## Principal's Message

Let me start by welcoming everyone to Term 4. It is going to be full of many activities and events, and the first to kick off will be the HSC exams which begin this coming Wednesday.

I want to congratulate all our Year 12 students and their families for their incredible fortitude in what has been a challenging year for us all. We know our students have worked hard for the HSC, and it is important that our exams proceed as planned. The most important priorities for our students are that they keep studying, stay healthy and turn up for their exams on time. If your child has a pre-existing condition that presents similarly to flu-like symptoms, speak to your doctor/GP now and contact the school. If, on the day of the exam, your child feels unwell with flu-like symptoms, they should stay home and get tested. It is important you visit the doctor and get a doctor's certificate, and be tested for COVID-19 as a precaution. On the morning of each exam, your child will be asked if they are unwell with flu-like symptoms. If your child says 'yes', they will not be able to sit the exam and will be asked to leave and seek medical attention. If you know your child is unwell, it is better to keep them home. We want all our students to sit their exams, but sometimes events happen that are beyond our control. If your child is unwell and misses their exam, please contact the school. Students who are unwell will be eligible for illness and misadventure, and we will help them through this process.

In the interest of safety (COVID), we have decided to postpone the graduation ceremony until after the exams are finished, with two adults per student. I know this is a very proud moment for all families, and we hope you get to enjoy the day, despite the restrictions. So just to share with you the vital dates and times around Year 12 activities.

### STUDENT ABSENCES

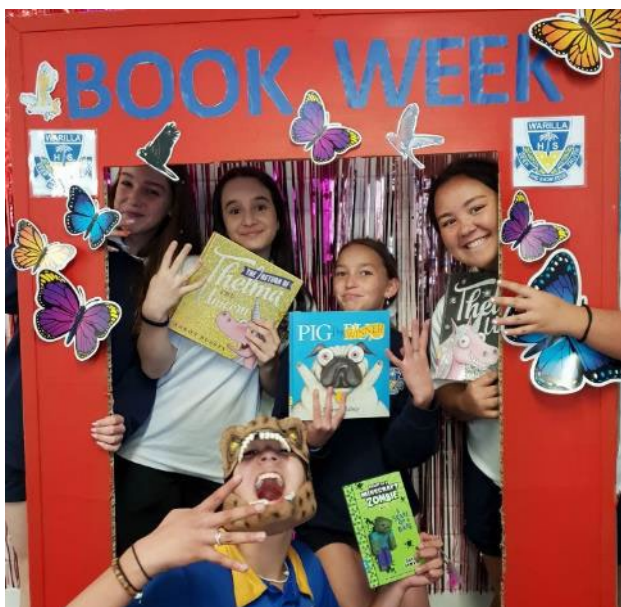
Students must bring a note to explain their absences. A green 'Absence Book' is available from the front office. Unexplained absences will appear on the student's report.

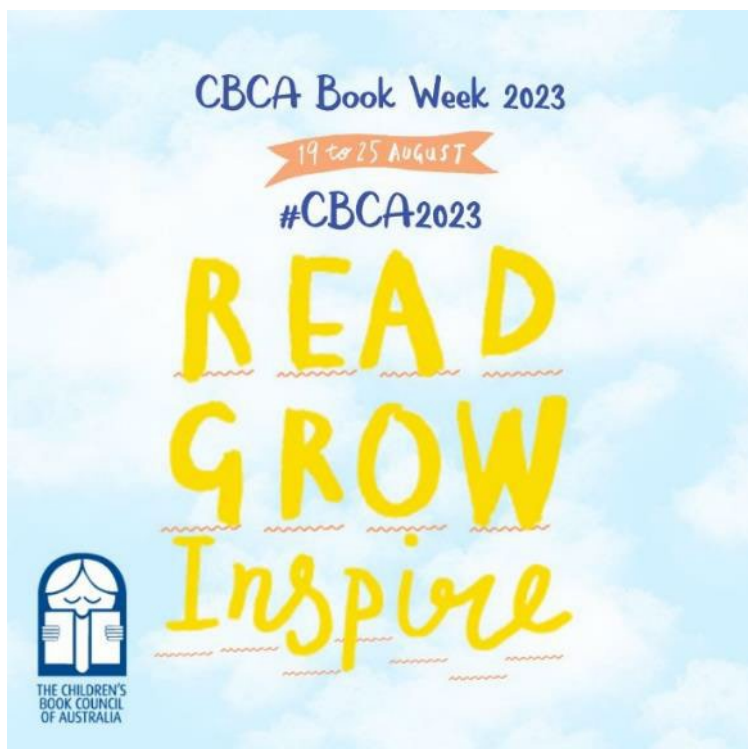






## CBCA Winners 2022

## Wellbeing Term 3 2022

This Term, we have had some targeted wellbeing programs running.

**Top Blokes** - a mentoring program for a select group of Year 9 boys started this Term, and it will run for two semesters. This program looks at sessions on:

- **Mental health** – Supporting them to become proactive in identifying wellbeing issues in others as well as building skills to increase self-care and resilience.
- **Anger Management** – Demonstrate the factors that influence angry outbursts, educating participants on the basic psychological understanding of anger. This session also supports participants in improving their conflict resolution skills and developing self-care techniques to reduce aggressive behaviours.
- **Peer Pressure & Risk Taking** - Helping them to identify negative influences in risk-taking scenarios as well as developing independent thinking to help them become more assertive towards their peers.
- **Online Behaviours** - Looking at the personal, social and legal ramifications of online bullying and sexting, as well as developing strategies to address this behaviour among their peer groups.
- **Healthy Relationships** – Discussing consent in relationships, developing personal responsibilities and communication skills to help build positive relationships with others.
- **Realities of Pornography** – This session supports participants in understanding how online pornography contributes to the unrealistic portrayal of sexual relationships and how excessive porn consumption can affect a young man's physiological and mental wellbeing.

**Great Girls** - a confidence and resilience-building program for a selected group of Year 10 girls.

This is a school-based program that concerns issues common within the Y10 female cohort. It is discussion lead; students will be directing the conversation to address the issues important to them. Each session will include a self-care activity. The program will cover key domains:

- **Body image and self-esteem**
- **Risk-taking behaviours**
- **Healthy relationships**
- **Social media literacy**
- **Self-care**

**Train Safety** - We have also had our Year 7 cohort involved in a Train Safety Program - this aims to educate school students and the Community to travel safely on and around trains and stations. Some key messages are:

- Always hold on to your bike/bag/scooter
- Use your brains; tracks are for trains
- Always walk on the platform
- Always use a footbridge
- Be considerate of others
- Stay behind the yellow line
- Emergency? use the Emergency Help Point

## R U Ok Day Activities

On **Friday, 9th September 2022**, Warilla High School staff and students enjoyed a massive day of activities, food and fun, recognising and promoting **R U OK Day**. All those involved engaged in the conversation about checking in with your friends, family and colleagues. R U Ok Day is not just one day; it is every day.

There were loads of activities for the students and staff to get involved in, including:

### **“Spread Kindness like Confetti”**

This was a positive exercise that allowed the students to focus on acts of kindness.

### **“Look out for your Friends”**

This year we created an anonymous letterbox for students to refer themselves or their friends who they are worried about. This is where our SSO (student support officer) will then speak and catch up with these students.

### **“Who will I speak to?”**

Students thought about who they would talk to if they were not feeling ok. They were then asked to write these support people (trusted adults) down on a card. They were asked to keep the card in their phone case or a photo of it to remind them of all the people that supported them.

### **“Wellbeing Wall”**

This was an activity that encouraged students to “give what you can” and “take what you need”. This allowed students to take positive affirmations about confidence building, patience, love, kindness and self-control. It also allowed students to choose a random act of kindness to carry out for a friend or family member.

### **“Rock Painting”**

This was a popular activity where students were able to create some rock artwork and write positive messages, engaging in some mindfulness.

The day also included old favourites like a lolly jar guessing game, photo dress-ups and giant Jenga.

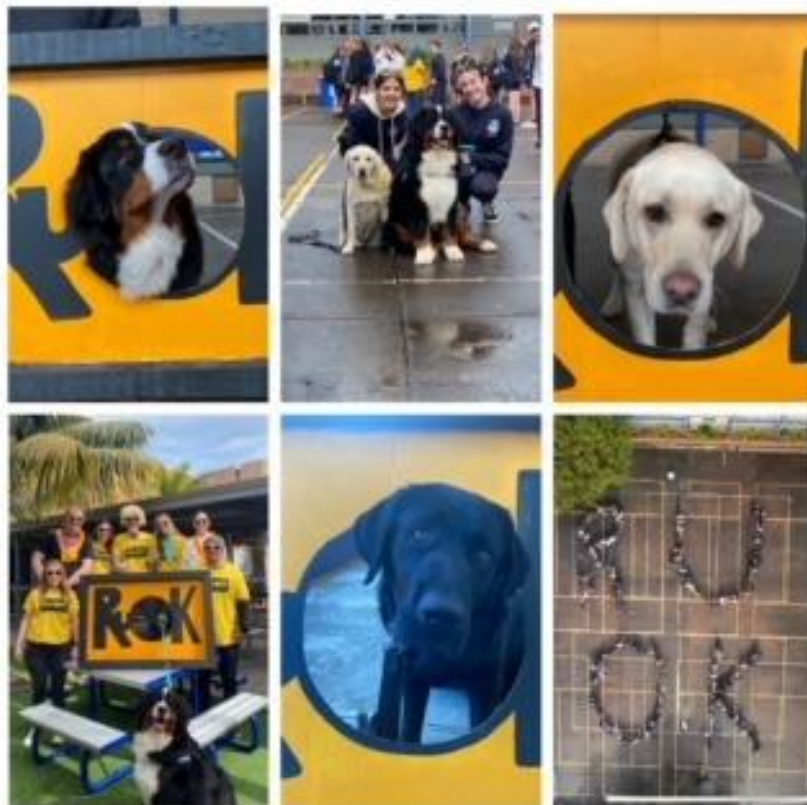

## Yr11 & Yr12 Marine Studies Lady Elliot Trip 2022

In Week 5 of Term 3, 28 marine studies students and 6 staff made their way up to Lady Elliot Island for three nights and four days of snorkelling and building memories that will last forever.

Lady Elliot is a tiny coral cay island 40 minutes light plane flight north of Hervey Bay. It is the southernmost tip of the Great Barrier Reef and is world-renowned for its amazing marine life and almost year-round visits from the iconic manta rays.

It was such a relief to be able to return to this amazing place after two years of being prevented from travelling due to Covid restrictions. We had amazing conditions for our trip, with beautiful weather, calm seas and amazing visibility in the water. Even our flight over was sensational as we filled the time spotting over 16 whales frolicking in the waters off Fraser Island, which is just to the southwest of Lady Elliot.

Most of the students in attendance had never snorkelled on the Great Barrier Reef and were blown away by the diverse and abundant marine life they encountered. Interactions with Green Turtles, Loggerhead turtles, Manta Rays, Reef Sharks, Eels and even Dory and Nemo! The whole time we were in the water as a group, we could hear the sounds of singing Humpback whales which was an amazing experience in itself. Students were also amazed by the variety of hard and soft corals on a reef that was so vibrant and healthy. Our glass bottom boat tour allowed our Marine Biologist guides to deepen the student's knowledge of how this fragile ecosystem functions.

I cannot commend the students enough on their maturity, enthusiasm and ability to put up with my dad jokes for four days straight. Their behaviour was commended by both staff and other tourists staying on the island. They were great ambassadors for our school and showed great skill in the water.

I would also like to thank the staff who attended. Their professionalism in supervision and the outstanding care they showed for our students both in and out of the water helped to make this trip the amazing success it was.

I would also like to thank our Principal, Ms Brook, who, for the past two years, has made sure that we remained focused on ensuring this trip got off the ground again. To say that Covid and the ever-changing guidelines were a challenge is an understatement, and without her backing and enthusiasm, I can honestly say we may not have gone again.

Cannot wait till our 2023 trip!!!

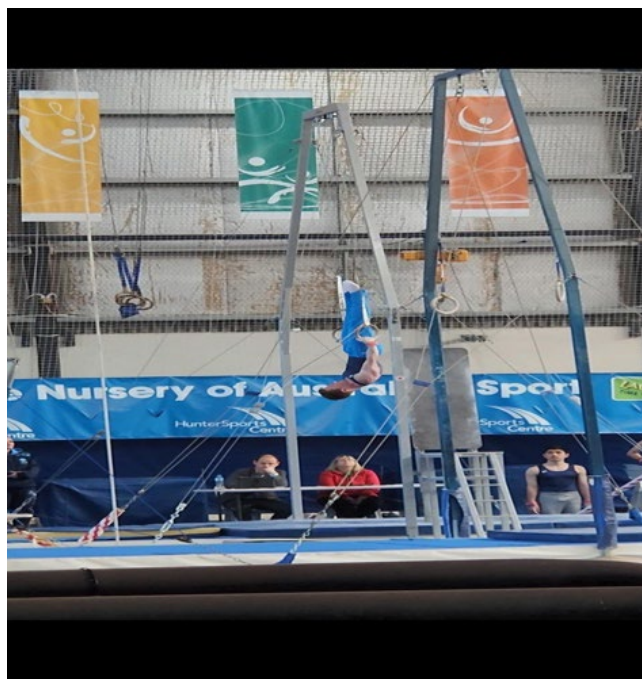

Year 7 Career lessons have begun. In their guidance periods, students learn about themselves in the world of work and careers and investigate multiple intelligence activities.

Year 9 have completed the Work Ready course and are encouraged to engage in work experience. This could lead to many positive experiences, including a part-time job, skills to strengthen university applications, apprenticeship or an SBAT (School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship)

Year 10 continue to have work experience opportunities with successful outcomes. Subject selections for their senior schooling are now complete. Many students are engaged in the YES+ program with TAFE NSW. YES+ is an initiative of the NSW Government and part of the NSW Department of Education's Educational Pathways Program (EPP). The purpose of YES+ is to connect young people with an opportunity to explore Vocational Education and Training (VET) and build skills for the world of work.

Year 11 applications are open for the UOW summer master class. Students who successfully pass their Summer Master Class subject will, at minimum, be guaranteed a conditional offer or admissions interview to the degree that aligns with the Summer Master Class subject they complete (noting must meet the assumed subject knowledge criteria). This also provides credit towards a UOW degree that could make you eligible to skip a whole subject when you study at UOW.

## MINING SKILLS HUB 2022

150 students from across the Illawarra accepted an invitation to attend the Mining Skills Hub held at Dapto High School on Friday, 2nd September.

The morning session included a workshop, “Everything Mining” by the Edge Team. This included an industry panel Q&A session. The day culminated in a Mini Expo where students rotated in small groups to engage with representatives from South 32, Myne Sight, Master Mine, UVAIR, Coal Services, UOW and Training Services NSW. Students were given information and advice about career pathways and employment opportunities, including any key dates for 2023, as well as tips and advice for applying for a career in mining.

As a follow-up to the event, RIEP is planning a Mining Industry Immersion Day for students to further understand the career pathways on offer within the industry and region. RTO Myne Sight, based in Cringila (Wollongong), who undertakes induction training for South 32, will provide a half-day workshop for students to experience what it is like to work in a mine at their bespoke training facility. Students will then be taken on a mine tour. The workshop includes a short presentation, an immersive practical session and a crossword worksheet. Keep an eye out for this exciting opportunity in term 4. Congratulations to the students from Warilla High School who participated.







### Auslan Workshop at Nowra High School

After a year of multiple postponements from COVID, floods and strikes, we finally got to participate in the Auslan Workshop. This workshop aimed to promote how learning Auslan can support a range of career paths. Additionally, it highlighted the

skills shortage of interpreters across the country. 43 students from Nowra, Bomaderry, Shoalhaven, Vincentia and Warilla High School participated in the workshop.

The course was led by interpreters Chevoy and Sean Sweeney and supported by other colleagues from the deaf Community. The students were provided with an overview of Auslan. The course investigated industry information and the career pathways of an interpreter. Industry and community partners; Deaf connect, TAFE and NSW Department of Education Itinerant Hearing Teachers elaborated on their career journeys.

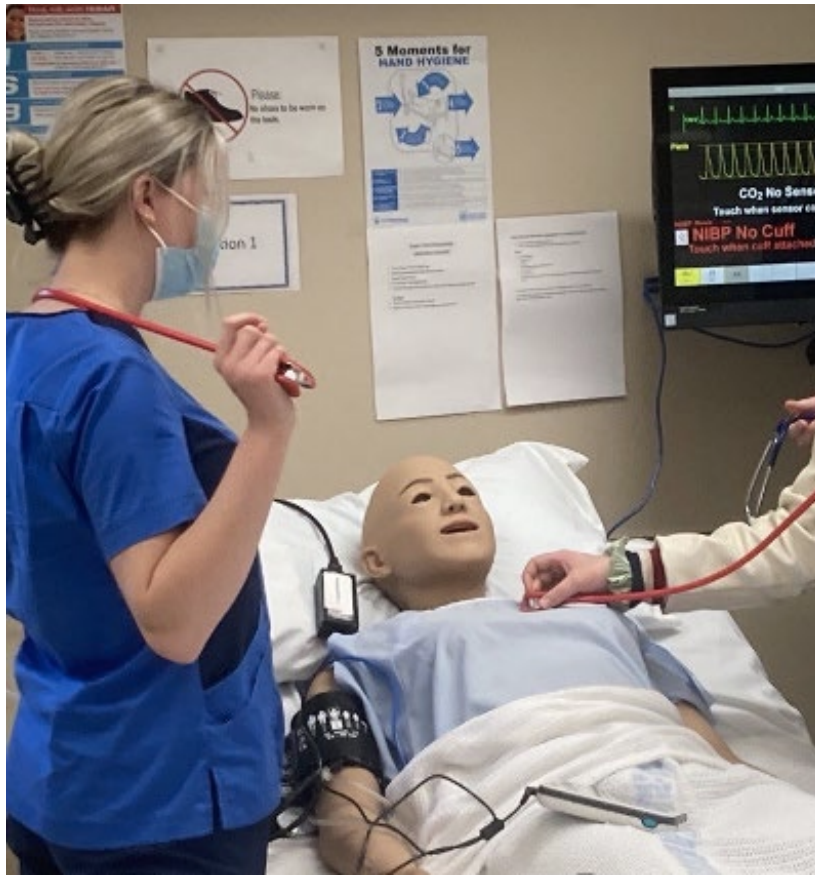


### **Nursing Taster Day and Mini Health Expo at UOW Shoalhaven campus**

### Your personal exam timetable

Your personal exam timetable is available from [studentonline.nesa.nsw.edu.au](https://studentonline.nesa.nsw.edu.au). This timetable lists your written exams and where you will sit for them (usually at your school). It also lists any other exams you are entered for, including oral exams for languages, performance exams and submitted works. Details of your performance exams or projects such as title of work or category (supplied by your school) are also available via *Students Online*. If you are undertaking oral or performance exams, we will post the time and venue on *Students Online* later this year. If there are errors or omissions in the exams you are entered for, contact your school immediately to supply us with the correct information. Take special care if you are entered for a VET course that has an HSC exam. If the exam does not appear on your personal timetable, you have not been entered for it. You must be entered separately for the exam if you expect to sit for it.

### Preparing for your exams

When preparing for your exams, find out what to expect in the exam room and the exam paper, including where to write your answers. For each course you are studying, know the rules and requirements, and what to expect in each exam.

### Information about the HSC exams

Make sure you have read and understand the 2022 *Higher School Certificate Rules and Procedures* guide. You should have received a guide from your school and can also access it here: [educationstandards.nsw.edu.au/wps/portal/nesa/11-12/hsc/rules-and-processes](https://educationstandards.nsw.edu.au/wps/portal/nesa/11-12/hsc/rules-and-processes).

There are serious consequences for:

- cheating in an exam
- disobeying NESA's rules for exam conduct
- not making a serious attempt across a range of questions in each exam.

Any of these offences may result in reduced marks, course cancellation or loss of your HSC.

The exam starting time in the timetable is when reading time begins. Arrive at your exam venue well before the time specified. Further information about your HSC exams is available on *Students Online*.

### Disability provisions

If you have a disability that affects reading exam questions or responding to them under exam conditions, your school can submit an application for provisions to help you. If you have not already done so, speak to your school if you think this applies to you.

### Exam equipment list

You should write in black pen. Make sure you bring spare pens to each exam. You may also bring a ruler, highlighters, pencils (should be at least 2B) and a sharpener, and a bottle of water in a clear bottle. You can wear your watch to your exams, but once you sit down you will have to take it off and place it in clear view on your desk. Programmable watches, including smart watches, will not be allowed in the exam room.

The following list shows the exams for which you are to bring specific equipment, as there may be some exam questions that require the use of this equipment. If an item is listed as optional, it means that there will be no exam questions for which the item is essential. But you may bring and use it if you wish.

All equipment you bring is subject to inspection on entry. Make sure any equipment you are allowed to bring, such as a calculator, is in good working order because an appeal under misadventure provisions for equipment failure will not be upheld.

### What you cannot bring into your exam room

- ✗ A mobile phone. Mobile phones are not permitted in an exam room under any circumstances
  - ✗ A programmable watch, eg a smart watch
  - ✗ Any electronic device (except a calculator where permitted). This includes mobile phones or other communication devices, organisers, tablets (eg iPads), music players or electronic dictionaries
  - ✗ Paper or any printed or written material. You can ask your presiding officer for working paper
  - ✗ Print dictionaries, except where permitted in language exams
  - ✗ Correction fluid
- You are *not* allowed to borrow equipment during exams.

# School Travel

## Term 4 2022

### 2023 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2023 open from **Monday 10 October 2022**.

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2023 can [apply](#) now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should [renew or update](#) their details before **the end of term 4**. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and entitlements remain valid for the start of the 2023 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new [eligibility criteria](#), we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

[Term Bus Pass](#) holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2023.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note:** some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

### Travel from Term 1 2023

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2023 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2022, so parents/students can [apply](#) or [update](#) details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

**School Travel**  
Term 4 2022

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their [local bus operator](#) to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the [Student code of conduct](#) and [Opal terms of use](#).

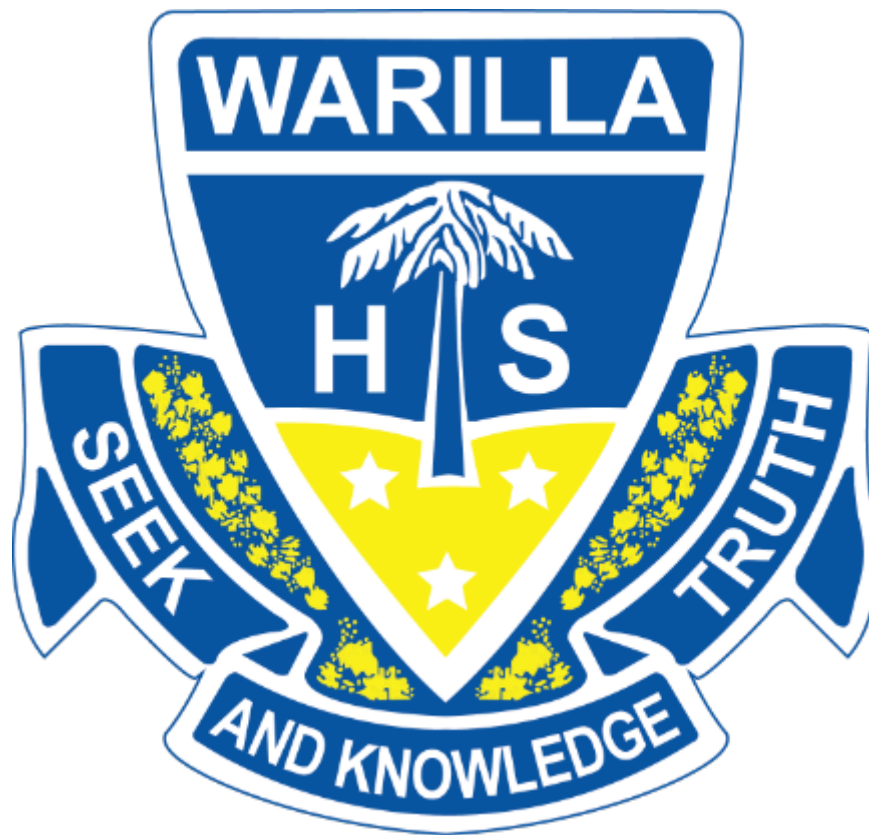
