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

Principal's Message

Deputies' Report

Uniform - Welcome to the first days of the cooler weather, and with that in mind, our wonderful uniform shop has now in ample stock supplies of our new school jacket and what is proving to be very popular already, excellent quality, soft to the touch and very warm Sloppy-Joe jumpers. These warm, cooler weather uniform items have already got the tick of approval from the students who are wearing them, and they are a vast improvement on the multi-colour non-uniform items previously worn. We must say that the message that only plain navy-blue tops and bottoms are acceptable to be worn at school seems to be understood and taken up by the vast majority of our students and that our uniform is being worn with pride. Parents are reminded that assistance is available when required in cases of financial hardship to help in getting students into an approved school uniform item.

Punctuality - We will also take this opportunity to remind students and their parents of the obligation of students to attend school every day, unless they are legally excused and to be on time and prepared to learn. Our school day begins at 8.25 am each morning, so the expectation is that students will arrive before that time. Many of the students spoken to as to why they aren't on time mention that they are tired and woke up late. When asked why most admit that they aren't getting enough sleep, and this is negatively impacting their ability to do their very best at school. So, in order for students to excel at school, they all need to get enough quality sleep (10 hours per school night recommended), preferably without the distraction of electronic devices in their bedrooms.

Canteen - A reminder to all students of our Warilla High School Core Values - **Excellence** (Aim to achieve your personal best) - **Respect** (Show respect to yourself and others) - **Integrity** (Be honest and trustworthy) - **Compassion** (Care for the wellbeing of yourself and others). In regards to respect and integrity, an issue that needs improvement recently is in the way some students are conducting themselves at the canteen, where some students need a reminder to be respectful to the canteen workers (Mostly volunteers). In particular, only one person at the counter at any time, with the others in a single line for their year group, waiting back behind the line at least 1.5m from the counter with no pushing or shoving. When being served, remember to be patient and courteous (Please & thankyou) and never take anything without paying. If we all abide by the WHS Core Values, then our school will be a much more pleasant place for all.

Student Drop Off and Pick Up - With a school of Warilla High School's size, there is always a concern with the school drop off in the morning and pick up at the end of the day. A reminder to parent and carers of the bus stops at the front of the school, and particularly the no stopping area at the corner of **Abella St and Keross Ave**:

The council will often have rangers around the school monitoring these areas and will take photos of cars that are not following the **Bus Stop and No Standing** signs. This results in substantial fines being given to the owners of the cars. Dropping off and pick up of students at **the CALTEX Service is not an appropriate venue** due to the high volume of traffic and the need for patrons to be able to access the bowsers and shopfront.

Can we urge parent and carers to drop the students off on Daphne Street near the soccer fields, in the drop off zone at the corner of **Daphne Street and Keross Ave**, or in another appropriate area in one of the side streets to the school.

LATE ARRIVAL – CHANGE OF PROCEDURES

Heavy fines are imposed for illegal dropping off or picking up students in school zone hours.

The school car park is for staff parking only and is not to be used for dropping off or picking up students.

RIDING A BIKE TO SCHOOL

Students who ride a bike to school are required by law to wear a helmet.

STUDENT ABSENCES

Students must bring a note to explain their absences. A green 'Absence Book' is available from the front office. Unexplained absences will appear on the student's report.

Foreshore Centre

The Foreshore Centre students have really embraced the outdoor learning environment that the school garden provides. Gardening provides numerous benefits for our students. They are able to connect with nature and learn valuable agricultural and work-based skills. It teaches responsibility and patience, understanding of cause and effect, and the importance of cooperation, teamwork and physical activity. It is an opportunity to teach students about where food comes from, how it grows and what it looks and tastes like when it's freshly picked.

The Foreshore Centre students have planted numerous varieties of fruits and vegetables this year and have nurtured their growth by weeding, watering and building trellises and frames for the plants. The students' hard work has resulted in a very productive garden producing tomatoes, chillies, lettuce, eggplant, snow peas, green beans, carrots, pumpkins, capsicums, cucumbers, strawberries, passionfruit and more. Produce grown is sold to school staff, and the monies raised are then used to continue the garden's upkeep and therefore maintain its success.





CAPA News

Year 12 students are moving into their final semester of schooling. Students in Drama are currently working on the group performance and monologue for the HSC. Music students are getting performance ready for their Electives 1 and 2. Visual Arts students are continuing with their Body of Work. All of these students have performance or learning to be submitted in term three. The Computing students are continually learning about web pages and designing as a means of communication.

Year 11 students are halfway through the Preliminary course. Students in Drama are studying the play Ruby Moon and gothic theatre. Music students are currently learning about Music for Large Ensembles and preparing for a Viva Voce. Visual Arts students are working on Australian landscapes and artists and re-creating these landscapes using their own sense of personal identity. Photography students are working on capturing light into picture and using the darkroom.

Year 10 Music students are examining the various styles of Australian music. Drama students are working towards performances for the South Coast Drama festival, looking at play development and improvised performance. Visual Art students have been studying post-modern art and discussing the structural frame.

Year 9 Music students are examining World Music, focusing on African, Caribbean and Irish music through performance, listening and composing. Photography students have been working with Photoshop and learning how to utilise the darkroom.


Year 8 Music students are learning about Rock Music and will be composing using computer technology this term. Year 8 students are learning how to use DEAL to describe artworks.

IS YOUR MOTORIZED SCOOTER, BIKE OR SKATEBOARD LEGAL?

PROHIBITED VEHICLES

It is illegal to ride minibikes and some small electric or petrol-powered vehicles on public roads, carparks or in parks.

WHICH VEHICLES ARE PROHIBITED?

All petrol-powered bicycles that:

- have a petrol-powered engine attached before or after purchase
- are powered by another type of internal combustion engine
- minibikes or monkey bikes
- motorised human transporters such as the WheelMan or Segway skateboards with an electric or petrol motor.

Prohibited vehicles cannot be registered or insured.

Star Readers in Year 7 and Year 9

Launching Renaissance Reading

This term, Warilla High School has introduced a reading program for students in Year 7 and 9 to help them develop a lifelong love of reading and to improve their literacy skills.

The multi-part program starts with Star Reader, where all students take a 20-minute adaptive test to determine their reading age and level. Using the school library management system, 'Oliver', students then can find books that are suited perfectly for their reading age and level.

Next, students are ready for Accelerated Reader. The program itself is simple: a student reads a book, takes an online quiz and gets immediate feedback. Students respond to regular feedback and are motivated to make progress with their reading skills.

For this to happen, students will spend time reading in class, but it will be important for them to read every night at home too. Every student will have borrowed a book from the library as part of Renaissance Reading, so please encourage your child to read every night at home.

The comprehension quiz students complete on Accelerated Reader will tell them (and us) how well they understood the book. Their English teachers can then help them improve their comprehension skills. In addition to the instant feedback, students can accrue points and work towards a goal as their reading improves.

When young people are engaged in good books, their imagination blossoms, and they can form meaningful connections with each other, bond through knowing characters and having shared experiences. Now more than ever, instilling a love of reading at a young age is important for lifelong learning.

Years of research have moulded Accelerated Reader into a helpful tool to introduce students to the magical world of reading and the stories to discover in thousands of books. With your help, Warilla High School students can accelerate their learning and grow to even greater levels of success!

Open Boys Qualify for South Coast Semi-Final in Puma Cup

After successfully defeating Ulladulla High and Wollongong Performing Arts High in the earlier round, our Open Boys Football team came up against a determined Nowra High in Round 3 of the Puma Cup. A number of late withdrawals due to injury meant that our boys were forced to play the entire game, one man, down. Prior to the match, the team spoke about the importance of getting off to a good start, and when **James J**, playing up front on his own, scored a superb individual goal in the first 10 minutes, confidence was certainly high. Instead of 'parking the bus' after going a goal up with a man down, the boys kept playing an attacking brand of Football, keeping the ball on the ground and adopting a short passing game based on maintaining possession. The boys then started adding some width into their attack, and **Conner P** and **Adam V** started

Would you like to know more about the National Disability Insurance Scheme and its interface with Education? The information below explains what each session is about, date and time of each session and links to registration. These sessions are during Term 2.

Understanding the NDIS

Attendees will learn about how the NDIS can help people with disability get the supports they need to achieve their goals, including engaging with providers. This session will also cover the responsibilities of the NDIS and Education in providing support to school-aged children with disabilities.

Accessing the NDIS

An information session to deepen understanding of the NDIS eligibility criteria and access process. The session will cover:







- A plain **WHITE** T-shirt may be worn underneath the normal white school polo shirt for Years 7-10 or the blue senior shirt for Years 11 and 12. Shirts must be buttoned up at all times.
- In very cold/wet weather any jacket worn **MUST BE PLAIN NAVY BLUE**.
- Shoes: Predominately white or black fully-enclosed sneakers or joggers. **Note:** Light canvas 'Raben' shoes/ballet style shoes do not meet Workplace Health & Safety regulations.
- **Leggings or tights are to be worn under skirts or shorts** not on their own. Offending students will be asked to report to the Deputy Principal where they will be given a skirt or shorts to wear on loan.
- Skirts and shorts must be of **appropriate length ie: mid-thigh**.
- Skirts, shorts or pants must also be worn at a socially acceptable height at all times so that there is no gap between the shirt and skirt.
- Jewellery is to be kept to a minimum and be unobtrusive, including studded body piercing.
- School representative sport jumpers are only to be worn on sports day ie Thursday.

Physical Education and Sport Uniforms

WARILLA HIGH SCHOOL - UNIFORM PROCEDURES

If a student is unable to wear school uniform they:

- have a note from the Parent/Caregiver explaining the reason
- Roll Call teacher will record on Sentral ('Toggle uniform') and refer to Head Teacher for a Uniform Slip
- produce uniform slip on request from teachers throughout the day
- be aware that if the correct shoes are not worn students will be unable to participate in some practical activities (see below)

When a student has a note from home, Head Teacher:

- collects student note, issues Uniform Slip and records incident on HT Uniform Tracking Sheet

When a student has no note, Head Teacher:

- issues Uniform Slip and records incident on HT Uniform Tracking Sheet
- counsels student regarding uniform
- contacts parents on the 2nd incident in a term
- issues a HT lunch detention
- exclusion from school activities for 3 or more incidents in a term

When a student is out of school uniform with no Uniform Slip:

- the teacher will request student removes item of clothing immediately, if appropriate
- if a student refuses to follow instructions seek support of HT or send student with a note and a responsible student to the Faculty HT
- the Teacher/HT to record incident and follow up on Sentral

Long term non-compliance will result in non-participation in extra-curricular and whole school activities including but not limited to: Incursions, Year Excursions, Camps, Formals, Ski Trip, Other non-curriculum based activities eg. Sporting teams

If student is **not in the correct footwear** they will be unable to participate in activities in the following areas: Science Laboratories, Industrial Arts, Food Technology and Textiles, Visual Arts


