part of the Ecosystems at Risk topic. The students battled the elements, the environment and their own minds as they waded through shin-deep mud, dealt with relentless mosquitoes and tropical humidity in order to complete their fieldwork. There was whingeing and a few tired sleepers on the bus home, but overall, a great day was had. Thanks to the Staff at Kamay Botany Bay Environmental Education Centre for the day.

We then followed that up with a trip a bit closer to home, to the Minnamurra River, in order to continue our study of Intertidal Wetlands. In what were far more favourable conditions, the weather really turned it on, and the students had a great time kayaking/paddle-boarding down the river and through the mangroves, stopping to look at and analyse how the built environment is impacting the natural ecosystem. A huge thanks to Steve and the team from the Illawarra Environmental Education Centre.

Can I also thank the students from our Stage 6 Geography class who attended these days, they were great ambassadors for themselves and the school, typifying our core values of Excellence, Respect, Integrity and Compassion. Hopefully, we can continue to get out of the classroom and apply our skills as we progress through the course.

I hope everyone has a great festive season, recharges over the holidays and comes back fit and ready to tackle 2021!
