Thank you to the many parents and carers who took the time to attend. It was nice to put names to faces and start, what I hope, is a great relationship with the incredible teachers of Warilla High and our new Year 7 families.

Something else that has returned this year is our Expo Evening for our prospective students and their families. What a fantastic afternoon, and while I was not able to do the Principal's Address due to COVID guidelines, it was a



delightful afternoon (maybe because I couldn't do the speech!!!). Thank you in particular to the many wonderful students who stayed back to showcase what a great place this is, and I would add showcase what lovely students they are!!! It was heart-warming to listen to our students tell the visitors about what they like about their school and why it is such a special place. Disappointed, I have just come in from the playground where I have seen some Year 7 boys throwing themselves into puddles and covering themselves in mud and water. They will be given consequences for this silly behaviour. Yesterday we had a really unfortunate incident with someone running out of the rain and accidentally knocked another student to the ground causing a horrible break to his arm. Can you please talk to your students about sensible behaviour as they move around the school? As we know, it is tight for room with so many students, but when it is wet and slippery, they all need to be even more careful for the safety of themselves and others.

With the end of this Term, I know many staff and students have been working really diligently for many weeks trying to get reports, assessment tasks and a whole range of commitments complete. The number of senior students using the Study Skills afternoon in the Library is growing every week. It is wonderful to see so many of our senior students and their teachers coming together after hours, to work on their various assignments. Last week 42 students attended voluntarily. Thank you to Ms Sheridan and her band of merry teachers. Thank you staff and students for your hard work and please use Easter to slow down and recharge your batteries, ready for next Term.

Deputies' Report

As we near the end of Term 1, it has certainly been a different start to the year than 2020. It continues to be a positive start to the school year, with students again being able to access school events such as assemblies, excursions and even camps. These events, and the consistent reinforcement of the school core values, Excellence, Respect, Integrity and Compassion, have brought a sense of normality back to the school coming out of a difficult time last year. Whilst there continues to be a return to some normality, the school remains committed to maintaining vigilance regarding the possible chance of COVID being in the community at some point, so we continue to reinforce the Department of Education's 2021 Guidelines around COVID-19, and in conjunction with the Australian Health Protection Principal Committee. This is to ensure our school continues to operate in the safest way possible to support our students and staff. School activities are continuing to run in line with the guidelines, and if students should be at school unless:

- They have a medical certificate which states that they are unable to return to school due to an ongoing medical condition and the expected timeframe.
- They are currently unwell.

In such a large school as ours, there are a small number of students who have been identified as participating in VAPING whilst at school, and unfortunately coming to and from school, and in particular, while wearing the school uniform. Vaping is the inhaling of a vapour created by an electronic cigarette (e-cigarette), or another vaping device. Vaping in adolescence can have devastating and lasting effects. Vaping, including the use of e-cigarettes, is prohibited in public schools, and students found to be engaging in vaping will be dealt with in relation to the department policy on banned substances and the school rules that relate to smoking.

Every year at this point, we discuss the uniform of the students. The year has started well with the uniform of the students being excellent, and staff have consistently reinforced the uniform expectations for students. The school's uniform policy has been approved by our school community and will continue to be revisited by staff. Some particular points include the wearing of 'hoodies' to school. Hoodies are not part of the Warilla High School uniform, and these and other jumpers, particularly work under the school shirts, are unacceptable. Students will be asked to remove the jumper when seen by the staff. This includes all non-Warilla High School branded jumpers. If there is a specific need for students to wear clothing on a specific day that is not part of the school uniform, we continue to ask that a note be provided from home with an explanation, and the students can then access a uniform pass.

Already this Term we have had a great number of students representing Warilla High School with distinction across a number of events such as leadership, creative and performing arts, and on the sporting field. As always, these students do so with enthusiasm and pride, and we consistently receive feedback from parents, event organisers, and sometimes members of the general public, which support the great work these students are doing in the community. Representing Warilla High School is a privilege we want as many of our students to experience as possible. This privilege does, however, come with some conditions. It is expected that the students leaving the school to represent Warilla High School are also performing to their best at school, and particularly with their behaviour. Students who are currently on Orange, Red or Grey level of the school are unable to represent Warilla High School outside the school, such as creative and performing arts, sporting or rewards events unless it is an event specifically related to their curriculum needs.

The school Expo for our prospective new Yr7 students for 2022 was a great chance for the school community to showcase the huge variety of opportunities on offer at Warilla High School. We had a huge number of parents, carers and students come through the school to experience a variety of activities, from practical activities in the CAPA and TAS faculties, the sample lessons across a variety of subject areas, the changes happening in the Library, and even a game of paddle tennis in the quad, and a cookie. The feedback from parents and students was fantastic, and we look forward to meeting these students again later in the year when our transition team begin the process of supporting them in the move from Primary to High School. A big congratulations to the great Warilla High School students who made themselves available to support the groups around the school and provide valuable commentary across all the areas of the school. Also, a massive thanks to Mr Harry for the extensive behind the scenes work in organising the expo and all of the Warilla High School staff who made the afternoon such a success.







- **Leggings or tights are to be worn under skirts or shorts** not on their own. Offending students will be asked to report to the Deputy Principal where they will be given a skirt or shorts to wear on loan.
- Skirts and shorts must be of **appropriate length ie: mid-thigh**.
- Skirts, shorts or pants must also be worn at a socially acceptable height at all times so that there is no gap between the shirt and skirt.
- Jewellery is to be kept to a minimum and be unobtrusive, including studded body piercing.
- School representative sport jumpers are only to be worn on sports day ie Thursday.

If a student is unable to wear school uniform they:

- have a note from the Parent/Caregiver explaining the reason
- Roll Call teacher will record on Sentral ('Toggle uniform') and refer to Head Teacher for a Uniform Slip
- produce uniform slip on request from teachers throughout the day
- be aware that if the correct shoes are not worn students will be unable to participate in some practical activities (see below)

When a student has a note from home, Head Teacher:

- collects student note, issues Uniform Slip and records incident on HT Uniform Tracking Sheet

When a student has no note, Head Teacher:

- issues Uniform Slip and records incident on HT Uniform Tracking Sheet
- counsels student regarding uniform
- contacts parents on the 2nd incident in a term
- issues a HT lunch detention
- exclusion from school activities for 3 or more incidents in a term

When a student is out of school uniform with no Uniform Slip:

- the teacher will request student removes item of clothing immediately, if appropriate
- if a student refuses to follow instructions seek support of HT or send student with a note and a responsible student to the Faculty HT
- the Teacher/HT to record incident and follow up on Sentral

Long term non-compliance will result in non-participation in extra-curricular and whole school activities including but not limited to: Incursions, Year Excursions, Camps, Formals, Ski Trip, Other non-curriculum based activities eg. Sporting teams

If student is **not in the correct footwear** they will be unable to participate in activities in the following areas: Science Laboratories, Industrial Arts, Food Technology and Textiles, Visual Arts

UMBURRA NEWS

Our Year 7 students have settled into life at Warilla High, and the process for our Personal Learning Pathways has started. The aim of these guidelines is to provide schools with information to support the effective development and implementation of PLP's for Aboriginal students. PLP's are an effective tool for increasing Aboriginal student engagement. They have the potential to support improved learning outcomes and educational aspirations when they are developed in genuine partnership with Aboriginal students, their parent/carers and support staff. We look forward to meeting you at these meetings.

Our selected Year 8 cohort of students have started at SYFS Cultural program. This program is run by Elders from the community and gives students the opportunity to be immersed in culture whilst learning the language, dance and art. We hope these students enjoy this program, learn and go on to become ATSI leaders in our school and within the community.

Years 11 and 12 students are also partaking in the NRL School to Work Program. This program mentor's students throughout year 11 and 12 then continue working with them for one year out of school. The program has been operational since 2012 and utilises the positive profile of the Rugby league to support and encourage year 11 and 12 ATSI students to achieve their HSC and prepare them as they transition from school to employment or further education. The S2W Program also works with each participant to identify available work experience and employment opportunities using the NRL and NRL clubs business networks, where relevant, to help participants make informed career choices. The mentors visit the school for 1 hour every fortnight to support these students.

Congratulations to Amos Williams Year 11, who will participate in the leadership camp for a week in May alongside NRL clubs Penrith Panthers, Canterbury Bulldogs, Parramatta Eels, and Wests Tigers.

Selected Year 7 and 8 students, along with our ATSI leadership team, have been participating in Bangarra Dance workshops via zoom. These students, under the guidance of Ms Neden have been learning new skills and dance moves to showcase culture. This has been a positive, enriching experience for all those involved.

Week 5 Friday 26th February saw our three classes of Yr11 Marine Studies students participate in their snorkelling and swimming skills assessment prior to embarking on our first ocean snorkel adventure in the following week. Week 6 Friday 5th March, we were very excited to take this outstanding group out to Bushranger's Bay and give them a chance to test and develop their snorkelling skills. Bushrangers Bay is a beautiful Marine Reserve on the eastern side of Bass Point.



Students worked their way through the sandy seagrass at the entrance to the bay, snorkelling around the southern edge of the bay. Mr Cairncross pointed out a Blind Shark that was hiding in a rocky crevice, and the students observed a variety of common temperate species, Luderick, Bream, Trevally, Wrasse, Rock Cod and even a small stingray. We then made our way to the eastern section of the bay to watch the small group of Grey Nurse sharks that were calmly cruising 20m below.

Students showed a real appreciation for this opportunity despite the conditions. We ended the day with a bbq lunch provided by the master chef Mr Reid with the fantastic help of Jenavieve Barrett and Dakota Mason."




