
All student book requests have now arrived. You should have received an email if you made a request, and your books can be picked up from the circulation desk in the library for the holidays.

We have just placed an order for over 40 new release books, so be sure to pop up at the start of next year to find something new to read.



2023 HSC Disability Support Provisions

Disability Support Provisions are adjustments in the HSC which are practical arrangements designed to help students who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt to show what they know in an exam room.

The adjustments granted are determined by the ways in which a student's exam performance is affected by the learning barrier or disability. Disability includes, but is not limited to Autism, literacy and numeracy difficulties, mental health conditions, ADHD, colour blindness, vision and hearing difficulties, medical conditions e.g. diabetes, epilepsy, and chronic back pain. Provisions may include braille papers, large-print papers, use of a reader and/or writer, extra time or rest breaks.

Warilla High School liaises with NESA to organise provisions for students that are suitable for the Higher School Certificate (HSC). Applications are lodged online by the Warilla HS. The application may include evidence such as medical reports, writing samples and teacher comments.

Applications for support provisions generally close on the last day of term 1, 2023. Late applications can be lodged and are generally considered.



Cricket Update

With the start of summer comes the warmer weather and the sweet sound of leather on willow; cricket season is in full swing!

After a disrupted couple of years, there were high hopes for the Warilla High School cricket teams in 2022, with sides entered in both the Open Davidson Shield and Under 15 Hassett Cup competitions.

La Nina had other ideas, and washouts were a constant source of frustration throughout Term 1. In terms 2 and 3, cricket took a back seat to the winter sports and then in Term 4 we had more bad weather.

This left a lot of cricket to be played, and we are running out of time, so the boys (and their teacher doing the admin) have been busy!

In the Davidson Shield, the boys travelled to Figtree on 24th November to take on Figtree High School. In a nice change, the game was played on the school oval, so there were opposition supporters out in force to cheer on their side. Unfortunately for them, Warilla didn't give them much to cheer for with a dominant display.

Batting first, Warilla compiled a massive score of 356 off our 40 overs. Jacob Coleman got us off the flyer and made a brilliant 107, ably supported by Noah McWilliams the openers put on 139 for the first wicket. Noah went on to a well compiled 78, and Byron Taylor finished 51*.

With the ball, Warilla completely dominated, bowling Figtree out for just 28, with Max Carr-McCarron (4/3) and Cooper Stephens (4/18) the chief destroyers.

Beyond the performance, what I was most pleased with was the way the team went about it. After the match, the Figtree coach had this to say;

"I'd just like to congratulate you and your boys on their efforts today, and in the spirit, the game was played. Your team was on a completely different level to us, yet the boys remained respectful throughout the game, and that is to be commended."

This win meant the boys advanced to the next round, with a match against Albion Park High on Tuesday, 29th November.

After being asked to bowl first, we put the pressure on early, and once the first wicket fell at 1/19, we kept chipping away with regular wickets leaving Albion Park 7-58 at the halfway mark.

After drinks, Albion Park put on a bit of a surge with an 8th wicket partnership of 51, taking them to a score of 90 before it was broken by Cooper Simpson. We managed to bowl Albion Park out in the 29th over for 93. For the bowlers, Jaiden Robinson was outstanding with 3/2, supported by Cooper Stephens, who resumed his fine form with the ball (4/17).

With a modest target set, we went out to bat full of confidence and once again, it was Jacob Coleman who dominated from the outset, with Warilla chasing down the target with 1/94 in the 14th over. Jacob finished with 65*, Noah made 6, and Jake was 12*.

This victory saw us into the South Coast A (the region is split into two brackets) Final against Vincentia High School at Hayden Drexel Oval in Worrigee.

A victory in this match meant we played in the South Coast Regional Final v Eden Marine High School on 13th December.

On a flat track at Hayden Drexel, we were put into bat and, after the loss of an early wicket, were in complete control. Jake Monie compiled one of the great innings in school history, finishing with 144, ably assisted by the Coleman Twins, Byron Taylor, Jaiden Robinson and Max Carr-McCarron. After our 40 overs, we finished 5/336, an imposing total.

With the ball, we were our own worst enemy dropping 6 catches, however, the result was sealed in the 33rd over when we bowled Eden out for 131, a victory of 205 runs. The chief destroyer was Byron Taylor with a comical 4/1, supported by Jarryd White and Huntar Gittoes.

Congratulations to the team, South Coast Champions, who will next year compete with other regional winners for the NSW Alan Davidson Shield.

Can I thank all the players and supporters who have assisted along this journey, as well as our Principal Ms Brook, along with Mel Tregonning and Denise Clune, for all their support of both myself and the team.




Shellharbour City Council Youth Summit 2022

White Ribbon Day

Friday 19th November 2022

On Friday, our SRC Leaders created a short video that was played in classrooms to promote the 'White Ribbon Campaign.' On the day, students were encouraged to come and sign their support and also get a tattoo to help spread the word. It was great to see so many students getting involved during the break.

White Ribbon Australia uses the definition of violence against women found in the United Nations Declaration on the Elimination of Violence against Women. "Any act of gender-based violence that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual or psychological harm or suffering to women, including threats of such acts, coercion or arbitrary deprivations of liberty, whether occurring in public or private life" Violence against women affects women's wellbeing and prevents them from fully participating in society. It impacts on families, the community and the nation. Violence against women is a gendered issue.

To prevent violence against women, we must understand its gendered nature:

- Women are far more likely than men to experience sexual violence and violence from an intimate partner, and with more severe impacts.
- Women are more likely than men to be afraid of, hospitalised by, or killed by an intimate partner.
- Around 95% of all victims of violence, whether women or men, experience violence from a male perpetrator.

Violence against women occurs across cultures and communities. It takes many forms, including physical, sexual, social, emotional, cultural, spiritual and financial abuse, and a wide range of controlling coercive and intimidating behaviour. Regardless of the form it takes, it is understood to be most often used by men, and its impact is to limit and control women's independence.

It's important to understand that violence against women does not always need to involve physical abuse – often other forms of abuse (for example verbal abuse and threats, social isolation, and limiting access to money) can be enough to impact a person's behaviour and cause them to be fearful. Women often describe these non-physical forms of abuse as being severely damaging to their self-esteem, independence and wellbeing.

On Monday, 21/11/2022, the Foreshore Centre hosted an exhibition of creativity and imagination. The exhibition was showcased at the Imaginarium in Shellharbour Village. The exhibition showcased crafts and artworks by students who are impacted by challenging barriers in their day-to-day living. By presenting these students with high expectations, explicit teaching and mentoring, all students portrayed their ability and unique skill set within the exhibition.

School Travel

Term 4 2022

2023 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2023 open from Monday 10 October 2022.

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2023 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details before **the end of term 4**. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and entitlements remain valid for the start of the 2023 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2023.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Travel from Term 12023

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2023 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2022, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

School Travel Term 4 2022

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their local bus operator to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the Student code of conduct and Opal terms of use.

COVID-smart measures for schools

Information for parents, carers and students



We know that being together in the classroom is the best thing for our students' learning, growth and welfare. This term we will continue to implement several measures to allow us to prioritise both the wellbeing of our students and a consistent and productive learning environment.



Stay home if unwell

- If your child is unwell, you must keep them at home. If they are displaying COVID-19 symptoms, they should take a COVID-19 test (PCR or RAT) and follow the advice from the NSW Government on managing COVID-19 safely at home.
- Your child should only return to school when they are symptom free.



Vaccinations

- Vaccinations for COVID-19 and other viral illnesses are one of the best ways of protecting yourself, your family and the community. Vaccination is a safe and effective way to give your immune system a helping hand against many illnesses.
- All eligible students and staff are strongly encouraged to keep up to date with their vaccinations to protect their health.
- All staff working in schools for specific purposes (SSPs) are required to be double vaccinated against COVID-19 or hold a valid medical contraindication.



Rapid antigen testing

- Rapid antigen tests (RATs) should be used if your child is displaying COVID-19 symptoms.
- Students who test positive to COVID-19 are encouraged to notify their school and register their positive test results with <u>Service NSW</u> to have access to timely advice and support from NSW Health.
- Schools will maintain a reserve stock of rapid antigen tests onsite for surveillance testing purposes in the event of an outbreak.



Hygiene and cleaning

- Students are encouraged to regularly wash their hands with soap and warm water, and to use personal
 protective equipment as required.
- Boosted day cleaning of schools will continue on high-touch areas and other hard surfaces, door handles, lockers, light switches and handrails in stairways.

Ventilation

- Fresh air is the most effective form of ventilation to minimise the risk of transmission.
- During the warmer months, cooling will be used together with ventilation methods to balance thermal
 comfort.
- All learning spaces in government schools have been checked to ensure appropriate levels of ventilation and air purifiers have been provided where needed.
- Using outdoor spaces will continue to be encouraged where possible.



Masks

- Mask-wearing is strongly encouraged where possible for all students, staff and visitors, particularly
 indoors and/or when physical distancing is not possible, and if they have been exposed to COVID-19.
- Mask-wearing is required at all times for staff, volunteers and other workers who support our students
 who are at greater risk of serious illness should they contract COVID-19, whether they be in schools for
 specific purposes (SSPs), support units or mainstream classrooms.



Visitors

- Visitors can attend school sites regardless of their vaccination status.
- Visitors who are engaging directly with students in certain higher-risk settings for school operations and curriculum delivery and allied health partners for the wellbeing of students, may be required to wear masks.



Activities

- Health and safety risk assessments will be integrated when planning activities, including excursions and overnight camps.
- Parents and carers will be made aware of the risk of exposure and will need to give permission for certain activities.



Responding to local situations

- Schools will work with the department's Health, Safety and Staff Wellbeing case management team to respond appropriately to local situations, including outbreaks of viral illness.
- In some cases, schools may temporarily introduce additional measures as a 'circuit breaker', including requiring mask-wearing, postponing or limiting non-essential activities and directing cohorts to learn remotely.



Learning remotely

Schools continue to have access to digital, guided and printed learning resources to support students
who need to learn remotely.




