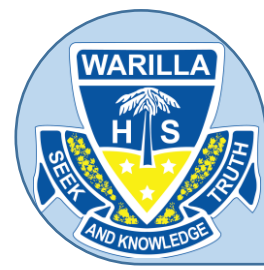

Deputies' Report

The end of a school term is always a time for reflection and evaluation of the school's improvement journey. As a public school, we have a moral responsibility, and therefore a strategic plan, to improve our students learning and life outcomes. This plan is based on our individual school's data and community expectations.

Term 1 2022 has not been without its challenges. Increasing COVID-19 cases within the community have been reflected in our attendance data, with a significant number of students and staff needing to isolate for an entire week due to the illness. Our school has also not been immune to the current shortage of casual teachers, who we rely on to cover the classes of teachers who are absent. It has therefore been difficult to maintain a consistent continuity of learning for our students in this environment.

Despite these challenges, our staff have been fantastic throughout the term and have demonstrated the ongoing resilience and dedication that is the mark of a great team. Many of our teachers have prepared and uploaded lessons on digital platforms for their classes despite being unwell. All have ensured that those students in 'isolation' have been able to access their learning through these digital platforms or through work packages while continuing with their face-to-face teaching load. This is not a requirement of their job but is an example of our staff's professionalism, where they go above and beyond their core duties to support our students. Our students have, therefore, not been unduly disadvantaged in their education by the circumstances of this term.

This reflection on Term 1 has led to a broader evaluation of our school's performance over the last two years, where both education and life, in general, have been sorely tested by the impact of the pandemic. As a community, we can be extremely pleased with how this school has responded to these challenges and the direction the school is taking.

Despite lockdowns and periods of remote learning, our student's HSC results over the last two years have improved. This is both the result of our staff enthusiastically embracing increased opportunities to undertake professional learning to lift results and our students who have accessed the additional support provided through our Wednesday afternoon study skills program.

We have maintained our school focus on student wellbeing while increasing our focus on a school's core business, Teaching and Learning. We now know our students' strengths and weaknesses before they arrive due to a more rigorous transition program. We are catering for the diverse learning needs of our students, not just through existing programs such as CAP and CORE, but through initiatives such as our timetabled Vocabulary Program, aimed at targeting those areas of literacy and numeracy identified by school data as areas of need. Our entire teaching staff are participating in contemporary professional learning focused on skill development through the use of the Teaching and Learning Cycle.

We have recognised that improved teaching and learning outcomes require the infrastructure that allows these outcomes to be delivered. The last two years have seen our school library refurbished to create a contemporary learning space. Specialist rooms have been created to cater for the delivery of drama and VET subjects. Upgrades have occurred to allow access to 21st Century technology.

The school has also created additional undercover seating areas, installed modern water chillers/fountains and replaced the fifty-year-old roofing and bell system. Along with a touch of paint and landscaping, these improvements have made the school a more inviting space for students and the community.

We are also leading the region by being the first public school to have a Reconciliation Action Plan and through our Diversity and Inclusion Statement. We are working hard to ensure our school is a safe and welcoming place for all.

Our school offers a first-class education where all students, no matter their background, can aim high and succeed. It is something of which we should all be proud.

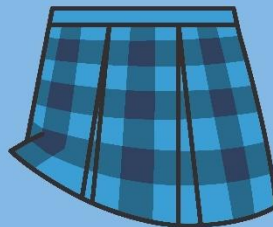

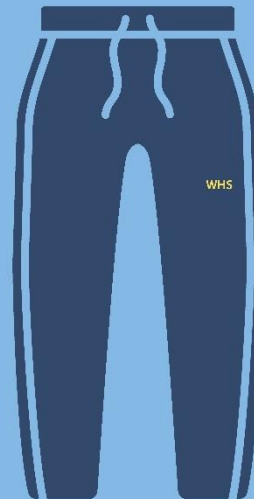

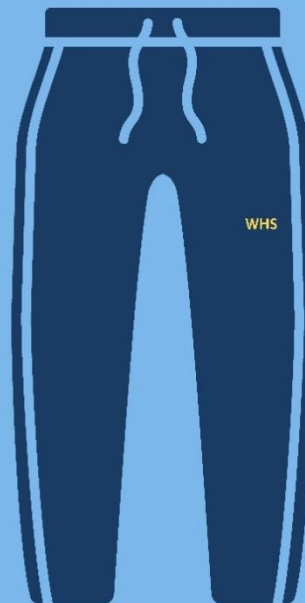

PARKING IN SCHOOL ZONES

The school car park is for staff parking only and is not to be used for dropping off or picking up students.

RIDING A BIKE TO SCHOOL

STUDENT ABSENCES

The Foreshore Centre: Walk for Autism.

'Walk for Autism' was held from the 27th of March to the 3rd of April, aiming to encourage conversations, awareness and support for children and adults on the autism spectrum while raising much-needed funds. According to Autism Spectrum Australia (Aspect), 1 in 70 people are on the autism spectrum.



For many of our students on the autism spectrum, coping with everyday activities can cause stress and anxiety and prevent them from participating in events. Their differences in social communication, strong interests and repetitive behaviours can create unpredictable and confusing social interactions with their peers.

We saw 'Walk for Autism' as a great opportunity for the Foreshore Centre to get involved and raise awareness within our community. The Foreshore Centre entered a team to participate in the walk and held a BBQ at school on Wednesday the 30th to raise funds.

On Friday the 1st of April, all staff and students in the Foreshore Centre 'walked' for Autism. The weather on the day prevented the extended walk that was planned. However, it did not dampen our spirits. We battled the rain and wind, and all walked to Warilla Bowling Club for lunch. This was a challenging yet fantastic opportunity for the students to interact in an unfamiliar environment and implement many of the life skills they had been learning.

Many of our students were pushed far outside their comfort zone, and they thrived. We had 47 students compete at Zone, and of those 47, 42 qualified for South Coast Championships.

Following the South Coast swimming championships, Warilla HS was second to Woonona HS in the school team's events – all results combined. Our boys' team were the number 1 team on the South Coast. Their combined points of 334 were significant, with the next closest schools Nowra and Bulli on 122 points.

Congratulations to everyone who competed.

The next level is NSW CHS Championships. Unfortunately, this year the championships clashed with the junior Australian Surfing Titles. We know the competitors would have competed if possible, such as the nature of their desire to participate. 22 of our students qualified to compete at the state championships, including 6 relay teams. A huge thank you to Eli Wrigglesworth and his family for allowing him to compete in the 6 x 50 all age relay team at the last moment so this team could compete.

The state results will be published in next term's newsletter as results are confirmed.

HSC Disability Support Provisions

NESA provides support for students with disability, allowing them to access the HSC exams and demonstrate learning. Provisions aim to ensure that a student with a disability can read the exam questions and communicate their responses to the markers

Applications to NESA to use disability support provisions for the HSC generally close for this year Friday 8th April, 2022 (conclusion of Term 1). NESA will consider applications lodged after this date.

For example, disability provisions address students' exam needs related to learning, medical, mental health, vision or hearing disabilities.

For example, students with a:

- learning disability may use reader or writer
- a medical disability may access toilet breaks or use adapted furniture
- vision disability may use braille or large-print papers
- a hearing disability may use an oral or sign interpreter.

Applications to NESA are lodged by Warilla High School on behalf of the student.

Provisions are not granted solely on the basis of a diagnosis but are also determined on the basis of functional evidence. Each application is considered separately to ensure the provisions granted to match the needs of each student.

Warilla High School Careers

A group of Year 9 girls recently had the opportunity to attend 'Dress for Success program. This program is designed to empower participants with the practical tools and strategies to help them find employment. They gained confidence, clarity and inspiration within a safe and supportive environment to take control of their employment journey.



Year 10 have completed their "Ready to Work" course. With COVID restrictions lifting, it is now a great opportunity to engage in some work experience. This could lead to many positive experiences including a part-time job, skills to strengthen university applications, apprenticeship or an SBAT. School-based apprenticeships and traineeships (SBATs) allow senior high school students to commence an apprenticeship or traineeship while at school. School-based apprentices undertake the first stage of their apprenticeship training before the end of the HSC year. School-based trainees complete their traineeship by the end of their HSC year. SBATs work part-time. Both the on-the-job and off-the-job training undertaken by school-based apprentices/trainees contributes to their HSC.

Congratulations to the 27 students in year 12 who were successful in their applications to the University of Wollongong's Future Me program.

Benefits of the Future Me Program

- More than 20 hours of free Year 12 and beyond skills development under the guidance of our In2Uni mentors who have achieved a Band 5 or higher in one or more HSC subjects.
- Students who successfully complete the Year 12 Future Me program will be eligible for a guaranteed interview or offer through the Early Admission program at either the University of Wollongong or UOW College (UOWC). Offers/interviews may be for a course determined by UOW/UOWC, depending on academic performance. This may not be for the course that is listed in your Early Admissions application. All Early Admission offers are conditional on students being awarded the HSC/IB or equivalent.
- Face-to-face and online subject resources to assist with the HSC.
- Assistance completing your post-school admissions and UAC online applications.
- Mentoring to explore post-high school options, including higher education and pathways options based on your Year 12 academic performance.
- Year 12 Super Study Day - to prepare you for your HSC exams and transitioning from high school to what comes next.

Recipients of the Tuckwell Scholarship Program at the ANU will receive:

- \$22,350 per annum (2021 rate) (increasing with inflation) for each year of the length of their undergraduate degree, to cover on-campus residential costs, books, and general living expenses

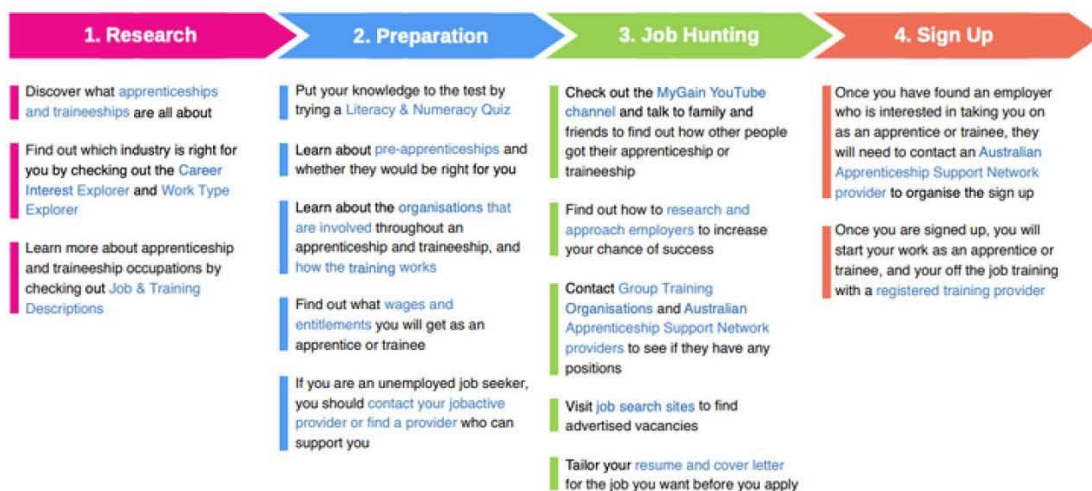

The Defence Industry

The 'defence industry' is the thousands of Australian businesses, men and women across the country who aren't in the Defence Force but use their expertise, experience and trade skills to supply and support it - they are The Workforce Behind The Defence Force.

A new government initiative to help build the defence industry is the virtual work experience program.

The Defence Industry Virtual Work Experience Program will provide opportunities for students who may face geographic or other barriers to participating in traditional work experience.

Students will undertake collaborative, group science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) projects, including projects linked to real-world research and industry challenges.

The Defence Industry Virtual Work Experience Program will commence in Term 2, 2022 with a pilot of approximately 30 students.

Eligibility

To be eligible to participate in Virtual Work Experience, students must be:

- in Years 10 or 11, and aged 15-17 years for the duration of the work experience
- enrolled in a school in Australia
- able to commit to the designated days as specified by the supervisor (with students seeking approval from their school) and be supported by a teacher, parent or other approved adult in their physical location throughout their work experience project.

Virtual work experience will be run by the Department of Defence in conjunction with Australia's National Science Agency, CSIRO.



Tax File Number

Any student will need a tax file number if he/she starts work (part-time and full-time) and all students planning on a tertiary education require one when they start.

Importantly, current Year 12 students are reminded that they will be requested to provide their Tax File Number (TFN) on enrolment to TAFE or university next year, so it is worthwhile getting an application submitted early!

Students must now apply for a TFN online and have their identity verified through an interview at a [participating Australia Post office](#).
