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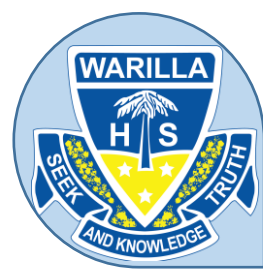
## Principal's Message

For me, the highlight was the student Vs staff race, which saw almost everyone crowded around the edges of the pool, cheering them on!!! Warilla High has an outstanding history of representing the school at the more elite levels in swimming, and I hope that this continues in 2024. Thank you also to the staff who supervised and worked on this carnival. Thank you also to the Foreshore Centre for running the BBQ.

I would like to congratulate Maddix Burke, from the Warilla-Barrack Point Surf Club who was selected in the NSW team to compete at the interstate NSW's Surf Life Saving Championships which were held at Maroubra beach on January 11. The event was held in conjunction with the Nutri-Grain Ironman Series. Maddix was the only competitor to represent NSW in his age group, under 15s, from the Illawarra and South Coast. He has had a sensational year, taking out the Sydney Water Series for his age group and finishing on the podium in Coolangatta. he capped these feats off by taking out the Ironman event at the Wanda Summer Surf Series and also achieved outstanding results at the recent Interbranch carnival held at Fingal Bay. Anna Watson congratulated Maddix and wrote, "On behalf of the entire Shellharbour electorate, I would like to congratulate Maddix on his amazing achievements and wish him well in his future sporting endeavours". What an outstanding result!!!



Congratulations also to Bailey Campbell (Yr 12), Lara Pero (Yr 12) and Chelsea James (Yr 11). These three students successfully applied for a place at the Future Leaders Academy Pacific Student Leadership Program in Vanuatu, to be held later this year. This is a prestigious international leadership camp linked to the Duke of Edinburgh’s Hillary Award. There are only 40 places available for Australian and New Zealand applicants, so the fact that we have received an offer for **THREE** of our own students is amazing. This confirms the outstanding nature of our wonderful students.

## Deputies' Report

The role of a school is to provide all students with an opportunity to be successful. In a large comprehensive secondary school, student success comes in many forms, and Warilla High School prides itself on providing a wide range of support and experiences for our students, regardless of their interests and talents.

It is, however, the academic success that is the key driver of any school, and Warilla High School is working hard to maintain an environment where academic success is valued and attainable for all. Our staff are therefore involved in a whole school professional learning program titled 'Teaching for Student Growth' to ensure all staff are abreast of contemporary teaching and learning strategies and are implementing and critiquing these strategies in their classrooms.

The school's HSC Success program is well and truly operational. This program supplies tutor support for students on a Tuesday afternoon and provides study space and resources for our senior students in our school library on a Thursday afternoon. It is the Wednesday afternoon Study Club that is this program's marquee event. Every Wednesday afternoon between 3 pm and 5 pm, students and staff volunteer their time to meet and support one another to study for upcoming examinations, complete assessments or reinforce content and concepts from class.

It is now widely understood that the NSW government has announced that from Term 4 2023, there is a ban on mobile phones being brought into public schools by students. This has come about as there is widespread evidence that access to mobile phones has had a detrimental impact on student learning. Our expectation is that phones are off from gate to gate. Students that have a third phone violation will have parents/carers called to pick the phone up from the front office at 2.45 pm.

Overall, our uniform is being worn with pride. Parents are reminded that assistance is available when required in cases of financial hardship to help in getting students into an approved school uniform item.

## IMPORTANT MESSAGES

### LATE ARRIVAL – CHANGE OF PROCEDURES

Up until 9.30am go to the side window of the Library between ‘A’ block and the Library block. One of the Office Staff will record your information and give you a late slip to get into class. After 9.30am report to the front office. Arriving late 3 times **without a note from parent/guardian** will result in parents being contacted by the school and consequences will apply.

### UPDATING STUDENT DETAILS

If you change your address, phone number, including mobile number, or other contact details could you please let the school know as soon as possible?

### PRIVATE PERSONAL PROPERTY

Personal property which is brought to school is the sole responsibility of the individual. The school is not insured to cover loss or damage.

### PARKING IN SCHOOL ZONES

Heavy fines are imposed for illegal dropping off or picking up students in school zone hours.

The school car park is for staff parking only and is not to be used for dropping off or picking up students.

### RIDING A BIKE TO SCHOOL

Students who ride a bike to school are required by law to wear a helmet.

### STUDENT ABSENCES

Students must bring a note to explain their absences. A green ‘Absence Book’ is available from the front office. Unexplained absences will appear on the student’s report.

### FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Parents experiencing financial difficulties can apply for support through the Student Assistance Scheme. Funds are available to help with subject fees, school uniform and books. All enquiries through the front office.

## 2024 HSC Disability Support Provisions

Disability Support Provisions are adjustments approved by NESA to be used by students when sitting the HSC. The HSC support provisions are implemented for those students with disability who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt at the HSC exams. Support provisions are practical interventions that allow students to access the exams on the same basis as students without disability.

Adjustments permitted by NESA are determined by the functional impact the student's disability has on their ability to access and attempt HSC exams.

Disability covered by these provisions includes, but not limited to Autism, reading, writing and numeracy difficulties, very poor handwriting, excessive pain caused by writing, mental health conditions, anxiety, depression, ADHD, colour blindness, vision and hearing difficulties, medical conditions e.g. diabetes, epilepsy, chronic back pain, physical injury. Provisions may include but are not limited to braille papers, large-print papers, use of a reader and/or writer, extra time, or rest breaks, small group supervision, stand and stretch, diabetic provisions.

Applications for students are lodged online by the Warilla HS. Each student's application is discussed with the student and parents or carers. The provisions sought are dependent on the support needs of the student.

Applications for support provisions generally close on the last day of term 1, 2024. Late applications can be lodged and are generally considered.

On Wednesday 28th February our Indigenous Year 7 students met for a cultural art morning and yarn. This gave the students the opportunity to meet and form connections with their Aboriginal cohort. A morning tea with our local Aboriginal Community Liaison Officer Glen Sutherland from Lake Illawarra Police attending. Glen spoke to the students about positive behaviors, various programs on offer and the importance of positive relationships between police and community.

The process for student PLP (Personal Learning Pathway) has begun. Students in Year 7 will have parents/carer contacted by Katrina to arrange a meeting and students in other years have been working on theirs with our Aboriginal mentor Alana.

Next week our Year 7 students will gather at Bushrangers Bay for the Concrete Connection Program. The aim of this program is to work alongside our careers office and form positive relationships so we can gauge interests, likes and aspirations when it comes time to subject selections and future employment opportunities. Students will be introduced to snorkelling and supported to develop the skills necessary to access Bushranger's Bay marine reserve. This is the first year this initiative will take place.

This term also sees the return of Woolyungah from UOW with their "My Future Matters Program". This is available to all our Aboriginal students in each year group. The program consists of 2 in school visits with various activities then a day on campus at UOW at the end of the year visiting various faculties and engaging in cultural activities.

Term 2 will see us engage with Shellharbour City Council for Sorry Day by the Lake Foreshore.

The NSW Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) is urgently looking for potential foster carers in the Illawarra, Shoalhaven and Southern NSW. We need people who can provide care anywhere from a few days to a few months and beyond for children and young people aged between 0-18 years old. We also need people who can care for siblings.

Foster carers support families by caring for children who are unable to stay at home while their parents get help to change. Foster carers come from all walks of life and their families reflect the wider community we live in. They can be single, in a relationship and be with or without children of their own. Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islanders and people from culturally diverse backgrounds are also encouraged to apply.

All carers receive training and ongoing support. There are numerous financial support packages available to foster carers to support the child through education, medical needs, food costs and other daily costs of living. By working together, we can give every child and young person a safe, loving and home in which they can thrive.

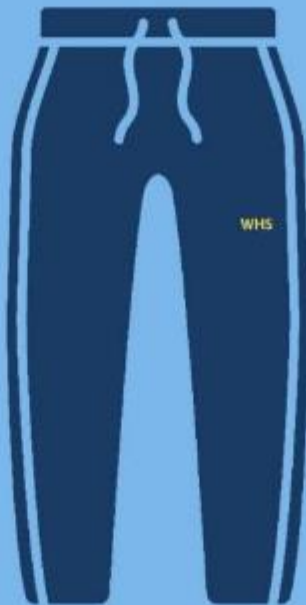

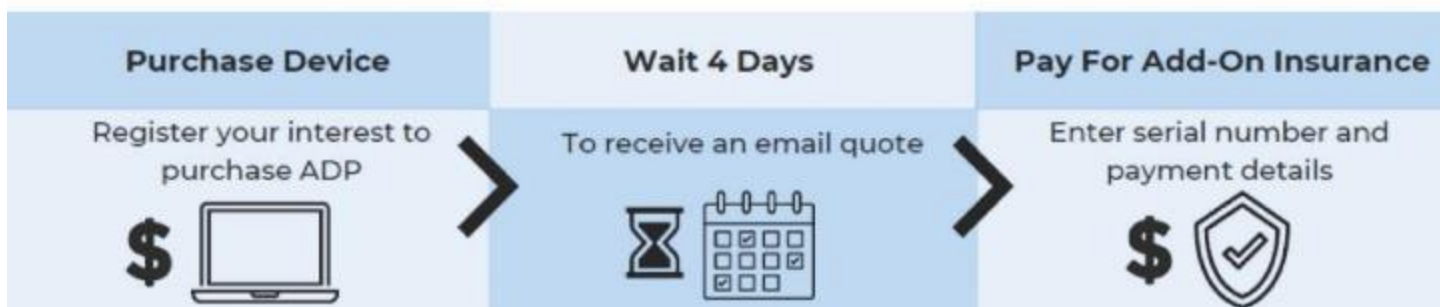

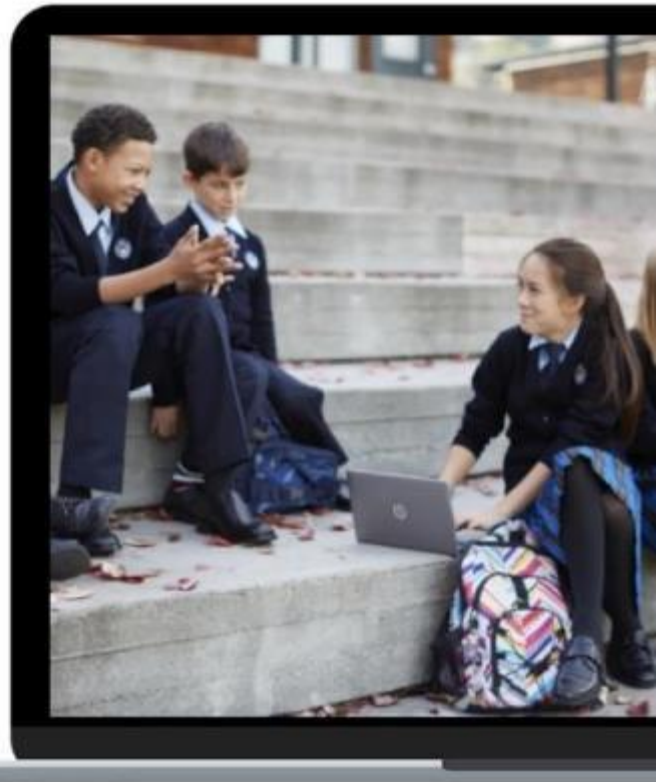

# ILLEGAL PARKING PUTS CHILDREN'S LIVES AT RISK

Children are small, harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremely vulnerable. They need **YOU** to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.

## NO PARKING

No waiting. You have 2 minutes to drop-off or pick up. You must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.



Penalty from **\$191** + 2 Demerit Points

## NO STOPPING

You must not stop on a length of road with a No Stopping sign. The first 10m from an intersection is a No Stopping zone. Yellow kerb lines are also No Stopping zones.



Penalty from **\$344** + 2 Demerit Points

## BUS ZONE

Only a public bus can stop in a bus zone.



Penalty from **\$344** + 2 Demerit Points

## MOBILE PHONES

Extra fines apply for using mobile phones in a school zone. *May be subject to Double Demerits.*



Penalty from **\$457** + 5 Demerit Points

## SPEEDING OFFENCES

40km/h is the speed limit. Children are vulnerable so slow down in school zones. *May be subject to Double Demerits.*



Penalty from **\$200** + 2 Demerit Points

## DRIVEWAYS & FOOTPATHS

Do not park on or across a driveway or footpath.

Penalty from **\$344** + 2 Demerit Points

## PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS

1. In a queue of traffic, no part of your vehicle can stop on a pedestrian crossing.  
2. Do not let your child in or out of a vehicle at a pedestrian crossing as this is a No Stopping zone.



Penalty from **\$457** + 2 Demerit Points

## U TURN

Illegal on or near a pedestrian crossing and across double white lines.

Penalty from **\$344** + 2 Demerit Points

## DOUBLE PARKING

Double parking is illegal and is very dangerous in a school zone.

Penalty from **\$344** + 2 Demerit Points
