Jordan Liber

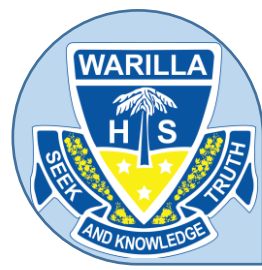

Deputies' Report

Our Year 12 students have completed their examinations and are transitioning into the next stages of their educational and career pathways. It's important to acknowledge the hard work and dedication that these students have put into their thirteen years of schooling. As they finish this significant chapter of their lives, it's a great opportunity to reflect on their achievements and the support they have received from teachers, families, and peers throughout their HSC journey.

Additionally, as we move forward, staff can begin to focus on supporting our current HSC 2025 cohort as they prepare for their upcoming HSC year. This may involve providing guidance on study techniques, time management, and maintaining a healthy balance between school, work, and personal life.

Teaching staff are using insights and strategies gained from Professional Development opportunities in 2024 to inform their programming and teaching practice for 2025. In the whole school initiative, 'Teaching for Student Growth', staff have reflected on their teaching practice and have assessed their impact on student outcomes. We have encouraged staff to engage in collaborative reflection sessions where they can share experiences and discuss how the techniques learned from this professional development program has influenced their teaching practice.

The 2025 Year 7 cohort has started the on-campus transition days at Warilla High School. These on-campus transition days are crucial for helping students acclimate to their new environment and build connections with both peers and staff. Transition overview:

1. **Foreshore Campus Tours:** Led by Ms. McGarry, the tours provide Foreshore students with the opportunity to familiarise themselves with the school layout, facilities, and available resources. This helps reduce anxiety about navigating the school and builds a sense of belonging.
2. **Cultural Engagement:** The meeting with the Aboriginal Education team (Katrina, Alana, and Balunn) is an excellent initiative to ensure that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students feel welcomed and supported. Engaging in cultural and "getting to know you" activities fosters respect and understanding.
3. **Class Lessons in Week 5:** The planned transition days with class lessons will further immerse the Year 7 students in the academic environment. This will help them experience what a typical school day is like, allowing them to meet different teachers and explore various subjects.
4. **CAP/CORE in Week 8:** The CAP/CORE Induction Night is an important event for introducing new students and their families to the CAP and CORE programs at Warilla High School

We continue to encourage all our students to make the most of the opportunities available at Warilla High School and look forward to our students excelling in all aspects of school life.

2025 HSC Disability Support Provisions

Disability Support Provisions are adjustments approved by NESAs to be used by students when sitting the HSC. The HSC support provisions are implemented for those students with disability who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt at the HSC exams. Support provisions are practical interventions allowing students to access the exams on the same basis as students without disability.

Adjustments permitted by NESAs are determined by the functional impact the student's disability has on their ability to access and attempt HSC exams.

Disability covered by these provisions include but are not limited to poor mental health, Autism, reading, writing and numeracy difficulties, very poor handwriting, excessive pain caused by writing, mental health conditions, anxiety, depression, ADHD, colour blindness, some vision conditions and hearing difficulties,

medical conditions, e.g. diabetes, epilepsy, chronic back pain, physical injury. Provisions may include but are not limited to braille papers, large-print papers, use of a reader and/or writer, extra time or rest breaks, small group supervision, stand and stretch, and diabetic provisions.

NESA requires documentation of disabilities; gathering this information can be time-consuming.

Applications for students are lodged online by the Warilla HS. Each student's application is discussed with the student and parents or carers. The provisions sought are dependent on the support needs of the student.

Applications for support provisions generally close on the last day of term 1, 2025. Late applications can be lodged and are generally considered.

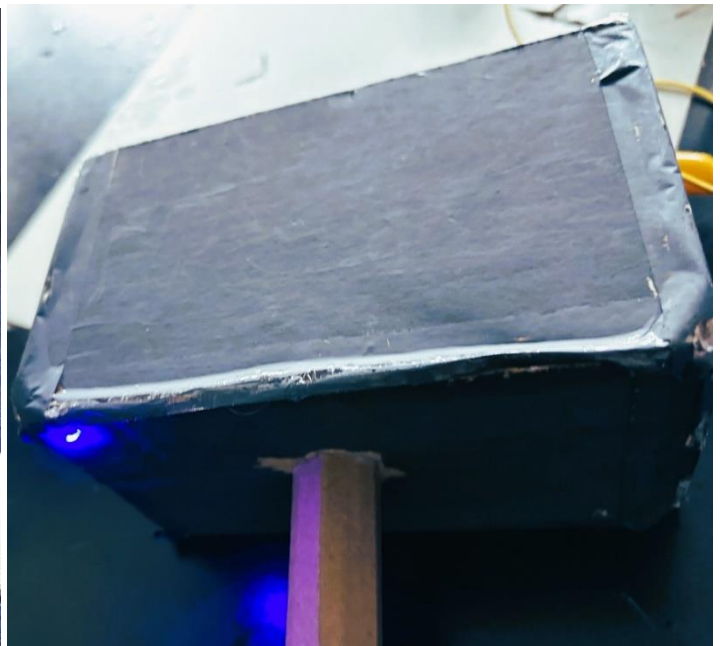


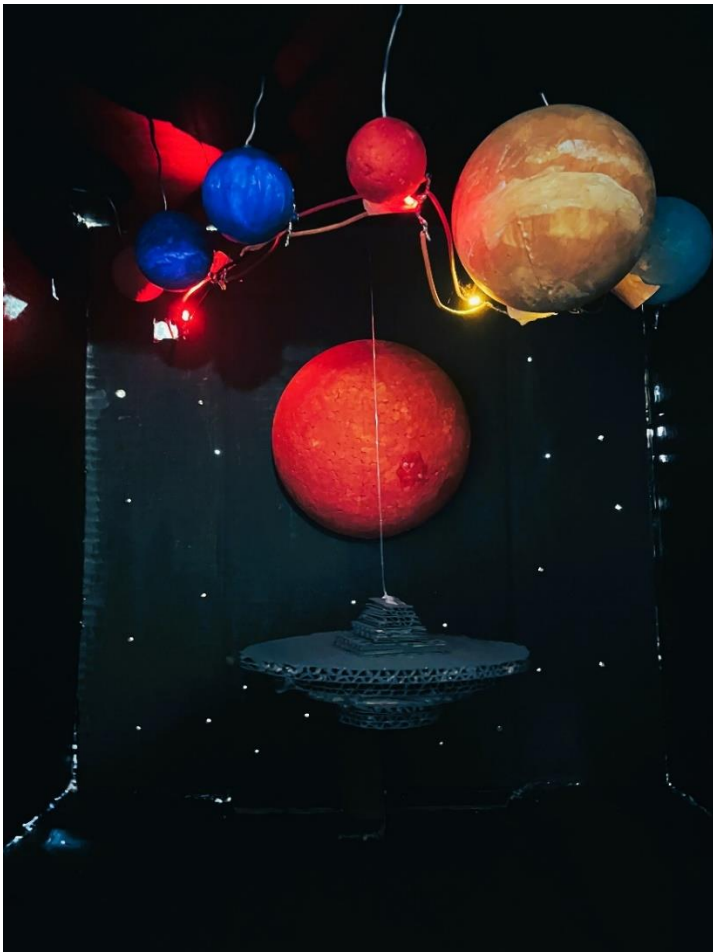
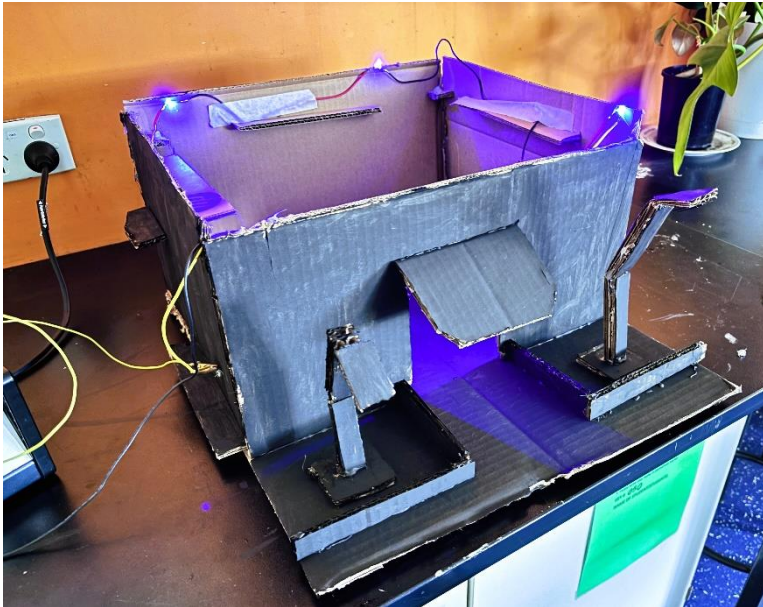




Year 10 STEM Class

Year 7 have been developing their skills in mixed media. They have just finished creating a self-portrait based on the work of Frida Kahlo.



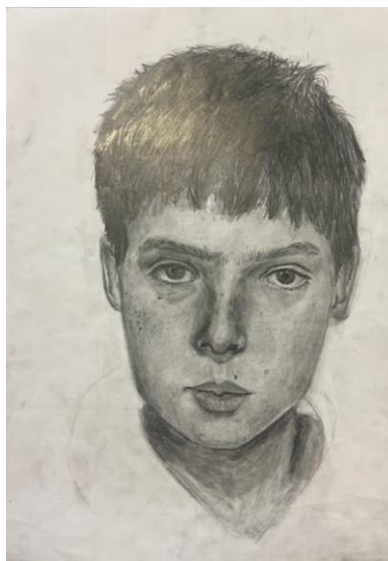
Year 8 Visual Arts have been working hard to create their own Canopic Jars based on Ancient Egyptian burial practices.

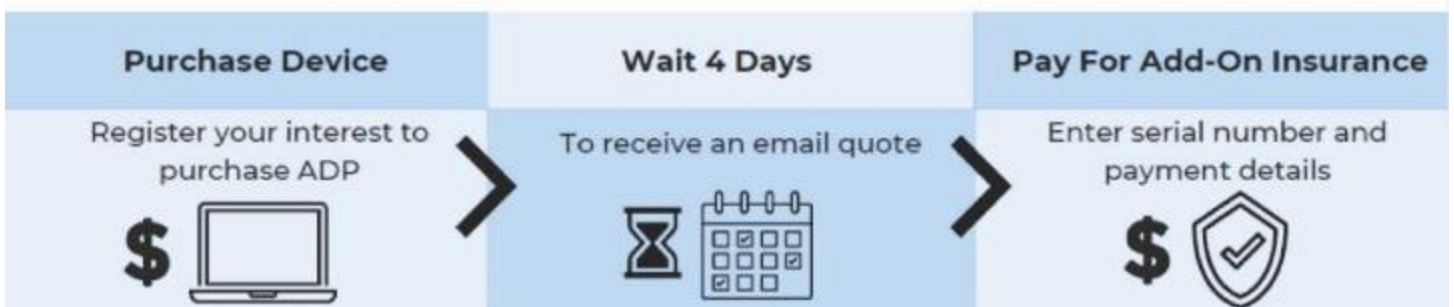

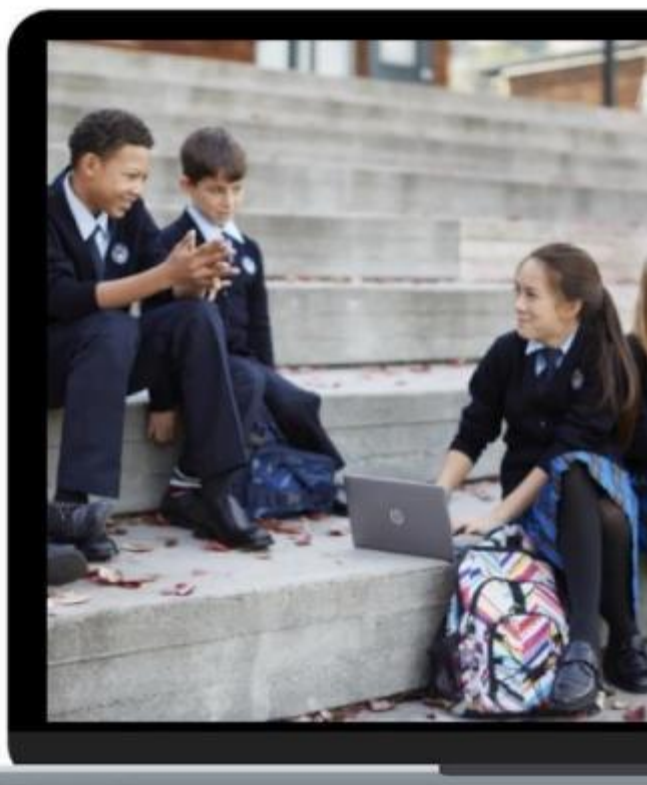

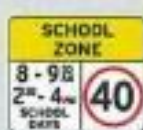
