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Principal's Message

Welcome to our first school newsletter for 2025!

I would like to introduce myself to the Warilla High School community as the Relieving Principal. I am very excited to be joining such a passionate and committed staff and have enjoyed getting to know them alongside a good many parents and students so far. I would like to thank the community for the warm welcome to the school and have been heartened by the vast number of lovely students who have been approaching me in the playground and at the gate to have a chat. I have been enjoying the chance to visit a range of classrooms and year groups and have been working closely with the Student Representative Council.

In Week 6, we held our annual Open Night for prospective students of the future and their families. All our faculties opened their classrooms, and our student leaders took small groups of families on a tour. Our Hospitality students made special choc-chip cookies as thank-you gifts and a barbecue was held. This will ensure that you get the correct answer which we hope will clarify matters for you.

- Learning Support issues Head Teacher Learning Support or one of our Learning & Support Teachers.
- Significant academic issues or disciplinary issues Deputy Principal for your child's year group.

Please note, however, that our teaching staff are in class for a large proportion of the day, so if you contact us and the person you wish to speak to is not available, they will indeed endeavour to contact you as soon as they are able.

IMPORTANT MESSAGES

LATE ARRIVAL - CHANGE OF PROCEDURES

Up until 9.30am go to the side window of the Library between 'A' block and the Library block. One of the Office Staff will record your information and give you a late slip to get into class. 








Warilla High School Triumphs at Zone Swimming Carnival!

Warilla Wellbeing News Term 1 2025

It is fantastic to welcome everyone back to school after a well-deserved summer break. We love catching up with everyone and seeing our students moving into the new year, freshly dressed in their uniforms and ready to learn. Many students we have spoken to at the start of this year have positive goals of being the best they can be. This is fantastic and shows the maturity that comes with growing up.

We have had several Wellbeing programs that have already started, including our Girls Group with the Illawarra Women's Health Centre and our Year 9 Top Blokes program. These programs are a fantastic opportunity for our students to link them to outside agencies. They include a weekly program that covers a range of topics to help our students grow and develop their skills to become the best versions of themselves.

Another exciting program that we are now in our fourth year of running is our Wellbeing Dog Ollie Returned. She was very excited to be back and see all the students, especially getting to meet our new Year 7 cohort. Many students were able to give her a pat and you could see in her face how much she enjoyed being back with our students. Ollie also went and visited some of our new staff members. She brings such joy to everyone who interacts with her. We were also very lucky to have her bring along Shiko in week 5 to have a visit with some of our students. It is safe to say that these two perfect puppies are a blessing to all staff and students. We are very lucky to have Judi who brings them along every Wednesday to volunteer her time for our school.

Some up-and-coming programs we have this term are:

We Are Gibber - this program is called **Smashed.** It is a theatre in education performance and workshop that helps embed prior learning and present issues in a realistic, credible format.

- The emotional and social causes of underage drinking
- The impact on young lives
- Online behaviour
- Peer pressure and decision-making
- Where and how to help themselves and others
- Consent

Elephant Ed - this is a program that is returning to our school to work with our Year 10 students. We are running some of the sessions that we were unable to fit in last year and will build on the prior learning of students around consent, respectful relationships, and safe sex.

Black Dog Institute Future Proofing Study - this program has been running for five years surveying students who are now in Year 12. This study is now the largest study and most comprehensive study of adolescent mental health in Australia, working hard to ensure that the findings are influential as widely as possible so that we, as a society, can support young people to thrive.

Black Dog Institute is also offering a free webinar that is open to all parents, caregivers, and anyone interested in supporting the mental health of teens in their care.

Topic: Teen Mental Health Matters: For Parents and Carers

Date & Time: Mar 3, 2025, 06:30 PM

Description: Webinar focused on providing strategies and resources to help you in supporting your teen.

Co-hosted by: A Clinical Psychologist facilitator and Black Dog Institute lived experience presenter.

Areas of exploration:


- How to make sense of adolescence.

This program will offer students the opportunity to build resilience and coping strategies to help them in the future. Parents and students will have the opportunity to sign up for this program during the afternoon and talk to our Student Support Officers about the benefits of completing this program.

Children are small, harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremely vulnerable. They need YOU to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.

NO PARKING

No waiting. You have 2 minutes to drop-off or pick up. You must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.



Penalty from \$191 + 2 Demerit Points

NO STOPPING

You must not stop on a length of road with a No Stopping sign. The first 10m from an intersection is a No Stopping zone. Yellow kerb lines are also No Stopping zones.



Penalty from \$344 + 2 Demerit Points

BUS ZONE

Only a public bus can stop in a bus zone.



Penalty from \$344 + 2 Demerit Points

MOBILE PHONES

Extra fines apply for using mobile phones in a school zone. May be subject to Double Demerits.



Penalty from \$457 + 5 Demerit Points

SPEEDING OFFENCES

40km/h is the speed limit. Children are vulnerable so slow down in school zones. May be subject to Double Demerits.



Penalty from \$200 + 2 Demerit Points

DRIVEWAYS & FOOTPATHS

Do not park on or across a driveway or footpath.

Penalty from \$344 + 2 Demerit Points

PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS

 In a queue of traffic, no part of your vehicle can stop on a pedestrian crossing.
 Do not let your child in or out of a vehicle at a pedestrian crossing as this is a No Stopping zone.



Penalty from \$457 + 2 Demerit Points

U TURN

Illegal on or near a pedestrian crossing and across double white lines.

Penalty from \$344 2 Demerit Points

DOUBLE PARKING

Double parking is illegal and is very dangerous in a school zone.

Penalty from \$344 2 Demerit Points
