Principal's Message

Let me start with some good news, and there is quite a bit to select from.

Congratulations to one of our staff, Melissa Spero has been named the Australian Schoolgirls Rugby League coach. This is a great honour both for her and the school. We will watch with keen interest as the team is formed and then play against other countries.

I am also thrilled to advise that Keala Ditton, Year 12, will be representing Warilla High School at the 2022 Public Education Foundation Awards ceremony Tuesday, 31 May 2022, at Sydney Town Hall. Again, much like Ms Spero, to be selected from such a huge field of applicants is an amazing feat, and we are so proud of Keala as she represents our school.



You may not have noticed the inclement weather lately (a joke!!!), and it has had a significant impact on the school and our activities. It has meant the cancellation of both our Cross Country and Athletics Carnivals. I am sorry for those students who have trained (if that is possible) for these events. The PE staff and council officials have tried their best to allow us access to the necessary ovals and parks, but the ground is too waterlogged, and the safety of the students is also to be considered. We are working on how students will still be able to move to the next level of representation and will make sure that no student is penalised.

Wet weather has meant the school has been sandbagging some doorways to stop the rain from flooding in, and I thank students for cooperating as we try and keep them dry. The front of the school is so sodden that our seniors were often standing in inch deep water and mud. At considerable expense, we have had sand spread across this area to try and give the wet feet of the students a bit of a reprieve. Typical of our students, quite a few thanked us for this, and my response was, "we can't do too much for the students of Warilla High".

I appreciate the wet weather has made it a challenge to get the washing dry, but if your student must wear something other than the school uniform, can you please send them with a note to this effect to avoid them being in trouble. We try to enforce the uniform policy so that everyone feels like part of the team, and having a mix of "greys" is not a good look. We are "Champion" High and don't allow students to wear this with consequence. Please note, when you are purchasing a uniform, plain navy blue from Kmart or Lowes, is quite acceptable, and our uniform shop is open Wednesdays and Fridays. If finances are an issue, we also have student assistance funds to help pay for uniforms; you need only ask.

Deputies' Report

Uniform - Welcome to the first weeks of the cooler weather, and with that in mind, our wonderful uniform shop has now in-stock ample supplies of our school jacket, which are proving to be very popular, excellent quality, soft to the touch and very warm Sloppy-Joe jumpers. These warm, cooler weather uniform items have already gotten the tick of approval from the students who are wearing them, and they are a vast improvement on the multi-colour non-uniform items previously worn. We must say that the message that only plain navy-blue tops and bottoms are acceptable to be worn at school seems to be understood and taken up by the vast majority of our students and that our uniform is being worn with pride. Parents are reminded that assistance is available when required in cases of financial hardship to help in getting students into an approved school uniform item.

Punctuality - We will also take this opportunity to remind students and their parents of the obligation of students to attend school every day unless they are legally excused and to be on time and prepared to learn. Our school day begins at 8.25 am each morning, so the expectation is that students will arrive before that time. Many of the students spoken to as to why they aren't on time mentioned that they are tired and woke up late. When asked why most admit that they aren't getting enough sleep, and this is negatively impacting their ability to do their very best at school. So, in order for students to excel at school, they all need to get enough quality sleep (10 hours per school night recommended), preferably without the distraction of electronic devices in their bedrooms.

Student Drop Off and Pick Up - With a school of Warilla High School's size, there is always a concern with the school drop off in the morning and pick up at the end of the day. A reminder to parents and carers of the bus stops at the front of the school, and particularly the no stopping area at the corner of Abella St and Keross Ave: The council will often have rangers around the school monitoring these areas and will take photos of cars that are not following the Bus Stop and No Standing signs. This results in substantial fines being given to the owners of the cars. Dropping off and picking up students at the CALTEX Service is not an appropriate venue due to the high volume of traffic and the need for patrons to be able to access the bowsters and shopfront. Can we urge parents and carers to drop the students off on Daphne Street near the soccer fields, in the drop off zone at the corner of Daphne Street and Keross Ave, or in another appropriate area on one of the sides streets to the school.

Positive Policing – In recent weeks, media outlets have been reporting that since the COVID-19 lockdowns, there has been an increase in the number of incidents where young people have been involved in anti-social behaviours. Working with the Lake Illawarra command, the school has invited the police to our school to speak with our students regarding their rights, responsibilities and the possible consequences for people behaving in an inappropriate manner. These talks will be age-appropriate, and at the time of writing this report, Year 7 has been spoken to by officers. Over the second half of Term 2, it is planned that officers from the PCYC will afford this opportunity to our other year groups..

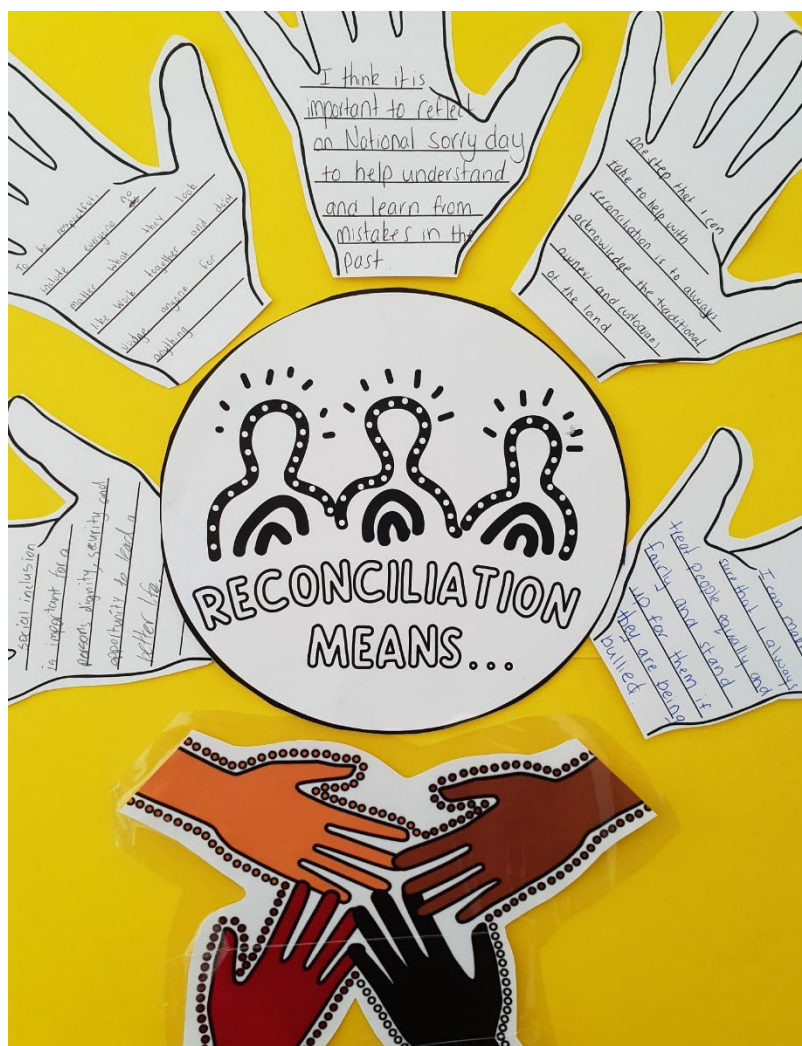


National Reconciliation Week 2022

Reconciliation Walk

Be Brave and Make Change

The dates for NRW remain the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey— the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision, respectively.



Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds, and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

We all have a role to play when it comes to reconciliation, and in playing our part, we collectively build relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories, cultures, and futures.

Our school participated in the 2022 Reconciliation Walk alongside all other schools in the Shellharbour Municipality.

Ms Simon and students walked alongside elders, community members and schools to bring unity. Our flag bearers, Byron and Bella, presented the flag to an elder in exchange for a certificate of participation. We were treated to performances from Gumarra and a speech in language by Auntie Jodi Edwards, followed by lunch on the Lake Foreshore.





2022 Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about the support provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practise, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child, and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students are ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. ‘For three days in the April school holidays, more than 50 high school girls came together to make new friends, get to know theirs and each other’s cultures, and improve their footy skills.

The Indigenous Youth Girls Leadership Program and the Multicultural Youth Girls Leadership Program were delayed twice, having previously been scheduled in September and then January, so it was with immense excitement and anticipation when the players from all over NSW and the ACT arrived at Narrabeen's Sydney Academy of Sport and Recreation.

The best performers from the camp will be selected for the national Indigenous girls' side, the Woomeras, and the national multicultural girls' side, the Medleys.

However, the program is about more than creating good footballers. It's about developing great people who are leaders in their community on and off the sports field.

Skills, drills, recovery sessions, dinners, and guest speakers from Headspace and Transport for NSW gave the participants a sense of what it's like to be in an elite program on the camp.

Sydney Swans player and NSW/ACT Indigenous Ambassador, James Bell, spoke to the players about the importance of culture in elite sporting clubs, inspiring the players to embrace their backgrounds. During the three days, players formed friendships that will strengthen through time. They all proved to be great leaders who flourished during the Youth Girls Leadership Program.'

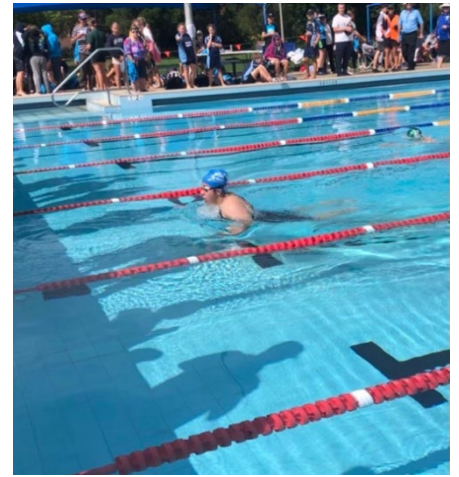
NSW CHS Rugby Union Championships

The UAC application process

1. Click on the 'Apply or log in' button at the top right of the page and select the relevant application type. For a definition of each applicant type, go to **Current Applicants**.
2. Follow the prompts to start your application, then enter your personal details.
3. Provide details of your studies and qualifications.
4. Select your course preferences.
5. Accept the applicant declaration and pay for your application. Your application is now complete.
6. Log in to your application to keep track of its progress and to change your preferences if you want to.

Applying directly to the Uni

Some of our participating institutions also take direct applications for their undergraduate courses. This means you can submit a UAC application and a direct application to the institution.

However, if you do complete both a UAC application and a direct application, we highly recommend that you don't duplicate your course preferences. Make the most of both applications and choose different preferences for each. That way, you can potentially receive offers for different courses.

Check with the Uni as to how and when it will make its direct offers.

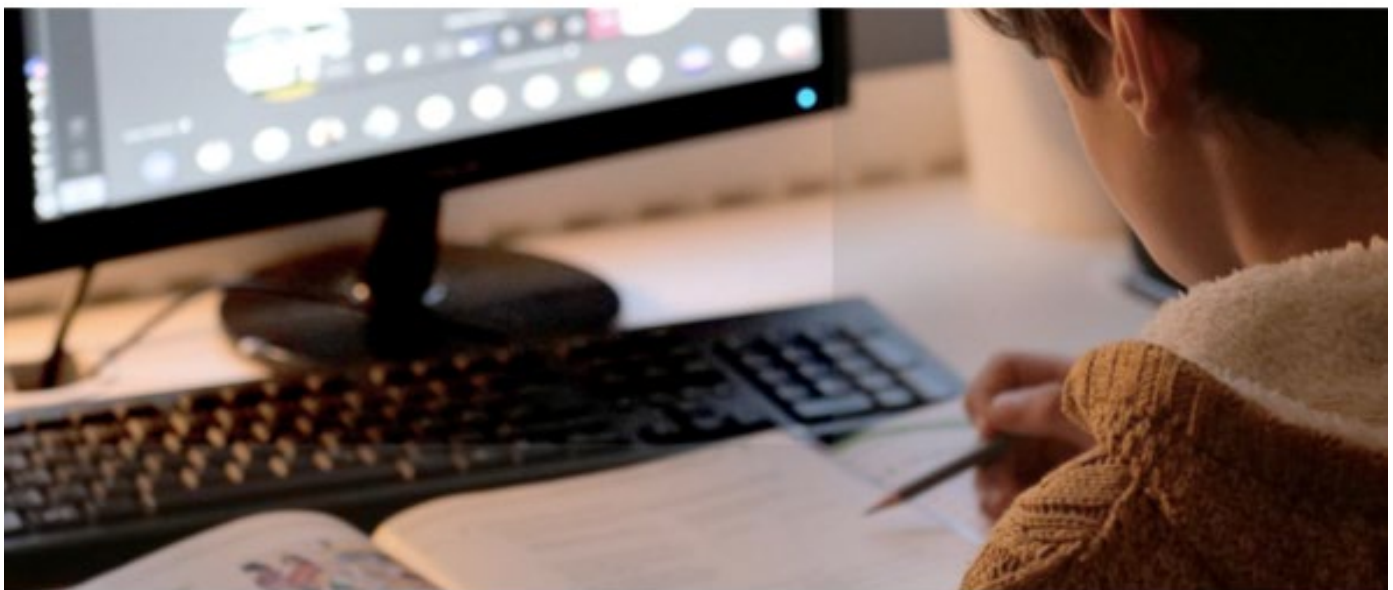

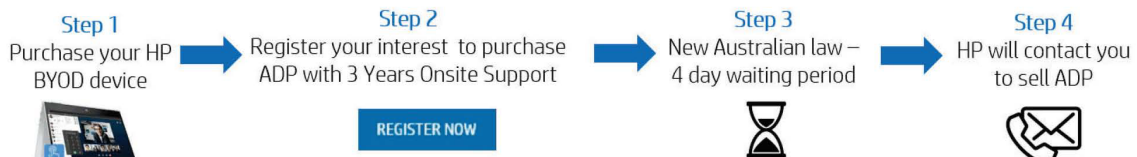
